Summer Dixie Jewels Swap Meet

The summer Dixie Jewels Insulator Club swap meet, hosted by brothers Bill and Mark Haley, will be held on Saturday, August 16 at the historic Dalton Freight Depot, 305 South Depot Street, Dalton, Georgia from 8:30-3:00 Eastern. The beautifully renovated 100+ year-old Freight Depot sits right beside active Norfolk Southern and CSX tracks, and numerous trains will pass during the day. This is an added attraction if you are an insulator collector who happens to be a railfan. (Conversation is put on hold while train whistles are blowing, but that is considered a plus by many attendees.) There is no charge to set up a sales table and there will be lots of glass and porcelain for sale. Note: Tables will NOT be provided. You must bring your own tables. A noon meal of assorted cold cuts and homemade pimento cheese for sandwiches with all the fixin's, as well as veggie and fruit trays will be served. If you wish to provide additional side dishes, chips, drinks or desserts, it would be appreciated. Don't miss this one! Dalton is a popular meeting location, so expect collectors from all over the southeast. Please contact Bill to let him know you are coming and what you can supply for the meal. DIRECTIONS TO DALTTON FREIGHT DEPOT 305 South Depot St., Dalton, Georgia

Dalton, GA is about 30 miles south of Chattanooga, TN and about 90 miles north of Atlanta, GA, along I-75. Following are directions from I-75

- Take Exit 333 (Walnut Ave.) off I-75 and go east towards Dalton;
- Go approximately 1.8 miles and turn left on Thornton Ave.;
- Go approximately 1/2 mile and turn right onto West Morris Street;
- Go approximately 1/4 mile and turn left just before the railroad tracks;
- Dalton Freight Depot will be immediately in front of you on the right.
- For those unloading, use the south platform at the gate.

<u>NOTE</u>: The old Dalton Railroad Depot, just 2-3 blocks to the north, has been turned into a restaurant. This is NOT where the swap meet will be held. We are at the <u>Dalton Freight Depot</u>.

Remember - Bring Your Own Sales Tables!

PARKING: Park anywhere except in reserved spaces. There is additional parking in the parking garage on the north side of the Freight Depot.

Clark County Fairgrounds, Exit 59 off I-70, (approximately 30 miles east of Dayton, OH)

The 44th annual Mid-Ohio show in Springfield, Ohio will take place Oct. 31-Nov. 2 at the Clark County Fairgrounds, located at exit 59 off I-70, about 30 miles east of Dayton. Hosts will be Lois Blair and Curt Boster. There will be 150 sales tables and 20 displays. Hours will be Friday from 3:00-6:00, Saturday 8:00-4:00, and Sunday 9:00-?. Dealer setup begins promptly at noon on Friday.

There are plenty of additional activities during the show. A community display of CD134 Diamond P insulators, and a "mini-seminar" will be on the stage area of the hall. An insulator collection will be auctioned on Friday afternoon after the show closes. The banquet will be held Saturday evening at the fairgrounds near the show hall, and will feature barbecue. Ray Klingensmith will also present a program featuring vintage photos of insulators in service.

Duane Davenport Display: Petticoats. Jim Overstreet Memorial Award Winner

At each NIA National show the Dixie Jewels Insulator Club awards the Jim Overstreet Memorial Award. which is voted on by all members in attendance. It is given for the best use of North American threaded CD's in a display. There were many fine displays this year and the vote came down to the wire. Duane Davenport's eye-catching and extremely colorful display of Petticoat embossed insulators in many different CD's was the winner of this year's award. Duane's display featured insulators made by Hemingray (H. G. Co.), American Insulator Company and Western Flint Glass Company. His emphasis was on the wide range of color and character of the diverse Petticoat insulators, "much akin to a women's wear store of multicolored, multi-patterened, gingham, plaid or solid color array of dresses." The top photo is an overall view, the bottom shot is the beehive section alone. You should have seen it in person! In addition to the Jim Overstreet Memorial Award, the Missouri Valley Insualtor Club also presented him the Best Use of Midwest Colored Insualtors in a Display award.
