FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings Fellow NIA Members,

Positive reports are coming in from across the country! New insulator clubs are organizing thanks to the persistence of a few dedicated collectors. From large shows, to small informal backyard gatherings, collectors have been actively buying and trading from an excellent assortment of common to rare glass and porcelain. Enthusiasm for the hobby appears to be strong, even though the recession has cut into the collecting habits of many collectors. If your budget is preventing you from attending shows, consider pulling a few unappreciated insulators from your collection for trading. An increase in insulator trading has been observed recently, due in part to a noteworthy new monthly publication, *Rainbow Riders' Trading Post*. I'd like to encourage all of you to continue supporting your local shows. You can always find some excuse for attending, whether it be to buy, sell, trade, learn, or just visit with your fellow collectors. Shows are always a guaranteed good time, so don't miss out on the fun and excitement coming your way soon!

I am pleased to announce the implementation of the NIA donation and silent auction program. All proceeds from this program will be used for various projects aimed at promoting our hobby. In brief, the program will operate as follows:

- Monetary Donations--You may make monetary donations directly to the NIA Treasurer. Please specify that the donation is for the promotions program.
- Insulator Donations--You may donate any desirable insulator(s), glass or porcelain. All insulators will be auctioned on an annual basis at the NIA National show. If you wish, you may include your name and/or a minimum bid amount on your insulator(s). All unmarked items will be assigned a minimum bid amount at the NIA's discretion.
- Silent Auction Rules--Participants may bid at any time and as many times as they wish during the course of the auction. The auction will be open for at least two days during the National. Bids will be entered on an open sheet with each bidder entering his name and bid amount. The auction will close at a predetermined time and the participant with the highest bid on any given item at closing, will take delivery of that item.

Further details will be available at the auction table.

Let's have some fun with this! Remember, the sole purpose of this program is to provide the means for educating the world about our hobby. We have already received two cash donations from our membership. These funds are earmarked for several promotional and educational projects that are currently "in the

works". These soon-to-be-announced projects will be a tremendous benefit to the hobby and also to you, the collectors. If you would like to become more involved in promoting our hobby, contact our Promotions and Education Director, Kevin Lawless, for more information.

Please be aware that the membership due's renewal date is now January 1. When renewing your dues (\$10.00), all 1992 paid up members will receive a coupon in the amount of \$2.50 in credit towards an upcoming NIA membership or when purchasing NIA merchandise. Junior members will receive a \$1.00 coupon. (Proxy members will not receive a coupon.) Please realize that you could now run the risk of being dropped from the mailing list as a delinquent member if you are one of those that previously waited until the National to pay your dues. You wouldn't want to miss a single issue of Drip Points would you? Let's make our membership chairman's job a little easier this year and renew on time.

The NIA is always searching for "new blood" for its ranks of officers and chair-persons. Are you aware that all positions--other than those of the president and regional vice presidents--are appointed annually by the current president? Do you wonder why certain members hold the same position year after year? It's certainly not an attempt to form an elitist's group! Ask any officer in an appointed position or any chairperson if you can have their job at their term's end. FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Australia Revisited - This writer has just returned from an extensive, 12,000 kilometer insulator research tour in Australia. I am very pleased to report that insulator collecting is not only alive and well but growing in the land down under.

This trip was highlighted by visits with twelve enthusiastic, dedicated collectors, including early pioneer collectors Laura Monckton, Dawn Hole and Dean Newbery. Many of the relative newcomers to the Hobby already have nice collections of porcelain and glass insulators as both are actively sought by collectors in Australia.

No new CD numbers or U-numbers were found on this trip but several new or previously unreported color variations were located. Some of these included CD 121 no names in rich burgundy - rose, CD 154 AGEE in mauve, CD 490 AGEE Type I and Type II bells in a deeper S.C.A. and CD 490 AGEE Typing I bells with 4 drip points in rich S.C.A. Porcelain finds included some U-1160 types in a lovely, Robin's egg blue and, although not a new find, certainly worth reporting, the location of some late 1800's U-1502 types with the classic "W.M. WARDEN AND CO/WESTMINSTER" (England) embossing.

This fabulous trip ended with a two day visit with Kieran and Sheryll Shanahan in Auckland on the return flight to Alaska. Kieran is the premier insulator collector in New Zealand and a long time subscriber to Crown Jewels.

FROM THE CENTRAL REGION VICE-PRESIDENT

This is an issue that concerns all of us and I think it needs to be addressed. Since the beginning of our hobby, a lot of happy selling and trading has been going on between collectors on both sides of the American/Canadian border.. In recent years, we have also discovered collectors in Australia, New Zealand, England, Germany, Czechoslokia, etc. In cases where there is an actual amount of money due in payment for insulators, books, shipping, etc., almost without exception, buyers realize there is an exchange rate to be considered and they have sent the correct amount to the seller in a form that can easily be converted to cash without having to pay a penalty. In other words, when I order an insulator from a Canadian collector, my payment should be either a Postal Money Order or International Bank Draft in Canadian funds, because if it isn't in that form, it will either be too little, or too much (Heaven forbid!). The same courtesy is due to me if the situation is reversed. If someone in Canada orders a book from me and pays for it with a personal check in Canadian dollars, my bank charges me a "collection" fee of \$7.50, which is automatic upon deposit of that check. That kind of thing leaves me with a puzzled look on my face. I don't think that anyone is being dishonest, it's just that we don't always think! Even St. Marilyn has been guilty of mailing a letter to Canada with a .29 stamp on it (should be .40) and I even had the audacity to include an SASE with a .29 stamp! I was grateful to the recipient for kindly explaining to me that he had to pay "postage due" to get my letter, and that he was sorry but he just couldn't use my return postage. I actually lived in Canada for 9 years of my adult life, and you'd think I'd be smarter than that. I was totally embarrassed, but I have not forgotten the lesson. I guess my mesage is that, upon occasion, some of you have "eaten" the difference between what is due and what is paid, and it doesn't have to be that way if we will just all just try to be a little more aware. Remember that you do have the right to expect the correct amount, and that is isn't impolite to remind the person you are dealing with.

Yankee Polecat picnic at Larry Emmons: Reports indicate great turn out and the usual Emmons' hospitality. The Chesapeake Bay Club held a swap meet at John Hunsaker's home with a report of good turnout and good times. National Bottle Expo in Toledo, OH: Although not in the eastern region, I was there with about 6-7 other insulator dealers. Great show, but the insulator collectors were conspicuous by their absence. up out there gang! There were many good insulators & LRBs for sale and some good finds that came from non insulator tables. The CDIC show is coming up in late October and even though not in this region, many of us think of the London OH show as part of us. Support it again this year; it's a good one.

Summer finds: I know there are many more, but how about a new threadless find. Four porcelain beehive shaped ones turned up recently at a mojor eastern flea. They have a grey glaze on them and the concentric rings on the base like Elliots. They are likely of Bennington origin. A cobalt CD 724 surfaced as a result of a flea markey contact as did a CD 738. At a recent (terrible) auction in the rain, I was foraging through a box lot of junk insulators and found a CD 121 Hawley on the bottom and another broken. Since I did not care to stay, I had a friend bid for me and he managed to get the 121 for a good price from the high bidder. Collecting is sort of like the "Field of Dreams". If you are there. they will come. Believe it.

I'm hearing a report of a new insulator club possibly being formed in the Atlanta area. This sounds great as there are a lot of collectors not that far from Atlanta.

Communications: Hey out there, I need more info about goings on. I'm pretty well in touch with the hobby, but please don't assume I know about something you would like to share with others. It's a two edged sword though. If you are not getting what you want out from me (or any of the Region VPs) let us know. When we took this job, I like to think we did it with our eyes open and knowing what was expected of us. There are some fine handouts available for you to promote the hobby with and to give to new or prospective collectors. Clarice Gordon has a couple of good ones she will send you a copy of for you to duplicate (see her note in CJ) and there is NIA handout material available from any Board member and Crown Jewels and book material available from the McDougald's. Why not get a supply of these, run a few extra and have them with you at shows or in

your car when traveling? If it is more convenient, get a few from me or your regional VP if not in the East. They either have them or can get them.

One last item. This hobby is healthy contrary to what some may write. It's like your body in that it has all the right stuff to function at full throttle, but needs to be exercised to reach it's full potential. Use it or lose it! Think positively. Don't always believe some of the stuff you read and always consider the source.

The NIA board regrettably has decided to publish the name of the following collector that has exhibited repeated and blatant unethical practices in the Spring of 1992. Mr. DeVaux refused to accept the return of the damaged insulator and refund the purchase price, refuses to discuss the matter with either the buyer or the NIA, and has refused to acknowledge any wrong doing in the most basic rule of trade; namely, THE DEAL IS NOT COMPLETE UNTIL THE BUYER IS SATISFIED.


