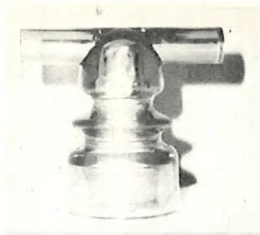
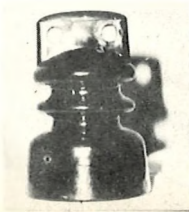
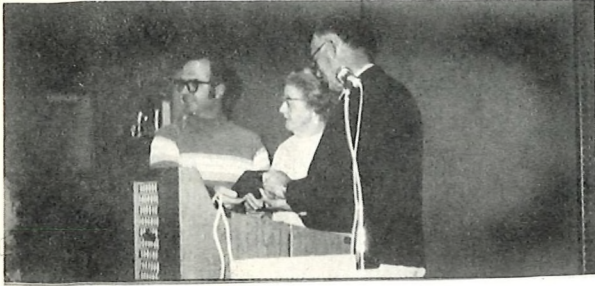
San Diego Club Show

The year 1975, is going to be a BIG YEAR for insulator collectors in the San Diego area. The year began in grand style at the first Insulator Collectors Club-San Diego County meeting on January 8th. Maury Tasem called to order the largest assembled body of collectors. We were very happy to have two very special guests-Marion and Evelyn Milholland, who are very dedicated to make our hobby greater with each passing day. The ICCSDC members realize and appreciate their efforts, so in behalf of the Club, Maury presented them with a special designed plaque encribed "Marion & Evelyn Milholland, For Dedicated Service, Insulator Collectors Club San Diego County. 1975."

With the presence of the Milhollands, all collectors were asked to bring insulators not listed in any books. Well, the response was SUPER! There were 3 different CD 252-3 Knowles and 3 Hemingray 42's with main difference in size. Four new foreign glass insulators were also introduced, A CD 287 with no protruding interskirt, crown top number, back No. 135 with front ghost embossed F.M. Locke with patent dates in emerald green color. The biggest find was in the Maydwell insulators with ghost embossing of McLaughlin. It was learned they appear in CD's 106, 122, 154, 162, 164, and milk glass as well. It is theory now,

but there must be one in CD's 115, 121, 160, and 252 and questions about the Castles are forming. It is not known how many insulators have the ghost embossing or blocked out, but for us in the West, these insulators are priced "open." Also introduced was the Commemorative insulator for the 6th NIA Convention-it's true ruby red and a super gem!!



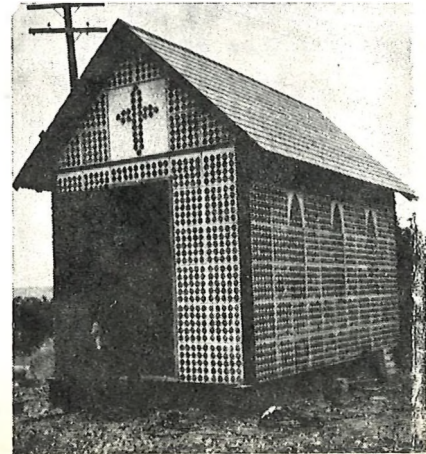

About one year ago a friend, who is a glass maker and who collects a few glass insulators, came to my table at the Washington Court House, Flea market and showed me an article in a book. (Bottle Makers and Their Names by Jullian Harrison, published by Toulouse). The article is as follows:

Another Ohio Valley Glass Co.

appeared in 1905 at Pleasant City, Ohio near Cambridge. It was apparently a renaming of the Pleasant City Glass Works whose listing in the 1904 directory stated that it had one continuous tank with 5 rings, made insulators and battery jars and had as officers B. L. Kilgour, Pres., P. S. Keichly, secy., and treas., and Wm Cleis, manager. The 1905 directory listed O. V. G. Co as having 5 rings on the one tank making Insulators and Battery Jars and with officers H. E. Cobb, president, H. E. Stephenson, Vice President, W. B. Stein, Secretary and J. B. Sullivan, treasurer and manager. Neither were listed again.

Now armed with this information, another friend, John Bartley of Springfield, Ohio and one of his friends journeyed to Pleasant City and Lo and Behold they found evidence around a factory that establishes without a doubt that OVG Co insulators were indeed made there.



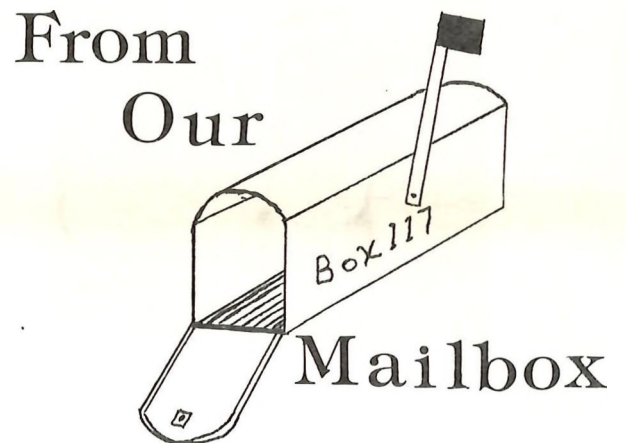
Not only did they find pieces of OVG insulators but also they found partially formed insulators and the usual chunks of slag glass that accompany such operations.

I thought you might want to put the following pictures and article in your CROSS ARMS.

Picture 1 is a two ft. portion of a telephone pole set in 1905.

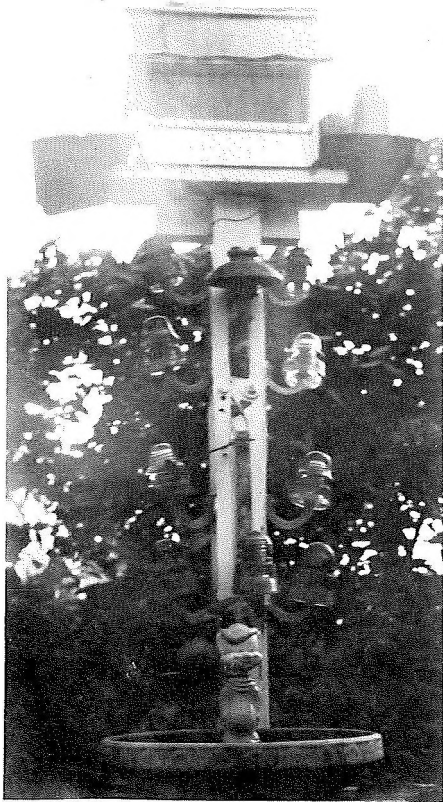


The pole supported telephone wires for a good many years. As you can see the pole was used by woodpeck-

ers to store their acorns. They are over 200 holes in this small portion of pole.

We put peanuts in the holes and a blue jay comes and pulls them out daily.

Picture No. 2 is 5 ft. of the old wood-peck pole. They are over 800 woodpecker holes in this section (5 ft) of pole.

Dear CROSS ARMS,

I just picked up a CD 216 W. T.512U in clear. I've never seen one before. Can you tell me what it is worth?

Dear Anna,

Price wise your insulator is probably worth only about \$5.00 tops, but color-wise you've got a good deal. When low voltage lines (220V) are run on a cross arm, 4 lines are run. 3 hot lines and 1 common. The practice was to run the common line insulators in a different color than the hot live ones. So in your case, the line was probably run in amber 512's with clear being the common line insulator. That gives your color of clear a rarity ratio of 3 to 1.

Dear Jim:

A friend at work handed me an interesting insulator the other day, a CD 102 seven up green embossed with a very small diamond. The interesting feature is a rubber ring around the bottom of the wire groove embossed STEBER. A cross section would look like this . The purpose I suspect is to help hold the wire and cushion it from the glass. Perhaps it is a common item but I have never seen or heard of such an item before. My friend could not remember where it came from as he has been handed items such as this for years in his work with railways.

Your find is not common. The rubber piece probably was designed as a shock absorber between the insulator and the wire. Here's hoping our Canadian readers can help with the name, STEBER.

I keep wondering if an article might appear explaining what the following denote on insulators? U. S. L. D.: TYPE 1; DP-1, T. S., T. W., S. B.; DRY SPOT; CARRIER SERVICE A, O, C, etc. 51-C1 etc. and the D in the 512's & 513's, 990 etc.

Dear Wendell;

Most of the numbers embossed on insulators are a manufacturer number used by them much in the same manner as we collectors use CD numbers. An exception to this is the carrier circuit insulators. The first letter C. stands for carrier circuit. The second letter which would be S., M. or W. stands for steel pin-mid span, or wood pin. The A stands for application.

As an example, if you come across a carrier circuit insulator it will probably be a CD 128. If it is embossed C. S. A. that stands for "carrier circuit-steel pin-application."

Compare a Hemi 19, McLaughlin 19. and a Maydwell 19. They are basically the same insulator.

Dear Jim:

Regarding the insulator top left of page 34, Dec. 1974 Cross Arms, this is design patent #22,684 of August 8, 1893 per the enclosed card from my files.

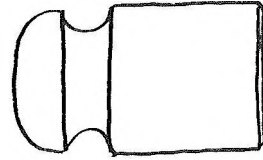
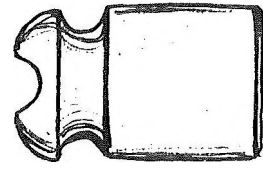
N. R. Woodward mentions in his book (1973, page 10) Standard Glass Insulator manufacturing insulators under "Lawrence B. Gary's Patent Process", and thus the familiar name on this 8-8-93 patent. The only other Gray patent I have in my file during that era is the #514,221 letters patent, and this obviously is not a "process". He naturally may have had other patents and which could easily be looked up in the indexes, but my card file is based on patents of insulators themselves.

Hope that this information will be of interest to you, and I trust you might pass this on to our friend, Mrs. McDon-

ald, who has the insulator in question.

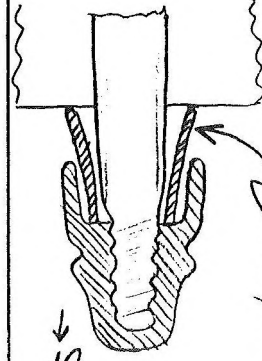

On page 22 of my Supplement I tell of the GLADCO brand of insulators made by the Gladding Co. of San Jose, CA, but I showed no insulator for I had none. This is one that I now have. Notice the black radio proofing on the top. This black is also on the inside of the pin hole. *Gerald Brown*

My "Apathy Editorial" brought forth many comments. The general feeling I get is that individual collectors feel they are helpless or useless.

The easiest way to help the insulator hobby and also the most satisfying is--to organize. I don't mean a formal club with 50 pages of by-laws and 10 elected officers with dues payable every 6 months. I'm talking about a club which would consist of 2 or more members scheduled to meet in one of the members homes. Instead of a president, vice-president, etc., a chairman could be designated at every meeting with the next meeting being scheduled at the appointed chairman's home.

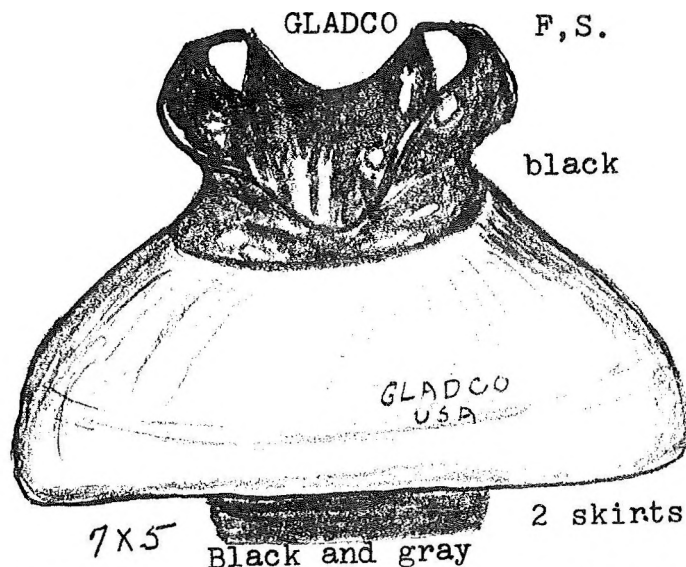
Dues would be "0", with the stipulation that any expenses incurred for club activities be shared equally by all members.

Naturally one of the first goals of a small club is to contact anyone in their area who is interested in collecting and learning about insulators. This would involve running classified ads in the small local papers and inviting interested people to attend a meeting.

An informally conducted meeting (which is just a fancy way of saying "bull session") will start many people becoming interested in our hobby and once a person becomes interested in insulators it's all uphill from there.

The N. I. A. is an important part of the insulator collecting hobby and its future, but we as individuals are the back-bone of the hobby and we are responsible for its growth or demise. The secret is to communicate with, and educate people who seem interested in insulators. We should be a source that people can contact to answer their questions.

With winter upon us, the show and swaps have slowed down, so there is time to think about a club and now is the best time to organize. For your own good--think about it.

Continue to write to me.

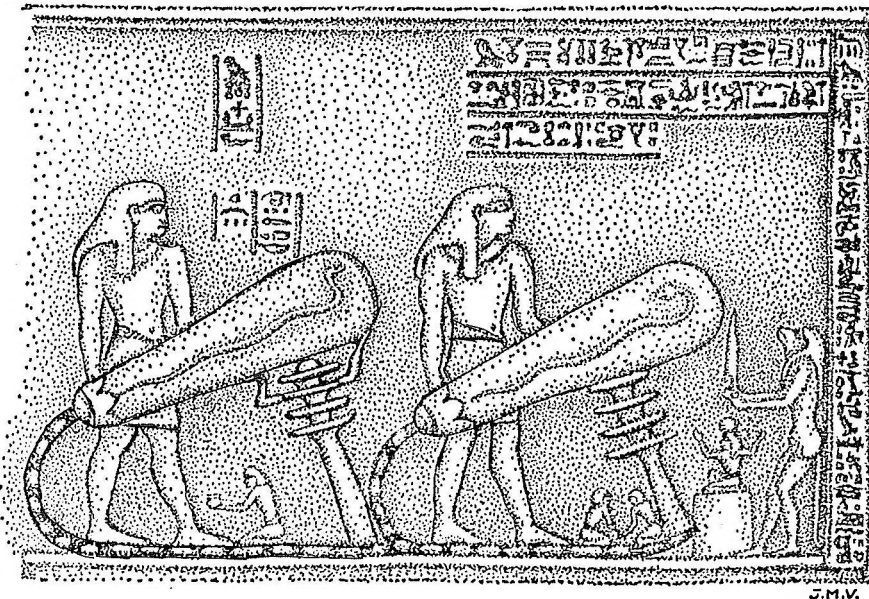

IN

ANCIENT

EGYPT?



Wall carving from the Temple of Hathor at Dendera, Egypt, thousands of years old, showing what were formerly described as "ritual objects" but to a modern eye strongly resemble powerful light bulbs with braided cables attached to what may be a switch or generator. Evidence of knowledge of electricity has been found in different areas of Egypt and the ancient Middle East, together with indications of its use in electroplating and possibly also for illumination.

This sketch is a copy of a wall carving from the Temple of Hathor in Dendera, Egypt. The temple is thousands of years old. The attendants seem to be carrying giant light bulbs which are resting on high tension insulators. The bulbs are connected at their base with what appears to be a heavy cable.

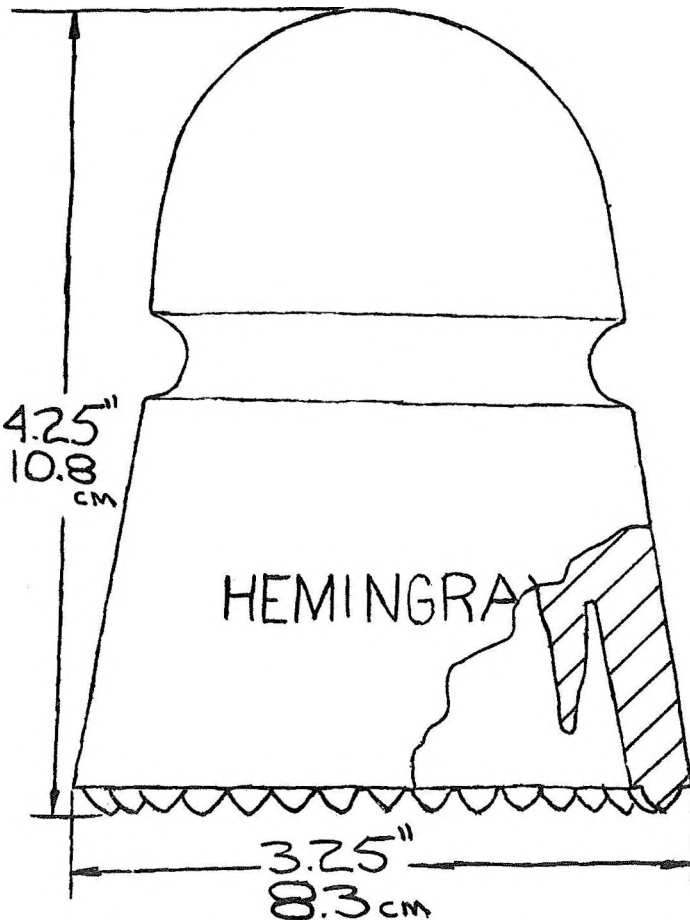
Science is starting to ask a lot of questions about our ancient civilization, and their knowledge of electricity. We know that 2,000 years ago, the Romans and Greeks used torches and oil lamps to illuminate their passageways. Traces of smoke can be found on the ceiling. But in the case of the remote Egyptian civilization, their beautifully carved and painted underground tunnels show no traces of torches or oil lamps on the ceilings. The walls and ceilings of certain Magdalinian and Aurignocian caves in Western Europe where cave

painters executed their masterpieces also show no signs and that was 12,000 to 30,000 years ago. Why don't the caves show torch stains? What are pieces of a wet cell battery (radio carbon dated to 17,000 B. C.) doing in an excavation in Egypt? Perhaps an extremely ancient knowledge, maybe inherited from an early culture but forgotten until it was rediscovered in the 18th century, was used in ancient times for purposes other than electroplating.

The Charter Airline Flight that was to leave from the East and fly to San Diego for the 6th National Insulator Show and N. I. A. Convention has been cancelled due to lack of interest.

The above chart lists, in chronological order, three main variations of this insulator. In later years the drip points were rounded for easier molding and less breakage. This occurred as their value was coming under question & they were becoming just a trademark. The earliest group shown has also been reported with high slim domes as well as the conventional shape. They have been found on railroads in New Hampshire & telephone lines in Texas.

History

Hemingray No. 21 insulators have all been made since about WW I as that is when Hemingray began to number insulators. The beehive design is much older, however & Hemingray had been making this design long before they had No 21 on them. The manufacture continued into the 1940's. This variation of the beehive is not more common because a few years after the number 21 was added, wider insulators such as the Hemingray No42 and Whitall Tatum No 1 gained large acceptance and became the principal long distance insulator mostly because of their longer leakage path.
