

FIRST ANNUAL GOLD COAST INSULATOR MEET by Marion Milholland

Many of our old, plus several new friends were there. Mr. A. W. Merrell, Jr. and Mr. Charles Glasgow sponsored the meet, and it was held at A. W. Merrell's place of business-501 Monceaux Road in West Palm Beach.

A real nice turnout and a real pleasant and busy day. Many insulators exchanged hands. However, while no ribbons or prizes were going to be awarded, the Crown Jewels sent a ribbon for first place showing and Gerald Brown sent along a copy of his new book for second best showing. Somehow it became my great honor to be the sole judge and it became my decision that the Crown Jewels of the Wire ribbon be given to Mr. John A. Slagle of Parker, PA. The second award for a real lovely display was the "New Gerald Brown Porcelain Book" and was given to James and Lora Robbins of Montgomery, Alabama.

Nov. 21, 1898--This was the first successful test involving transmission of telephone and telegraph messages on the same wire. The test took place on lines between Baltimore and Pittsburg. The lines were owned by the B. &O. R.R.

Oct. 23, 1894-Western Union Telegraph Co. bought out American Rapid Telegraph Co. The cost was \$550,000's worth of Western Union stock.

The 1973 membership directory is now in the final stages of preparation and will be mailed to all members in the next few weeks.

Charlie Irons, Videt President of EIC has announced plans for the first annual insulator show for Delaware. The show is scheduled for April 29. EIC club members are welcome and will receive a reduced table rate for the show.

Plans are underway for our annual fall show and swap meet. We are working on guidelines for various categories and are open to suggestions for making this the best show yet. Copies of the changes by Mr. N.R. Woodward in the CD numbering system are available from the Club. Please contact Jim Barron.

The Club has a commitment to the "SLUSH" fund for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the appropriation of J. Paul Kelly's collection. We encourage the added support of Club membership in Paul's efforts to recover his collection. Please let our Secretary, Peg Hotton, know if you can support our efforts.

The Eastern Insulator Club was organized to provide a common communications link between insulator collectors in the East and elsewhere in the country.

We're pleased to report as of this writing that the EIC has 95 members from 21 states and the District of Columbia.

Members of the Club receive certain benefits which are of invaluable assistance to both advanced and beginning collectors. Such benefits as a club direct-

ory (two issues per year), reduced admission and table fees at all Club sanctioned shows, book discounts, advertising discounts and first hand information on recent developments in our hobby are among a few of the advantages offered.

The Club constitution provides for the establishment of individual state chapters when a state has ten (10) or more members. Virginia and Maryland have already qualified and New Jersey is almost there. State chapters may elect their own Vice-President, who automatically becomes a member of the Executive Board, and thus has a voice in the future of the Club's direction. We would like to extend our congratulations to CROSS ARMS on their first anniversary celebration and wish them continued success in the years ahead. As our hobby continues to grow we anticipate a growing dependence on CROSS ARMS as our official spokesman.

Sept. 14, 1894--The wind blew down a tree in Cunberland County, Maine. The tree was the first telegraph station in the U.S. It was used by Morse and Smith while experimenting with the telegraph during its development.

Morse tried at first to rent a barn from a farmer but the superstitious New Englander would have no parts of it. Public pressure from the people forced Morse to run his lines in underground conduit to a distant tree. The farmers felt that aerial wires attracted evil spirits.

RAMS HORNS ON THE PRR

Excerpt from the W.B. Wilson's "From the Hudson to the Ohio, 1902".

"In 1856, the PRR had completed its line of track from Harrisburg to Pittsburg and constructed track from its own line of telegraph through to Philadelphia.

Prior to 1855, the PRR used the wires of the Atlantic and Ohio Telegraph Co.

Jan. 1, 1855, the PRR had constructed and put into service, the first division of its independent line between Pittsburg and Altoona.


The second division between Altoona and Harrisburg was completed by Jan. 1, 1856.

The last division from Harrisburg to Philadelphia was completed April 1, 1856.

The line consisted of poles with double cross-arms and iron bound, paraffin-covered, glass insulators, carrying a single No. 9 galvanized wire. Its total cost was \$45,198.03 or about \$128 per mile."

"There were no tie wires and when the line wire broke, it would slide through the holes in the insulators for nearly half a mile." A quote from John Emerick to the "Telegraph Age" 1896, as he recalled some of the problems of 1862 telegraph maintenance.

THE FIRST TELEGRAPH

Samuel F.B. Morse, a young American artist was returning from Europe aboard a packet ship named Scully. During the trip (October, 1832), he was introduced to the "electro-magnet" by Charles Thomas Jackson. The elector-magnet was a European invention and considered a toy by most people.

A segment of Morse's background which included an electrical course which he took in 1827 helped him to recognize the potential of the electro-magnet and by the end of 1832 he had recorded in his notes most of the essential telegraph theory.

The first telegraph receiver was not a small simple machine as most of us tend to picture it. It was an elaborate clock work type machine which not only sounded the dots and dashes, but also recorded them on paper. An example of its size--"the coils on the first telegraph receiver weighed 187 lbs each."

From 1832 until 1837, Morse experimented with, and perfected his idea. He was assisted by Prof. Joseph Henry Jackson and Alfred Vail. Prof. Jackson helped with mechanical problems. Vail helped Morse financially. Alfred Vail is also credited with perfecting the dots and dash system known as the Morse Code.

In 1837 Morse filed for a patent with the U.S. Patent Office. He also traveled to England and France in an attempt to get patents there but failed in both countries.

In March, 1843, Morse received a \$30,000 grant from Congress to be used to build a "telegraphic link be-


tween Baltimore and Washington, D. C. " Morse was the Superintendent with a salary of \$2,500 a year. Alfred Vail was his assistant at \$3 a day plus expenses.

Vail started building the line using underground lead conduit and cotton covered wire (a European method). This failed because of poor insulation. Vail then took Morse's advice to use poles with wires strung overhead.

Ezra Cornell (founder of Cornell University) received the contract to erect the poles and string the wire. "Cornell belted the last insulator at Mount Clare in Baltimore on May 23, 1844."

"A Grove battery of 100 cups" provided the power the next day to send the famous message "What hath God wrought."

- Foot notes: 1. All the information including quotes were researched from "Telegraph Age" 1892 and 1893.
 - 2. The money Ezra Cornell received from the Morse contract started his fortune.
 - 3. The fact that Morse was refused patents in England and France points to the controversy among countries and inventors as to who truly invented the telegraph.







"COLLECTIBLE PORCELAIN INSULATORS" Second Edition-by Gerald Brown of Two Buttes, Colorado.


This soft back, ring bound book is 8 1/2" X 11" and contains 169 pages. The book lists over 700 insulators sketched (some pictures) along with their descriptions, prices and information. All drawings are 1/2 size unless noted. Included are some 50 excerpts and sketches from the U.S. Patent Office Gazette.

Mr. Brown makes good use of the index. In it he lists almost 100 different insulator company names and assorted nicknames.

In my opinion his pricing method is questionable and I don't agree with his numbering system but all told—the book does serve the purpose of educating the collector and exposing him to different shapes, colors and embossings that he can set his sights on.

I must compliment Gerald because rather than publish a supplement to his first book, he decided to combine his first book along with all the new information he has come up with, and publish this complete book "COL-LECTIBLE PORCELAIN INSULATORS" Second Edition.

PATENT INFORMATION

SAMUEL OAKMAN Patent No. 304,748, Sept. 9, 1884.

Be it known that I, Samuel Oakman of Melrose, in the county of Middlesex and State of Massachusetts, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Molds for Making Glass Insulators....

My invention relates to the method of withdrawing the "screw points" of an insulator-mold, the object being to so construct the point that it will make a full screw and be collapsible so that the point may be withdrawn without turning it....

Fig. 4 is a section of an insulator with the hinged part of the core collapsed ready for withdrawal....

Editor's note: This patent by the "father of the insulator," Samuel Oakman is undoubtly the method that American Insulator Companyused to thread their insulators. I've seen several Americans that actually show the hinge bolt mark inside the pin-hole.

Why the American Insulator Company only used this particular threading style instead of full threads is still an unanswered question.

Article from "Telegraph Age" Feb. 1898. Gutta-Percha is produced from the sap of the Isonandra-Gutta, a large forrest tree growing on the Malayan Peninsula. Presently used as an electrical insulator.




HOMER BROOKE Patent No. 154, 541, August 25, 1874.

Be it known that I, Homer Brooke, of New York, in the county of New York and the State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Insulators....

It consists of an insulator made of a single piece of glass, and provided upon its top with projecting lugs or ears, under which the telegraph-wire is held in grooves. These ears each have a small groove under them, and these grooves are not on a straight line with each other, so that, as the wire is passed into them, it is curved or crimped to prevent its slipping longitudinally through the same. In addition to the ears or lugs upon the top, my insulator is provided with the usual circumferential groove near the top...

...It will effectually hold the main wire without the time, trouble, and expense of tying the wire thereto (as is now done) by means of an additional piece of wire...

Fig. 1 represents a side view, and Fig. 2 a plan view.

... These ears are not all formed on the same side, and the ends of those on the one side project beyond the ends of those on the other side...






