

POSITION PAPER ON ALTERED, FAKE, AND TREATED INSULATORS

Approved by the 1987-88 Board of Directors and Ethics Committee of the National Insulator Association

Much has been communicated to the N.I.A. over the past several years regarding questionable and potentially fake or non-authentic insulators. This includes fraudulent colors (obtained by heating, irradiating, or coating an insulator of another, authentic color), fraudulent variations (obtained by adding or removing embossing, threading, inner skirts, etc.) and altered conditions (undocumented "repairs", "Endust" or "Pledge", lacquer or epoxy applied to the surface of a piece with poor surface luster.)

ALL of these practices are unethical, both by moral standards, and by the accepted Code of Ethics of the N.I.A.

Item one specifically states that:

"NIA members shall not engage in the manufacture of insulators or related items which can generally be termed frauds and which include, but are not limited to, deceptive reproductions or altered physical characteristics in any manner."

Item three states that:

"NIA members shall not engage in the sale, advertisement or exhibition of any insulators or related items deemed by the NIA to be "objectionable" in the best interests of the hobby."

The issue has become very critical and quite a few members of the NIA have provided substantiation on some of these complaints. Regarding "fake or fraudulent" insulators, some of the complaints have included the following pieces:

<u>Yellow Californias</u>: CD 102, 112, 121, 133, 152, 161, 162,208,260.

<u>Dark Purple Californias:</u> (violet/royal purple shades) CD 152, 160, 161, 162.

<u>Dark Purple Postals:</u> CD 145 <u>Sapphire Blue Postal</u>: CD 145

Carnival Hemingrays: CD 137, 154, 162, 164, 168, 230, 232,

251, 252, 257, and others.

Purple Maydwells: CD 106,115,122,154,160,162,164,252.

Purple McLaughlins: CD 106, 115, 121, 122, 162, 164.

Pale amber Whitall Tatum's and Armstrongs: Many CD *'s.

Burgundy Denver (W.F.G., W.G.M., R.Good) CD 106, 121, 134, 162.

Carnival Pyrex: CD 128

<u>NOTE:</u> There is evidence that some specimens of some of the above mentioned insulators may, in fact, be genuine. Other's, however, cannot be authenticated.

There are undoubtedly other items of concern among the hobby populace. There is evidence to support the fact that nearly all of the yellow California insulators were created by heating SCA's and that the dark purple (violet/royal shades) and "fake" Postals were created by irradiating SCA's (to get purple) and the aquas or sages (to create the Sapphire blue.) There is little doubt that the majority of the information on the Californias and Postals is true, since it has been substantiated that several West Coast collectors created these in the mid to late 1960's before most of us were even collectors ourselves. There is additional strong support that the burgundy Denver's have been made by "heating purples."

The Carnival Hemingrays are a severe problem, as well, since there is documentation that Hemingray did not manufacture spray treated insulators for the same reason or with the same process that Corning Glass Works (Pyrex) did. There is little doubt that genuine carnival Hemingray styles D-510, D-512, 19, 20, and 42 specimens have been found. Unfortunately, there appear to be more "fraudulent" or "re-carnivalized clear" specimens on some of these models than there are genuine articles.

First, there is no evidence to support the fact that ANY of the carnival Hemingray-60 (Mickey Mouse) or carnivalized corrugated base styles were ever placed into use. These specimens should be considered as fakes absent authentication. Second, there is also strong evidence to support the fact that Hemingray sprayed its carnival insulators from the bottom (into the pin hole) and that the genuine carnival Hemingray will tend to be unevenly sprayed, with more spray on the outer and inner skirt than in the wire groove and on the dome, with poor to mediocre color (compared to Pyrex specimens) similar to that found in the TS-2 and TS-3 styles, which are genuine.

Regarding treated surfaces on glass insulators (there appears to be little "treating" of porcelain insulators), the N.I.A. cannot condone such practices. Regardless of whether such treatment "improves the finish" or not, it does, in fact, alter the insulator's physical characteristics and the use of ANY treatment of an insulator, whether epoxy, lacquer, commercial or proprietary surface treatment shall be considered as objectionable by the N.I.A. without SPECIFIC identification as such. All surface treated insulators for sale should, therefore, be clearly so identified.

This position paper is not meant to restrict or ban the trade of the above mentioned items, and it would not be realistic to assume that the trade of these items will end. It is to restate the N.I.A.'s position on fraudulent and potentially fraudulent insulators. ABOVE ALL, it is a

warning to NIA members and non-members alike to be cautious when buying suspected specimens. Although it is unfortunate to have to be reminded of it, the statement "Let the buyer beware" is often good advice.

Dear Fellow NIA Members,

I thank my fellow Board and committee members for their outstanding help and cooperation. I also thank the membership of the NIR for its continued support and suggestions for improvements to the hobby. I will not, of course, be leaving the NIR Board as I will have four more years as Past President to serve and my role will not be diminished. RYLAU CHANGES PROPOSED

According to NIA bylaws, any change to the bylaws (refer to your membership handbook) may be voted upon at the NIA business meeting but they must first be presented to the membership for consideration prior to the meeting. The following changes have been approved by the Board of Directors for consideration and voting by the membership at the Houston National business meeting. Please review the changes and forward any objections you may have to any member of the Board of Directors. The purpose for each change is explained below:

PROPOSED REVISION TO ARTICLE II, page 3

Purpose: There is nothing in the current by laws to limit and/or protect the use of the NIA logo. As a result, several members have created and marketed items with the NIA logo for personal profit. Except for dues, the NIA has only one other significant source of revenue which consists of marketing the NIA logo in the form of t-shirts, decals, patches, caps, etc., etc. To permit the uncontrolled use of the logo in commercial products for individual gain undermines this significant source of revenue. While the NIA cannot and perhaps should not be directly involved in the production and marketing of any conceivable item containing the NIA logo, it should at least be reasonably compensated for its use by those who would profit from such use.

Proposal:

Add paragraph 5 to Article II, pages 3,4:

5. Members of the NIA may utilize the NIA name and logo for any non-profit purpose including but not limited to stationery, clothing, decorative items, advertising of NIA sanctioned activities, etc. Any use of the NIA name and logo in any form for personal commercial purposes (including endorsements) of any type must be approved in advance by the NIA Board of Directors. This restriction includes marketing, selling, or trading of any such commercial item which may be produced by a non-member of the NIA. Approval for commercial use of the NIA name and/or logo may include an appropriate agreement for compensation to the NIA for such use.

PROPOSED REVISIONS TO ARTICLE VIII, page 8 & ARTICLE II, page 3

<u>Purpose</u>: The provisions of all but paragraph 6 of Article VIII are obsolete. This means we are reprinting an entire page of meaningless information when we issue handbooks. To streamline the bylaws and printing costs the following is proposed:

- 1) Delete the entire Article.
- 2) Move paragraph 6 to Article II (Membership) and number as paragraph 6.
- 3) Modify text to remove the first five words: "To provide for initial organization..."

PROPOSED REVISION TO ARTICLE III, page 5.

<u>Purpose:</u> While it has been done for many years, there does not appear to be any formal authority in the bylaws for the creation of committees other than a blanket clause of the President "...taking such actions as will promote the purposes of the NIA" (para.4). The following proposal will establish this authority and place terms of office on the committee function.

Add paragraph 12 to Article III:

"The President, with approval of the Board of Directors, may establish committees to perform necessary functions of the NIA. The chairperson(s) of the committee(s) will be appointed by the President and will serve until the committee is dissolved or the Chairperson is released by the President or until the end of the appointing President's term of office, whichever occurs first."
