WELCOME TO THE NIA !

For many of you, this may be your first exposure to the NIA (National Insulator Association.) Under an agreement with Crown Jewels, the quarterly newsletter of the NIA, "Drip Points" will now appear as an insert in Crown Jewels rather than as a separately produced and mailed document.

By way of background, the National Insulator Association was officially founded July 7, 1973 after several years of discussions among collectors with the compelling purpose of coordinating the locations of the larger insulator shows in the country. As it evolved, a number of equally important functions began including the establishment of rules of ethical conduct within the active promotion of insulator collecting and the throughout the country. By binding collectors together into a national association, many opportunities for mutual assistance and promotion of the hobby are now possible. Some of the committees authorized by the Association include Ethics (for insuring the highest possible degree of conduct at insulator shows) and Show Standards (for establishing and enforcing guidelines for show display competition). There is also an NIA Historian whose responsibility it is to gather and preserve for the future all possible historical information regarding the hobby.

You are cordially invited to join the NIA and offer your support to the successful promotion of the insulator collecting hobby. For further information about the NIA please contact any member of the Board of Directors listed at the end of this newsletter.

FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Fellow NIA Members,

I'd like to address the problems of financing an organization like the NIA. Since its inception, the NIA has relied exclusively on membership dues as its means of income. Although some of you might think that there isn't much return for your dues, I'd like to point out where they actually go:

- 1. NEWSLETTER: Printing and mailing Drip Points, issued quarterly, costs the NIA more than half its annual budget. The NIA will be saving some money and increasing its exposure now that Crown Jewels is distributing Drip Points, but the newsletter is still far and away the NIA's biggest cost item.
- 2. TROPHIES, RIBBON, & AWARDS: The NIA provides 10 trophies, the Outstanding Service Award and Lifetime Membership Cards for each National Show, a Best of Show Trophy for each Regional, and Ribbons for any local insulator show which requests one. All are provided free of charge to hosts.
- 3. ADVERTISING: The NIA reimburses up to \$350 per year in paid advertising to National and Regional hosts, in an effort to keep promotion of those shows on an even keel from year to year.

What the NIA needs is expanded funding for other important projects, especially in the area of insulator history and research. To accomplish this, I am going to make every attempt to supplement the NIA's income through sales of "Official NIA paraphernalia" like embroidered patches, name badges, pins, hats, and the like. These would all include the NIA's new logo. However, all "big plans" need money-more than I would expect from the NIA's present membership dues. We need the cooperation of every

present membership dues. We need the cooperation of every member and FORMER member to rejoin the NIA- AND to encourage other collectors to do the same. Although I haven't attempted to document it, probably less than 1/3 of the active collectors in the U.S. and Canada belong to the NIA and that is a loss for ALL OF IIS!

NIA Board and Committee members donate their time, energy, and money (postage, phone calls) to the NIA in an effort to advance the organization and hobby of insulator collecting. HELP US IMPROVE OUR HOBBY-GET YOUR FRIENDS TO JOIN THE NIA.

I am pleased to report that the response to the proposed new NIA logo has been extremely favorable. I personally received constructive criticism from about half a dozen members and some of their ideas will be used to create the final version of the logo. The Board of Directors was unanimous in their pleasure with the new design. Howie Snyder did a superb job of art work in about 12 draft versions of the logo stretching back to last winter. On behalf of the Boards of Directors for Mike Bruner's and my administrations, my thanks and gratitude to Howie for past and future services donated.

It is VERY IMPORTANT that you realize that we cannot accomplish much without your cooperation and contributions. This is still YOUR newsletter! If you have interesting articles or items to share with your friends in the hobby-PLEASE send them to Mike Guthrie! He will be very happy to include them in future issues of Drip Points.

I wish you all a very happy and safe holiday season and a healthy and prosperous 1987. Good Collecting!


CENTRAL REGION

BOARD OF DIRECTORS UACANCY



I followed the signs down Long Crossing Road which included such helpful hints as PINCO, THOMAS, & LOCKE. Driving down this dead-end road past some very nice homes and acres of wooded land I thought I must have passed the Emmon's by accident. Well, whoever said good things come to those who wait was right. At the very end of the road I saw a mailbox supported by three huge porcelain power types and the traffic light at the start of the driveway really caught my eye, I was at the right house for sure. The seven antique street lights along the driveway, with glass insulators securing the power lines, were so neat.

The weather was cool and crystal clear and perfect for a day of visiting with friends and seeing Larry's and Mary Jo's fine collections. The lower floor of their raised ranch home is chock full of insulators, bottles, beer cans, Avon collectibles, and enamel signs. So much to see....and all are displayed nicely. Truckin' through the kitchen to get outside, I did a quick stop to view all of the fantastic carnival glass items that Mary Jo has been collecting since she was a young girl. I can't be any more specific on how old some of these items are because I would like to be invited back some day. The different bottles, vases, and dish sets are sure pretty.


People were arriving all day on the 18th representing Connnecticut, New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island. I think that everyone would agree that the main attraction was the "shed" that Larry & Mary Jo recently The two story structure is supported by twelve telephone poles. The ground floor, which is a virtual museum of thousands of porcelain insulators, was built with old telephone poles cut into lumber for the walls. By the way.... Larry and Mary Jo built 95% of it themselves. The interior shelving holds insulators separated by U-number and colors in all variations of brown, white, blue, green, and yellow. And, of course, there's the unique pink glazed Thomas that still has people talking. I know that many people in this hobby do not care much for porcelain, but I find the various shapes and colors quite interesting. Obviously these porcelain units played a vital role in the development of electrical services throughout this country. I feel this museum is a great addition to the hobby.

I strongly recommend that if you are planning to travel through Connecticut you should contact the Emmons' and invite yourself over. Their dedication to the hobby and their friendliness were both very much in evidence during my visit.

DISCOVERIES"

Yes, fellow collectors, it is sad but true. No one chose to participate in this project. Perhaps I was wrong, maybe no one really cares to know about the discovery of neat insulators. What is readily apparent, however, is that no one cares to write about it. So, I am sorry to report that there are no choice experiences to share with you in this issue.



PACKING INSULATORS by Charlie Allmon

In the fall issue of "Drip Points" I promised to give you a tip on a time and labor saving method of packing insulators. Before leaving home to attend a show or swap meet, most collectors and dealers spend time organizing their inventory and some spend a lot of time making sure each piece is individually wrapped and safely packed. Well, there is a much faster and easier method that will not endanger your jewels.

Your only stop for materials will be at a liquor store. Here you will need to acquire some empty cardboard boxes. I prefer champagne cases because the partitions are roomy and the dividers are thickly corrugated. One brand of champagne that has outstanding cases is Korbel, in the 750 ml size. Now, don't get me wrong, I am not endorsing their hooch! It may be wonderful, or it may be rot-gut, I simply have never tried it. But, I can testify to the fact that their boxes work great for packing insulators. Most likely any champagne case will do very nicely.

After acquiring your boxes, here's what to do: Roll up a double sheet of newspaper into a flattened wad approximately the size of a softball. Jam a wad into the bottom of each partition of the box. Next drop an insulator into each partition (no need to wrap them in paper.) Next, another wad of newspaper into each partition, on top of the insulator. Then, another layer of insulators and finally a last wad of newspaper on top. This way each box will hold at least two layers of insulators for a minimum of 24 pieces. If you are packing smaller units you may be able to safely pack 3-4 layers in each box.

A person can easily see how this method will speed up the process of packing and unpacking your stock. Also, think how much easier locating that one particular piece would be since each insulator does not require unwrapping and subsequent re-wrapping.

PROMOTE YOUR HORBY!

For every NIA member there are probably from 20-50 collectors of insulators who have never been exposed to the organized aspects of the hobby. In addition, there are literally thousands of people who, when told of your hobby, say: "You collect WHAT?" Well, if we are ever to educate the masses as to what the hobby is all about, we must each make an effort to expose people to the various facets of insulator collecting. There are a large variety of ways to achieve this objective, limited only by ones thinking. One of the best ways is to go to the places where education commonly occurs, specifically, libraries and museums.

I recently contacted the main library branch in Fresno, Ca and asked about their criteria for displaying in the main lobby. I was told It was as easy as signing up, so I did. As pictured below, a rather comprehensive display of glass, porcelain, non-glass, non-porcelain, foreign, domestic, threaded, & threadless insulators were included along with club, NIA, book, and magazine information. It was as easy as that! For 30 days hundreds of people per day were exposed to descriptions about and samples of dozens of different types of insulators and their history.

Why don't you try the same thing? Contact your local library or museum or both and offer to display part of your collection to educate the public about your hobby.
