

Our treasurer, Rod Krupka, Is in England as I write this so I have to inform you members that were not in attendance at the general membership meeting on Friday, June 7th, that those members who were present, by reccomendation of the NIA board, voted to raise the annual dues to \$8.00 per year. No other changes were made at this time in the dues schedule. The new membership fee will become effective April 6th, 1986.

If fewer than 5 percent of the current NIA membership gives written objection to the proposed ammendment, within 90 days of the mailing of this issue, then the new annual fee shall be ratified. Direct any letters to me personally. My address is on the inside of the front cover.

And speaking of dues, Rod asked me to remind you that if you have not renewed yet, to do so now. We have computer generated the mailing list, so if your mailing label is any other color than white, your membership has expired as of April 1st 1985 (4 months ago!), and this will be your last issue of DRIP POINTS.

We need this money to cover postage costs, not to mention all the other things the NIA uses your membership dues for. So please, If you have not renewed, I urge you to do it now! You will find a membership renewal application enclosed in this issue of DRIP POINTS.


Also, I'd like each of you to check your address label for errors. If there are any misspellings or corrections that need to be made, please write me with the correct information.


FROM THE INFORMATION DIRECTOR:


FROM THE SHOW STANDARDS CHAIRMAN:


FROM THE NOMINATION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN:



FROM THE HISTORIAN:


Hello everyone, I am Chris Hedges and I am your newly appointed historian. I have just been amazed at the vast history of the NIA files and library contain.



Each member, if not a subscriber to the magazine "Insulators--Crown Jewels of the Wire", will receive a copy of the March issue of that publication which serves as the name-and-address directory of all NIA members. Subject to the availability of March copies, new members may have to await the succeeding March directory issue.

New members are entitled to all membership privileges immediately upon payment of current dues. Regular and Junior members receive all NIA mailings including the quarterly newsletter, membership directory and membership handbook. Family members do not receive duplicates of these mailings to the same address, but do receive the membership card.

A current membership allows a member to display and purchase a sales table at NIA National Conventions and assures admittance to the show on the first day, Friday, which is limited to NIA members only.
