In the task area of "Technical and Scientific Studies," progress in our research project to investigate glass "weathering" has been impeded by the principal investigator's lack -

As I've mentioned before. copies of R&A Committee documentation, as well as handouts that available at the General Membership Meeting, are available to anyone directing a request for such to my attention.

Insurance Policy Updated with Earthquake Coverage!

The insulator insurance policy that is available to all active NIA members now includes coverage for earthquake damage for California residents. This additional coverage is available for an additional \$3 / \$1,000 over the regular policy rate which is \$5 / \$1,000.

FROM THE WESTERN REGION

aving just returned from the 28th National show in Chicago, I thought I'd include my two cent's worth.

The only drawback that I could see was the weather--I don't believe I have ever experienced a more muggy, humid day than Saturday the 26th. Some people stated it was 114° with the humidity, but whatever it was, it wasn't fit for man or beast! It was much more comfortable inside where there was air conditioning and plenty of insulators!

From most accounts of the people that I spoke with, all seemed to have a very nice show. There was so much to see as far as glass was concerned--everything from Jumbo's to a fascinating display of threadless porcelain containing things I'd only seen in old pictures of CJ. Lightning rod balls and foreign glass, great displays and good buys on low-dollar general glass were the order of the day. That was good to see since I quit Denver glass and returned to general glass collecting a month or so ago and it was nice to go around and not have to worry about getting another Denver insulator and splitting hairs with the color!

As far as displays go, it was indeed great. Ken Pollard's collection of Blue Bells and commemorative bells was so nice that for one brief moment I wanted to guit insulators and collect bells exclusively! He won a couple of awards for that fine

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display. Another display by Roger Lucas included a huge assortment of glass from the Hemingray dump. It was nicely catalogued and guite informative--as were all the displays. Paul Plunkett had an outrageous display of threadless and I enjoyed his handout on his display. The best part -- all the glass in the display was neatly catalogued on the color handout, showing where and when the insulators were used. Now why didn't I think of that one when I was displaying Denver glass? There were plenty of other great displays, but I'll let someone else go over all of them.

Most prices seemed reasonable on the sales tables but it depended on what you were after. I was discouraged to see cobalt and amber 162's with some damage selling for what a mint one would've cost when I was doing general glass a few years back. There were some questionable pieces out there as well. I was also seeing a few suspect

NIA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MINUTES

Minutes of the 25th NIA General Meeting, Chicago, IL, Friday, July 25, 1997

The meeting was called to order at 5 p.m. by Rick Baldwin. 102 members were in attendance

- 1. Committee members were introduced by Rick Baldwin.
- 2. Some comments about the activities of the show were made. Rick Baldwin extended the thanks of the NIA to the show hosts.
- 3. A motion to approve the minutes of the last general meeting was made by Rick Soller, and seconded by Bob Adams. Passed by voice vote.
- 4. Treasurer's Report by Mike Guthrie:
 - \$1874 was received over the year in contributions
 - The NIA has \$12,309 in the budget
- Less money was spent last year because some major projects were not implemented
- 5. Highlights of last year were given by Rick Baldwin.
 - A record number of NIA members (1350) was projected by the end of the Show
 - The Long Beach National was a success
 - 1998 show bids were of high quality
 - Insulator web page activity is increasing
 - There is a significant amount of new blood in the NIA
- -- 39% of officers have less than 3 years of NIA organizational experience. If committees are included, the figure rises to 45%
 - Several ethics issues have been handled over the year
 - The membership survey has been tabulated
- A Research and Authentication Committee has been created. A strategy and methodology document has been produced and 19 participants are on the committee
 - The video project has been refocused
 - Preparations are underway for the 29th National plus the CY98 Regionals
- 6. Dudley Ellis announced that in the election for Central Region Vice-President, Bob Stahr won the election and will be serving for the next 3 years. Next year, the Eastern Region VP and the President's position will become vacant.
- 7. Jim Frustieri reminded people of this year's Eastern Regional in Kulpsville on September 27-28, 1997. Contracts were still available. A double room is \$64.
- 8. Tom Katonak spoke about this year's Western Region Show on Sept. 27-28, 1997. This will be the 10th EIC show. The facility, the National Guard armory, is much bigger

than previous year's locations, so there will be ample space for all dealers and attendees.

- 9. Jim Frustieri and Mark Becher spoke about the Williamsburg, VA National on July 31-Aug. 2, 1998. Room rates will be \$74 per night.
- 10. The Western Region show, hosted by the Triple Ridge Insulator Club, will be June 5-6, 1998. There will be RV parking and a great banquet.
- 11. The Central Region show in Garland, TX, hosted by the Lone Star Insulator Club, will be the 3rd weekend of March.
- 12. Bill Meier spoke about the Internet, pointing out the strong growth of collectors online.
 - People can buy & sell insulators and discuss issues on the Internet
- The web promotes new clubs and has lots of information available about insulators
 - The video project will now be retargeted toward Internet use
- 13. Tom Katonak reported on the Drip Points.
 - He encouraged cards and letters
 - Nov. 1 is the deadline for the December issue
 - Feb. 1 is the deadline for the March issue
 - May 1 is the deadline for the June issue
 - Aug. 1 is the deadline for the Sept. issue
- 14. Rick Baldwin reviewed details of the Research and Authentication committee including its mission, objectives, membership, and deliverables. John McDougald was introduced as the chair of the committee. Some areas the R&A committee will address include:
 - Technical and Scientific studies on altering insulators
 - The investigation of questionable insulators
 - The corroboration of classification assignments
 - The endorsements of commemoratives
 - A Research & Authentication scrapbook
- 15. John McDougald indicated that no easy answers exist to the problem of fake insulators. At the National Show, the standard applied is whether an insulator is "highly questionable." If an insulator is "highly questionable", dealers will be put on notice. Several were already and, in all cases, the insulator was removed from the sales table.
- 16. Dave Wilson asked for examples of "highly questionable" insulators. The reply was that some are irradiated, some are new colors, and some new shapes; however the committee did not plan to issue a list because some pieces are closely linked to a specific individual and, in addition, it is quite possible that some of the questionable

pieces could be authenticated

- 17. Grant Salzman commented that the R&A Committee was doing a lot and asked if Lightning Rod Balls were included. The answer was yes.
- 18. Len Linscott asked if parking lot sales were considered. The focus of the committee is on the show sales but the committee would investigate any sales in the parking lot.
- 19. Len also asked if anyone has identified the places that make the fakes? The response was that the problem would be easier to solve if we could.
- 20. Dwayne Anthony pointed out that much of what the R&A committee does is education.
- 21. Jackie Linscott asked, "Why doesn't the NIA have a standard display of fakes and pay for circulating the display to shows?"
- 22. James Doty inquired about joining with other groups to mount a combined effort.
- 23. A question was asked about whether dealers could be labeled as someone who sells questionable insulators. Related to this, someone asked whether legal authorities have been consulted. Could the NIA be sued for hurting a dealer's sales without proof that an insulator was fake?
- NIA bylaws specify that dealers cannot offer questionable insulators and since all dealers agree to abide by the bylaws, proof that the insulator was fake is not necessary.
- 24. Nominations are being accepted for Bylaw Chair since John McDougald, the former chair, is now serving as chair of the R&A committee.
- 25. Grant Salzman asked about the ethical issues handled in the prior year. The NIA pursued the case of someone who used a different name and solicited money for insulators but never sent the insulators. The person returned the money and has not done it since.

Motion to adjourn made by Jackie Linscott, second by Phoebe Adams.

RESEARCH AND **AUTHENTICATION COMMITTEE** REPORT

t the 1997 NIA Board Meeting at the Chicago National, I was appointed as the chairman of the Research and Authentication Committee for the NIA. This followed membership action at the

1996 Annual meeting, ' where the NIAmembership approved the formation of a standing committee called the Research a n d Authentication Committee *

to deal with a number of issues that face our hobby. Rick Baldwin had served as the ex-officio chairman of the committee for the first year of its existence, and he oversaw activities in four major areas:

- (1) Technical and scientific studies -Some work has been done with Penn State University and with a testing laboratory in Canada to develop methodology for determining the age of glass. Several different techniques have employed, but been to date. satisfactory test has been identified. Work continues in this area, and Rick Baldwin will continue to chair this subcommittee activity. This is a very complex area, and we may never have a fully satisfactory answer using scientific However, there is enough methods. potential for us to continue to pursue this activity. Thus far, we have been able to have these tests run at no cost. committee will recommend judicious use of NIA funds if deemed appropriate.
- (2) Investigation of "questionable" insulators in the marketplace - Tom Katonak chairs this subcommittee. The intent of this activity is to provide NIA

with information members insulators and related items that are offered for sale or trade that are of questionable status. This may cover the areas of reproductions made to look like real insulators, insulators that have been altered in some way (e.g. color), and fakes. The activities of this subcommittee are closely linked with the scientific

activities above. subcommittee other activities as well.

which states that "highly questionable" insulators must be permanently marked, Tom's subcommittee contacted several dealers at the National convention and requested the removal of a number of items that did not pass the "highly questionable" test. All of the dealers cooperated in full. It is the intent of this subcommittee to have representatives at each of the NIA sponsored shows to help inform NIA members of questionable items.

- (3) Corroboration of Classification Assignments - This subcommittee has been formed to provide assistance to the existing assignors of CD-, U-, M- and other classification systems that are used in our hobby. In addition, they will provide oversight to any activities which provide classifications for new insulator collecting areas, such as radio strains, lightning rod insulators, etc. Bill Meier chairs this subcommittee, and he is in the process of developing the procedures to be followed by this committee.
- (4) Endorsement of Reproductions and

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Commemoratives - This subcommittee is formed. just being Several new commemoratives/reproductions have come into the hobby in the past year (e.g. resin EC&M's), and this subcommittee will act as a clearing house center for information these newly No chairperson has produced items. been named to this committee at this time.

In total, 21 members serve on the R&A Committee. They represent a good cross section geographically and knowledgewise for our hobby. Most of them have just recently been approved by the NIA Board, so their involvement has been limited up to this time. However, over the

next year, they will be active in working for the benefit of all NIA members in the four areas outlined above as well as any other issues that are brought to the committee. The ongoing Altered Insulators

THE ALTERED INSULATORS AWARE-

NESS PROJECT IS ADVANCING

Awareness Project is steadily advancing. Several specimens of color altered insulators were displayed for public viewing on my sales table at the Chicago National. Those that stopped by and chatted with me expressed an obvious amazement upon their realization that so many beautiful colors can be artificially generated by specific radiation sources. These collectors walked away with a broader knowledge and perception of what is possible, especially when a color looks "too good to be true".

The altered samples at the Chicago national were from the larger display that was exhibited at the Long Beach national last year. Due to the size and fragility of the Long Beach display, it could not be transported to Chicago. This will soon

change! The display is currently being dismantled and will be placed into a more compact and rigid format. When this display is completed, it will be available for transportation to all major NIA shows. allowing collectors across the country first hand viewing. In addition, a portion of Mike Guthrie's famous "Fake and Altered" exhibit will be incorporated into the project to create one mega-educational traveling exhibition! Other methods of educating collectors on this same topic are currently "in the works" and will be announced soon. If you have any specimens with fake or altered dispositions that you would like to donate to the cause, please contact either Mike or me.

New revelations are constantly occurring. Example: As I am writing this report a call is received regarding a reverse process test on a suspect irradiated insulator. The insulator in question: CD 121 WFG Denver toll in a dark royal purple. This specimen was acquired in an old time collection and has been accepted as an authentic color by many collectors for years. The reverse process proved the specimen to be in all actuality, a light lavender that had been exposed to a radiation source many years ago. This is only one example of the many discoveries that are being documented as a result of this project.

Several recent reports have been received from collectors across the country that a "collector" in Florida has attempts made several to market insulators in highly questionable colors. In most instances, previously educated collectors are easily identifying these controversial colors and returning them.

Again, if it's "too good to be true" don't take a chance without doing your homework first. If you're not certain about

the authenticity of a color, call one of the many specialists in the hobby for their advice and expertise.

Let's create an example: You're a fairly new collector and you just received a deep purple CD 257 Hemingray "Mickey Mouse" in the mail with a price tag of \$100. Your heart starts pumping as you place it next to your electric blue mouse and it looks great! You've never seen this color before in this CD, but the guy that sent it to you has been "in and out of the hobby for years". Wait! Don't let your excitement get the best of you! A simple call to one of the many knowledgeable Hemingray specialists for an evaluation may save you imminent heartache. this case, the reply to your inquiry will undoubtedly be one of caution. By the way, you may wonder, is it actually possible to artificially alter a CD 257 to deep purple? Answer: Highly possible!

What about purchasing an altered insulator, priced reasonably, as a

conversation piece or because it looks neat in your collection? Don't do it! This only creates a continued market for an unscrupulous person who is profiting from an unethical activity. Even if the suspect insulator is priced at, let's say ten dollars, it could actually be an altered agua previously worth fifty cents. Multiply the markup for profit by 100 sales and you can quickly see the feasibility of the act! OK, so you just can't resist the temptation: Then please permanently mark the insulator to identify it as an altered specimen. This will assure that the insulator will never be passed on as authentic once it leaves your possession.

It is hopeful that with constant education, awareness and unity within our hobby, the market for fake and altered insulators will diminish. As we wade through the growing-pains of this great hobby of ours, it is important that we not become discouraged by the unethical acts of the few, but focus on the scores of true friendships we have made and the unending pleasures of being collectors of
