

Yorkville, Illinois Show Report

A very different insulator show was held in Yorkville, Illinois on April 5-6, 2013. Fewer dealers were in attendance than in the past, an auction was held at the end of the show, less porcelain was for sale, a collection of flashlights could be found on one dealer table, an auction was conducted at the show and, despite 73 dealer tables (out of 110 available), the show host reported a loss in running the show.

On the other hand, some things were the same. Many familiar friends were in attendance, only 4 displays were set-up, Richard Case won the award for best display, and I didn't see any insulators that were brought to the show by the walk-in crowd.

How could a show that sold 73 tables lose money? Luckily show host Jason Townsend provided at the show a written breakdown of his revenues and expenses. The 73 dealer tables generated \$2190 at \$30 per table. I don't know if this included the tables for displays or for tables used by the show host. Expenses included \$50 for insurance through the National Insulator Association, \$300 for advertising (flyers, antique & collectable magazine ads), \$600 for the rental of the show hall, \$10 for advertising on eBay, \$1750 for the design of a web page for the show, and \$25 for the domain name. This resulted in a loss of \$545.

I don't think this is so bad. The web page design seems like a one-time expense so if the same number of tables are purchased next year, the show would generate \$1205. Offsetting the lost from this year, the show host would still be ahead by \$660.

The lower participation by dealers may be due to a number of factors. Many of the LRB dealers were absent from the show. Some may have decided to set up at the Kokomo, Indiana LRB show on May 18 instead since that show was hosted by an LRB collector. Some collectors ended up having conflicts that weekend such as Ken Roberts (who usually requested several tables) being unable to attend because his son was graduating that weekend.

One addition to the show was initiated by Rick Soller. On Saturday around noon, Rick ran an auction. Dealers were notified that they could put items in the auction with no seller's premium and buyers were able to buy lots with no buyer's premium. Several tables of insulators and go-withs were auctioned in this way. A total of \$309 was generated by the 33 lots in the auction with results found below:

Columbia City, Illinois Show Report

It has been a while since I attended an insulator show in Columbia City but the May 17-18, 2013 experience made me want to attend again next year. Normally I have to attend graduation on the date but the college where I teach recently instituted a policy whereby attendance by faculty alternates each year and this was the year when I was not required to attend. Thanks to the show hosts of Chuck Dittmar and Gene Hawkins for putting on a great show. I understand that the show's long history dates back to the 1970s when Paul Houpt ran it.

The show was held in a great facility at the Whitley County 4H Fairgrounds. To get to the show, it was a pleasant and easy drive on US-30 through Indiana and then a short, one mile drive south to the location. There were few impediments to wheeling boxes of insulators into the show except for a bump if you're using the side door. Inside, the building was well lighted and spacious yet not so large that it seemed empty.

I found the show hours unusual. On Friday, dealer set-up was from noon to 3 p.m. which was perfect for dealers coming from Chicago since it provided just the right amount of time to get to the show without having to wake up at a much earlier time than usual (except for me since I teach a lot of night classes so don't drag myself out of bed until the morning is well under way). The 6 a.m. -9 a.m. dealer set-up time on Saturday morning were more of a challenge for

Central Time Zone residents as Columbia City is in the Eastern Time zone so the set-up time was equivalent to 5 a.m. to 8 a.m.. Add an hour for showering, dressing, eating, and checking out of the hotel and I would be falling asleep by noon if I strived to get there right when the show opened. As I've aged, however, I've come to appreciate sleep more so rolled in around 8:30 a.m. instead.

There wasn't much of a walk-through crowd of curious members of the public or area collectors but that did not seem to matter to many dealers. Jamie Houdeshell, for example, was on a buying binge to fill his warehouse and provide stock for antique stores and other dealers. He bought much of what was sold in the show auction, almost all of Robert Winkler's insulators, and several boxes of insulators from Rick Soller. Chuck Dittmar sold a table's worth of boxes in an auction, brokered the sale of another collector's table of insulators to Jamie, bought a table of insulators from Larry Veneziano and resold it to Rick Soller. I heard from Jack Snyder that he sold as much as he bought and, to him, that equaled a fun event. Kim Borgman bought over 50 Hemingray CD 106s for less than \$10 and found a nice backwards 9 in the bunch which more than paid for the deal. Joe Gomez took home over a hundred insulators to clean and inspect.

There was also some trading going on at the show. For example, Russ Frank traded an odd trolley piece to me for an NAJ CD 162 purple private issue. I worked out a trade with Ken Roberts for a 7-up green CD 214.

Lots of other deals were available at the show Tim Sternke had sets of various shapes and colors available for sale that included a Mickey Mouse, a milk glass Maydwell CD 164, an amber CD 168, an emerald green CD 162 McLaughlin, CD 154 purple Whitall Tatum, and CD 145 H.G. Co. in jade. These sets were being sold for a very reasonable price. Bill Rosato offered quantity discounts on CD 122 Whitall Tatum insulators in a light olive green.

The price to attend the show was very reasonable. Tables were only \$28 for the first one and \$20 for a second one. I reserved a room at the Super 8 for \$50 through PriceLine and, unfortunately, found out later that the show hosts had negotiated a price of \$45 for people attending the show and I couldn't get that rate since I had already gone through one of the travel web sites. Pizza was provided on Friday night, doughnuts were provided on Saturday morning, the Super 8 also offered a free breakfast, and reasonably priced food was offered for lunch on Saturday.

Not only was lunch reasonably priced, but the food was delicious with proceeds going to the Horncreek Northern Star 4-H club to pay for tee shirts for the club. This was the club's only fund raiser and they earn enough that they don't have to conduct another for the rest of the year. The menu included hot dogs, chips, soda, coffee, chicken patty sandwiches, strawberry pie, rhubarb pie, and angel food cake with strawberries.

Insulator collectors I saw at the show included Dave Shaw, Kim Borgman along with 2 kids, Joe Gomez, Gordon Furness, Tom Sawyer, Mark Gilmore, Robert Winkler, Dennis Seltrecht, Russ & Marge Frank, Arlen & Tina Rienstra, Dale & Greg Glendenning, Don Archer, Jim White, Bill & Janice Rosato, Matt Grayson, Robert & Darlene Nobbe, Michelle & Shawn Kotlarsky, Gene Hawkins, Chuck Dittmar, Mike McLaughlin, Tim Sternke, Ken Roberts, Curt Boster, Jack Snyder, Rick Soller, Ken Orchard, Dan Ling, Alan Hohnhorst, Earnest Griffin, Bob Stahr, Jay & Josh Dondorf, Larry Veneziano, Nathan Smack, and Jamie Houdeshell.

Two auctions were held at the show. The first was of insulators from Chuck Dittmar. It is difficult to accurately report the results since some of the planning for the event were put together in an impromptu fashion. A total of \$265 exchanged hands in the first one on Friday.

Ken Orchard was seeking offers for his Hemingray insulators that had the tops turned 45 degrees off centered. He was offered \$400 each but turned the offer down so they were still available at the end of the show.

The second auction was a benefit auction for the NIA and the 4-H club. It took place at about 1 p.m. on Saturday and raised \$68. \$20 of it went to the NIA and the rest to the 4-H club.

A few other notes about the show are in order. Ernie Griffin brought some of his collection of Russian insulators. One has a CD 514 made with an off-centered 2-piece mold so that the mold line, rather than running through the top saddle groove, ran to one side of the saddle groove. Tim Sternke gave Michelle Kotlarsky an insulator decorated by his father, Earl, and put others on the free table. I remember when Earl first offered these decorated insulators at one of the Milwaukee shows. The glass insulators had gold colored tops and a decal that was

"cold fired" on the side. Tim indicated that his father died about 7 years ago. There were also some shenanigans going on at the show as insulators from the free table found their way to various dealers' table or vehicle.

As has become a tradition at the show, there was a presentation on Friday evening. Arlen Rienstra provided the basics of bottle making and Chuck Dittmar talked about hand-blown marbles. Arlen covered the different tops of bottles, how the tops were made, and different kinds of bottles. The presentation included numerous bottles that were passed around the audience and I found the information useful the next day when I ended up with a basket of bottles. Chuck provided information on pontiled marbles, covering price as well, and gave everyone in the audience a free example of one. Over a dozen people enjoyed the presentations. Thanks to Arlen and Chuck.
