

FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Fellow NIA members,

It is very satisfying to see the number of new collectors (and re-interested "closet" collectors) who have been popping up at shows throughout the country. Every time I talk to someone from another geographic region, I hear the same thing: lots of traffic, lots of sales, lots of interest in the hobby. I have also been hearing another popular comment: "Nothing good for sale." This may be looked at in one of two ways. Either the "quality" merchandise is selling too fast (and maybe too inexpensively) or there are more finicky collectors around who won't settle for anything less than "Number A-I Grade." I think a little of both has contributed but certainly foreign insulators, commemoratives and porcelain have become much more popular recently as a result of the escalating price of glass.

Over the past 15 months since I became NIA President, Mike Bruner has acted as Membership Committee Chairman. This was partly because I resurrected the position with rather short notice and because no one "jumped up" to take the job. John deSousa has agreed to take on the responsibilities of Membership Committee Chairman and I re-welcome him to the NIA staff... re-welcome because John was Eastern Region Vice-President from 1980–1986. 


Here in Illinois & neighboring Missouri it seems that the few remaining open wire telephone lines are coming down all too quickly. Working fast (every weekend) my son Seth & I go "insulator hunting." Seth is four years old and gets a big kick out of it and is building a collection of his own. Our travels have taken us to Springfield, Illinois and Stanton, Mo., and all points between. With as many lines as are coming down, I realize that all too soon they will be gone. Our finds have been relatively common but the common insulators get me just as excited as a rare one if it's one I don't have yet. So far we have found several CB 145 H.G. Petticoats, many 151's, 214's, 147's, 233's, 252's etc.

One Sunday in late September I went to a line coming down in the "general vicinity" of Springfield, Illinois. After what seemed like endless walking, I turned up a some nice CB 151 H.G.'s and Brookie's', 147's, some 162's and a few CB 145 Hemingrays and Olive Green Stars (Stars are not very common in these parts). Hy 16 foot aluminum ladder (my means of "climbing") was getting so heavy I thought my arm was going to fall off but I was determined that I wasn't going to travel this far from home (approx. 110 miles) without finding something good. When I was just about to give up I spotted from a short distance something different than what had graced the poles for the last miles. As I got closer my heart began pounding. It was like a CB 147 but different. I got my binoculars out and confirmed my suspicions..it was a CB 150!! As I climbed to pole and reached the treasure it was found to

be embossed "Brookfield" and my 'find' for the weekend was now a reality.

In my travels every insulator I have found has been special to me, especially the different CD 145's but the Brookfield 150 is the best yet. Meedless to say, the hunt goes on !!!!!!!!




