A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

In March, shortly after the last issue of "Drip Points," I initiated some changes to the names and functions of the Board's Committees. These were subsequently approved by the entire NIA Board.

1. The "Research & Authentication Committee" will now be called the "<u>Authentication and Classification Committee</u>." John McDougald will continue on as Chairman. The change in name is to better reflect the nature of this committee's work. The committee's goal is not only to deal with the authentication of insulators and related items, but also to address other standards issues, including efforts to ensure the perpetuity of CD assignments.

2. The "Promotion & Education Committee" will be split into two committees. Bob Berry will chair the first committee. That committee will be called the "<u>Research &</u> <u>Education Committee</u>." This committee will maintain the NIA website, and in particular

Bob Berry will be the NIA's "webmaster." The committee will actively conduct research, for example the Smithsonian project.

I want to be clear as to how this committee differs from the Historical Committee. The new "R&E Committee" will work on <u>new</u> areas of research, and will publish that information to the public, primarily through the NIA website and "Drip Points;" while the Historian's job is to be focused on maintaining and archiving <u>existing</u> documents, photos, catalogs, etc., with respect to the NIA and the insulator collecting hobby in general.

3. The second committee will be called the "Promotions Committee." In effect this will be a new position. The goal of this committee will be to promote the NIA and inform the public about the insulator-collecting hobby. The ultimate goal for this committee is to make insulator-collecting more visible to the public. In order to accomplish this goal the NIA needs a dynamic leader who will have several members throughout the three regions on their committee to contact non-insulator clubs (i.e. museums, libraries, boy and girl scouts, schools, civic organizations, etc.). If you know of someone that might fit the requirements, or if you yourself are interested, please forward your resume to Jack Roach the NIA's Nominations Chairperson.

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This will be my last column as NIA President. During the Ft. Collins National my term will come to an end and Tom Katonak will take over the helm. I would ask that you give Tom your input and full support. I will of course continue to serve on the NIA Board for the next four years as a Past President. At this time my current plans are to retire from serving the NIA after the 2006 National. In other words folks, I will have put my ten years in and intend to take a break! Through the hundreds of phone calls, e-mails, personal one-on-one conversations, etc., there are several things that stand out which I am extremely proud of:

1. Starting the Grand Canyon State Insulator Club.

2. Revising the NIA Code of Ethics and Grading Standards.

3. Hosting the 30th Annual NIA Convention in Scottsdale with my wife Melanie and the Grand Canyon State Insulator Club.

4. Incorporating the NIA.

5. Rewriting the entire NIA Manual.

6. Implementation of on-line membership applications and election ballots.

7. Creation and distribution of an NIA National Show Host Award.

8. Taking a firm stance on fakes, unauthorized reproductions, etc..

None of these things, however, would have been possible without the cooperation of the NIA's other Board Members, Committee Chairpersons, and the enthusiastic collectors of The Great State of Arizona! And for that I am very grateful. Remember, our hobby is driven by volun-

FROM THE CENTRAL REGION

Greetings Fellow Collectors,

The insulator hobby has evolved over the last 30 years quite a bit. In the beginning it seemed anyone that had a ladder or some sort of access to insulators, could assemble quite a collection.

We've all heard the stories; like the gentleman that showed up at the Wheaton Show in the 1970's with 16 Pluto's in his trunk. The stories of Kansas City where cobalt and electric blue Mickey's, where as plentiful as the Clear

Hemingray-42's, in Indiana where I grew up. Or Paul McManus who found a warehouse full of clear Mickey Mouse insulators and traded them for years thus helping to build a really nice collection.

At the time we took this for granted, there where always more to find...right?

Here it is 30 years later, and almost all of the open wire is gone. Even the last bastion of glass insulators; the railroads have just about removed all traces of open wire. There is a good chance that kids born today will never see communication insulators in use. The insulator hobby can be summed up in two phases:

Phase 1 was the first 25 years when everyone was out pulling down glass and building collections and trading insulators to help build collections. During this time insulators show up at flee markets, garage sales, auctions and antique shops everywhere. For the most part prices were low because nobody really knew exactly what was out there. There was something new around every corner.

Phase 2 is the current level of the hobby. This is where the newly found glass has just about run out. Sure there are new pieces found all the time that have been buried or hidden away in a collections. But insulators are not being found in the same quantity that we used to see. Now with the advent of the Internet, where insulators are a commodity, demand

has increased dramatically. Today there is an insulator show every weekend and more clubs than ever. As the demand is going up the supply is staying the I think this partially exsame. plains why 7-Up green Hemingray-19's that sold for \$35.00 three years ago now sell for \$100-125 each. (I wish my Lucent stock would do that.) I truly understand the frustration that some collectors feel about being priced out of the hobby.

I miss the days where building a nice collection took gumption, time and perseverance not a large checkbook. Only in our minds can we re-live the past. So we must make the most of this hobby that we enjoy. Here are a couple ways of doing that.

1. Start trading insulators at shows and swap meets. Most of us are collectors and are always looking for new pieces for our collections. The nice thing about trades is that both parties walk away happy. Anything on my table is available for trade.

2. Consider collecting mud (porcelain) insulators, since these can still be found in use, and they can usually be had reasonably.

3. Go out and search for insulators on or in the ground. Contact local construction equipment op-

> erators and have them keep an eye out for broken glass that may turn up during construction. The AT&T Long Lines toll line from New York to Chicago was built in the 1880-1890's. When the

line was wrecked out in Ohio in the 1940's that insulators were thrown into the pole hole then filled with sand. Who knows what's buried out there.

4. Specialize in more common CD's. Yes, some CD's can be boring, but a great collection of CD 154's can be put together very nicely.

These are only a few suggestions I'm sure you may have others.

I hope to see you at the Ft. Collins National, where anything is up for trade on my table.

But after bringing up endless parades of "old insulators" that turn out to be badly photographed Hemi 42's and porcelain spools in chocolate brown, I'm starting to think my time could be better spent doing something else. When you attend a swap meet or show, these items are usually regulated to the bargain bin, or

totally absent (now I like that!).

A lot of items are not accurately described as to color, condition, style or embossing. Again, the photos can be terrible.

Generally, most items seem to sell for more than you could find them for at a show. Plus, you can usually get a few bucks off the price when dealing with someone face to face. True, there are a few rare and unique pieces that do show up, and it is a joy to see them. Without E-Bay they might otherwise never have been discovered. Usually they are priced out of my range, but the location could be an important clue as to where to search for duplicates. A very neat CD.287.1 in yellow-green came out of western NY this year, and you can bet I'll be doing some checking!

Museum Committee Report

In 1886, natural gas was discovered beneath Muncie, Indiana. Shortly after that, the enticement of cheap land and an abundant supply of this natural gas led many companies, including Hemingray, to move to the area. Recently, the Minnetrista Cultural Center has been charged with representing the development of the region from this time period on. Funded by an endowment from the Ball brothers of Mason jar fame, the Cultural Center has a

large facility but little in the way of insulators.

Within the past 6 months, contact with Minnetrista has resulted in the beginning of a relationship between the National Insulator Association and the Center. Minnetrista is interested in acquiring insulators and information about an industry that was a major part of Muncie. At this point, a rough inventory of the museum's holdings relating to insulators was compiled and some donations of insulators and books have been made. In the future, the museum plans to send a curator to the national to



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
