This year there are several insulator collectors running for 2 offices. As the Information Director, I have requested each candidate to write something about themselves and/or what their goals are. This information is designed to help every N.I.A. member to familiarize themselves with every candidate and to help them decide which candidate is best for the job. I typed each letter as I received it to preserve the individual characteristics of each.

CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT OF THE N.I.A.

BOB ALEXANDER...

I have been a collector of insulators for about five years now and have met a lot of friends along the way. To me this is the best part of the hobby. The people involved are the greatest. I am 26 years old and live in Winter Haven, Florida. I started the Central Florida Insulator Club, and with the help of many other collectors in the State we have made the Club very successful with 46 members so far in our first year. I am the author of two books about insulators. I, like most collectors, have had some problems with color discriptions in trading through the mail. So I decided to do something about it and came up with "The Standard Color Guide for Insulators". Also it was pointed out to me that what the hobby needs in general is that the average person should be informed about the hobby and its history. This is why I printed "The Story of Insulators", and I have sold many hundreds of these to beginning collectors as well as the general public, at flea markets and insulator and bottle shows. Now, I am in the process of doing a book on telephone signs and related collectables. I am also the editor of the Central Florida Insulator Club Newsletter.

My specialty is CD 160's of which I have 130 different so far although there are still many that I need to complete my collection.

I believe in the N.I.A. and its goals and principles, and although I think there is still room for improvement in the NIA, I think we should be proud of what the NIA has done so far for the collector in general. There is more to be done though, and I think that with the support of the collectors, the NIA will become an organization that will last as long as our insulators themselves.

I have wrote stories of insulators for Crown Jewels Wire, the Old Bottle Magazine, the Gold Coast Collectors Club of Lauderdale Fla., the Artifacts International of Treasure, Indian Relic and Old Ports, and for are own club Cross Arms Collectors Club of Lauderdale Fla which we formed in 1974-with meetings every 3rd Wed of each month here at are home, everyone is welcome to come.

The Board has had some ideas they recommend all members to help decide. They are noted as Propositions and will be discussed here.

PROPOSITION A - Extension of the Boundries to include Canada and Mexico. The Regions would be changed to add the following to the present Region. Eastern Region-Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Quebec, Prince Edward Island, Central Region-Manitoba, Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan. Western Region-Alberta, British Columbia, Yukon, Mexico.

PROPOSITION B - Dues increase and change. Dues to increase because of the cost of operation has increased. We need to raise the dues and expand the rate for family membership as provided for in Article II paragraph 1-2 of the by-laws. Proposed dues are:

- \$3.00 single membership
- \$4.00 married couple

\$5.00 family-man, wife, and all children under 16 years of age.

PROPOSITION C - "NIA Day" in show rules. This day has been established for N.I.A. members to get in a day early to take advantage of many bargains. The "NIA Day" will be free to N.I.A. members. Non NIA members will have an opportunity to join at the door or pay the current dues for "NIA Day" admittance. To keep the "NIA Day", your approval is needed. It is a benefit you have by being a member.

PROPOSITION D - N.I.A. supplies trophies-awards for Convention. The Conventions are the profit or loss of the Hosts. They must abide by N.I.A. rules and the N.I.A. should be strong enough to help the hosts with supplying the trophies and awards. In time they should be able to handle all N.I.A. awards for Regionals and then Sanctioned Shows.

No doubt you have seen my press releases advertising a group rate for West Coast collectors to fly to Cleveland for the 7th National Insulator Association Convention. There is only one experience that is more fun than attending a convention while attending the convention!

I'm sure we all agree that Cleveland is quite a distance to travel. It will probably take 4 or 5 days driving; fighting all the Bicentennial tourists - not to mention the heat and humidity. And when the convention day is finished, you have only to return to your camper shell for the evening. It doesn't sound all that exciting does it?

Would not a 4 hour flight with meals letting you arrive fresh and relaxed sound more inviting? And how about staying at a luxury hotel for \$26 double, \$20 single with all the comforts rounding off your convention stay?

To make this become a reality for you, just clip the bottom portion of this letter and return to me with your deposit. This will assure you of a care free convention without all the hassles and dangers of cross country driving.

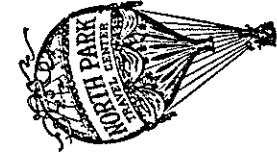
The flights have been set up on the basis of a group of 40 people minimum; Any less and the group rate does not apply. The current group rate is \$221.00 round trip per person. Normal coach round trip air fare is \$340.00 These rates are subject to change by the airline. All flights are morning departures.

Now to answer a few questions you may be asking:

CHILDREN: Fly for the same price. Babies under 2 years fly free. BAGGAGE: You are allowed 3 bags free with each bag not weighing more than 79 lbs. each. Bag #1 must not exceed the dimension total of 62" (height x length x width) Bag #2 must not exceed 55" total. Bag #3 will be carried on board in the cabin under the seat. The dimensions must not exceed 45" (23"x13"x9"). Extra baggage can be taken at \$5.00 per bag with the 70 lbs. limit applying.

INSURANCE: This is advisable; both trip cancellation and baggage insurance is available at nominal cost. We will supply you with the necessary forms for your inspection. HOTEL: The Marriott Hotel is lowering their rates to \$20 single and \$26 double occupancy.

The Hospitality Inn's rate is \$21 single and \$27.50 double. Both hotels will be providing free transportation to and from the airport. The Marriott Hotel is willing to offer shuttle assistance to and from the convention at an equitable charge, to be determined later, depending on the volume of people.

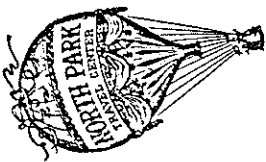
Again, let me stress the fact that for this rate we need at least 40 people per flight. If we all get together and attend, California will be well represented to the rest of the convention. On to Cleveland!
