

"MESSAGES"

FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Fellow NIA Members.

You will immediately notice a new look for the NIA. Effective this issue, the NIA sports a brand new logo, which was previewed this past fall. It was a year and a half in the making, since the topic was introduced at the St. Charles National. Over a dozen separate logo layouts and designs were reviewed by a logo committee and by the Boards of Directors of both my administration and Mike Bruner's. At the Saratoga Springs National, we agreed on a concept for a final design, which you saw in the September Drip Points. Of all of the comments received, nearly all were very favorable and, at the same time, some of the constructive criticisms were used to come up with the final design! Many thanks to Howie Snyder for his high quality work on behalf of the NIA.

The next step we plan to take is to market the NIA, with help from our new logo. We are in the process of obtaining quotes on the following official NIA logo items, which we plan to market to the members of the insulator collecting community:

1. Embroidered patches. The embroidered patch of the old NIA logo was a very durable friend over the past twelve years, and the NIA realized some income from their sale. The probable size will be 3" × 4" and the suggested colors are:

Background: Light blue (sky colored)

Lettering: Dark blue (cobalt?)

Pole and Pins: Brown

Wire: Black

Insulators: Green (emerald?)

Border: Red

This will make a very colorful patch and a welcome addition which the NIA's members—will be proud to wear!

- 2. Pins. This is an item which the NIA has never marketed before. At the Saratoga Springs National, pins in the size and likeness of postage stamps were being sold at reasonable prices and some clubs, like Rochester, New York's Genessee balley Bottle Collectors Association, use membership pins in lieu of patches. We will obtain prices on approximately 1" size pins in the same colors as the patches.
- 3. Decals. The NIA presently gives an NIA decal with each new membership and sells additional decals at a nominal charge. These are very good promotions for the NIA and the hobby.

Other fund-raising items which we are investigating include coffee mugs, name badges, shirts, and caps. If you have any comments on what you think might be a profitable item for the NIA to market with its new logo, or would like to assist us in our future projects, I'd really like to hear from you! The success of these projects depends very heavily on your support, and that success will impact very heavily on our financial position and ability to implement future projects!

When I became NIA President last July, one of the things I re-instituted was a membership committee. While I had requested assistance from the membership on this committee, I was perhaps a little unrealistic on what we could accomplish and in what period of time. The length of time it took to finalize the NIA's new logo was more than I had expected and, without new membership applications in hand, it wasn't very likely that the NIA would be breaking down the doors at any winter shows looking for members! Now that new membership applications are being printed, we can arm a committee with these (and some informational material), and assist the hosts of insulator (and bottle) shows by providing information on insulator collecting and the NIA at local shows-and, at the same time, attempt to increase our membership! The people I have in mind for this project are collectors (non-dealers) who attend several shows a year and who enjoy working with and talking to people-especially about insulators! Exhibitors are an especially important group for this function since it will also help keep them involved during show hours. Obviously, it is going to be easier to get volunteers for the National and Regional shows than some of the local one-day bottle shows, but the bottom line is: I would like to hear from potential volunteers and the regions or states you would like to cover on behalf of the NIA membership committee. The more people we have working with us, the better off we'll all be!

Finally, it will be less than four short months until the Central Regional Show (Pearland,Texas) and another month after that until the National (Fresno!) It doesn't seem possible that a year could pass so quickly, yet it's doing just that! I hope you make your travel preparations in plenty of time ahead of these shows so you don't find yourself in a bind at the last minute. Keep these shows in your travel plans (I'll plug the Eastern Regional in the June issue of Drip Points!), because we value your attendance! See you in Pearland and Fresno!

I am already looking forward to the upcoming show in Omaha. We have a lot of fun and it is always a really great show. You should make definite plans to attend. Not only will you have a great time talking insulators and shopping for great deals, but Mike Bruner has already agreed to a repeat performance playing the Lowry organ (groan!!)

Is 1987 your year to sponsor an insulator show? I hope so, because the more shows, the better! Let's think about this for a minute. Perhaps a small show would not be as big a hassle as you think. Chances are good your home would be sufficient for the first year. Successful shows are not evolved overnight. They normally begin as small, sparsely attended events and evolve over a few years, getting larger and better each year. As the years pass, more collectors will attend and you can target your advertising to attract other hobby participants such as collectors of bottles, fruit jars, marbles, advertising, signs, lightning rod equipment, baseball cards, telephones and any others you choose. Then you can enlist these collectors to bring their buddies to your next show. Consequently, your show has a very good chance of becoming an extravaganza within a few years. 



NEW LOGO FINAVUZED D

After months of work, revisions, discussion, and re-revision, the new NIA logos are finished and have been accepted by the Board of Directors.

The example below is referred to as the "Open Pole" version which is to be used for embroidered patches and other applications where the solid pole version will not serve well.





The above "Solid Pole" version will be used on letterhead, etc. where the solid pole will not constitute a reproduction problem.

A hearty vote of thanks to all who participated in the logo design. May we all use it proudly!

(Editor's Note: This is the first and only article received for this column. Thanks Jeff Kaminski of Greenfield, Mass. for your time and contribution. If you have a story of how you discovered some desirable insulators please write to the Information Director so that others may share your experiences just as we now share Jeff's.)

I grew up in the town of Ware, Ma. where there are hundreds of CD 325 Pyrex 401's in clear still in service on 22,900 volt feeder lines. In early 1985, I did a count on all the lines I knew about and came up with about 1,600 mint CD 325 Pyrex and about 150 mint CD 323 Pyrex 271's in clear. About 200 or so were taken down in October 1985 and March 1986 when new lines were put in. These are mixed in with a number of different porcelains many of which have beautiful glazes which are fascinating. This is basicly how I got to be a Pyrex specialist.

My grandfather and I used to walk these lines where we found a mint, clear CD 323 when I was 8 years old. In November 1984, I saw another Pyrex 401-271 line in Orange, Ma., about 12 miles from where I live. It has been converted to a 13,800 volt distribution line and has about 200-300 combined pieces.

In December 1985 I saw a line in Cranston, R.I. that has CD 325 Pyrex in carnival. I counted 93 and many are as dark as you can imagine. I also saw hundreds of 6-inch Pyrex suspensions on 4,160 volt distribution in Providence and Cranston, R.I. There are still a few of these in the Hare, Ma. area, which is about 40 miles from Greenfield.

I received a letter from a guy telling me about CD 327's in service in Quonset Point, R.I. In November of 1986 I went down to find several hundred CD 327's in <u>carnival</u>. These are just awesome! I also saw about 12 CD 326 Pyrex 453's in clear, several CD 325's in clear, 3 or 4 CD 327's in clear, and a string


of (3) 10-inch Pyrex suspensions in <u>clear</u>. These are very scarce in clear. I've also heard of CD 320 Pyrex 171's and more CD 327's in service in the Rutland, Vt. area but haven't had a chance to get up there yet. It seems there are still quite a few Pyrex insulators around in service throughout the country.

I've also seen clear CD 221's in service on the Mass./N.H. border. Also have seen clear CD 219's, 252's, and aqua 295's. Just recently I saw 4 or 5 clear CD 257's and a CD 157.5 Standard in the Boston area.


As you can see, I am very interested in seeing and learning about insulators still on lines. I'm especially interested in knowing where and what Pyrex insulators are still in use. I would really appreciate communicating with any other collectors who have any information on this subject.

I hope other readers start participating in this project. It's the sharing with other collectors that keeps this great insulator hobby alive.
