
From the Executive Director

Seek out and encourage new members in your region. Tell them about the NIA, CROWN JEWELS magazine, available books on insulators and shows in their area. Twenty-Second National Insulator Convention Minutes of Business Meeting Sheraton Hotel Cedar Rapids, Iowa

The Nineteenth General Meeting of the National Insulator Association was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by President Eric Halpin, who greeted the more than 85 members in attendance.

Board Members and Committee Chairpersons present were introduced by the President, including the newly appointed Eastern Region Vice-President, Dick Bowman, who will serve out the unexpired term of Jeff McCurty. This year's National Show Hosts, Larry and Pat Whitlock, Paul and Carol Ickes and Dennis and Jeanne Weber were then introduced.

Old Business:

The Minutes of the Eighteenth General Meeting held in Portland, Oregon and published in "Drip Points" in the October 1990 issue of <u>Crown Jewels</u> were approved.

The results of the 1990 Election for Western Region Vice-President were confirmed by the President and Steve Watkins was introduced as the new Western Vice-President.

The Treasurer's report was presented and reviewed by Ross Huth. Year-end balance as of June 30, 1991 was \$9,513.85.

New Business:

Executive Director Bernie Warren announced the locations of the 1992 NIA shows:

The Eastern National will be held in Orlando, Florida on June 19-21, 1992. Len and Jacqueline Linscott, assisted by Chuck and Sis Haymond, are Show Hosts.

The Central Regional will be held in London, Ohio on November 7-8, 1992. Steve and Lois Blair are the Show Hosts.

The Western Regional will be held in Enumclaw, Washington on May 2-3, 1992. Andy and Violet Brown are Show Hosts.

Duane Davenport, Nominations Committee Chairman, announced the results of the recent election for Central Region Vice-President. Marilyn Albers, winner of that election, was introduced and gave a short acceptance speech.

The President shared some of the highlights of the Thursday evening Board Meeting with the membership. Major points covered included:

"Drip Points" - will be published independently of "Crown Jewels" by the NIA effective with the October issue. This should allow the NIA to expand "Drip Points" and include more informative articles. Don Reinke, Information Director, will be in charge of "Drip Points" production.

2) Computer purchase - the Board of Directors approved the expenditure of \$1,000-\$2,000 + to purchase a new computer for the Membership Director's use.

3) Membership Handbook - the existing Membership Handbook will be updated and a new Handbook published in the near future.

4) Promotion of the Hobby - a concerted effort to promote our Hobby, both within and outside the normal channels of advertising was discussed. Mike Guthrie, who will Chair this project for the Board, spoke on a couple of his ideas.

Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America Merit Badge Idea - Jacqueline Linscott will Chair this project and check into the feasibility of insulator collecting as a merit project for Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

6) Change in Membership Year to Calendar Year - Kevin Lawless will check into the pros and cons of changing the Membership Year from March 31 to January 1.

Kevin Lawless reminded members of the Eastern Regional to be held at Meriden, Conn. August 24-25. He introduced Doug MacGillvary, Co-Host, who gave a short report on Show preparations and particulars.

Jacqueline and Len Linscott, Show Hosts for the 1992 Eastern National at Orlando, Florida were introduced and shared some of their planning for the 1992 National Show with the members.

A member questioned whether "Drip Points" should provide rebuttal space for comments or articles that are printed. The President announced that Don Reinke will edit material to be published in "Drip Points". The President suggested that regional Vice-Presidents be involved in any misunderstandings and that members may write Don Reinke to have material published in "Drip Points".

A member questioned the size and type of computer to be purchased for the Membership Director's use. IBM P.C. versus Apple/Macintosh was discussed extensively with the membership indicating by show of hands that the great majority used IBM computers. Interested members were invited to meet with Kevin Lawless and Duane Davenport to discuss the type of computer to be purchased.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:00 p.m. until June 19, 1992 in Orlando, Florida.



- 1) If you collected insulators <u>before</u> you discovered shows, C.J. and/or the NIA--did you <u>read</u> something which led to your "full exposure" to the hobby? If so, what was the publication which started it all for you?
- 2) Do you read any antique periodicals other than Crown Jewels of the Wire? If so, what are they? It would be greatly appreciated if you would send a copy or at least the mailing address of the periodical(s).

- 3) Do you know of any utility company or employee group newsletter which would publish either an article or an advertisement about the hobby? If so, a copy/address would be appreciated.
- 4) Do you know of any trade journal(s) which would publish either an article or an advertisement about the hobby? If so, a copy/address would be appreciated.
- 5) Do you have any other suggestions about ways of advertising the hobby which would target groups which have a high probability of containing insulator collectors?

RESEARCH SERVICE

Are you interested in the history of the insulator hobby? What do those patent numbers mean? How can you get a copy of a patent? How can you learn more about a specific company such as Hemingray, Brookfield, Fred Locke, Imperial, etc? Now there is a research service available. I have collected a great deal of information about our hobby and want to share it with you. All you have to do is ask.

My research files include: Jack Tod's files, more than 250 original and Xerox copies of insulator catalogs, nearly 500 trade journal articles from 1879-1935, over 340 advertisements (some of the better ones have appeared in Crown Jewels and my multipart insulator book), 30 reference books about early telegraph and power transmission, copies of 1050 insulator patents, 36 design patents, plus 34 trademarks and detailed information about more than 100 early power lines.

If you want information about your specialty, or have a question or patent that you want me to research, please ask. My research library is available to you. There is a small fee to cover cost of copies, shipping, and to purchase additional materials. Copies of patents are \$1.00 each and other copies are 25 cents per page (\$1.00 minimum). All copies are sent postpaid and unfolded. If you wish to trade Xerox copies of catalogs or other information, there is no charge for the service.

The offer of this research service will be available indefinitely. I will also accept donations of research materials or purchase them if you want. I feel that the hobby should have a central research library available to everyone. Please consider this service your window to the past, and a way to preserve and share knowledge of our hobby.
