A multitude of sales tables and breathtaking exhibits will be awaiting you at the NIA's 20th annual convention. On Friday, NIA Day, you will enjoy one of the many benefits NIA membership offers you -- NIA members will have the luxury of one full day of admittance prior to the show's official public opening on Saturday. FROM THE EASTERN REGION V.P.

What a welcome respite from a miserable winter the first shows of the spring were. The Chesapeake Bay Insulator Club had their show in early March. This was a fairly small show, but had all the necessary ingredients. There was a fine variety of stock for sale, a few nice exhibits and a pretty heavy dose of attendees yearning for some good buys or trades. The following day was the Baltimore Bottle Club show which also saw some decent insulator action. On March 28, spearheaded again by Doug Mac Gillvary, the Yankee Polecat Club had its show in Enfield, CT. As always, this was a highlight show. Traffic was heavy all day and even getting through the aisles became a chore at times. Going back to January, the St. Pete. FL bottle show was loaded with insulators and from a dealer point of view had some good action.

There is still some good glass showing up. A CD 701.5 egg was captured by a relatively new collector at a real bargain price. How about a CD 204 Locke turning up in a basket of 10 clunkers and get this; as a result of a contact made through a radio trade session. I know the recipient of this piece and believe he may go a long time to duplicate the excitement he feels. A CD 729 J.S. Keeling in bluish aqua and LOADED with seed bubbles found its way onto my shelf after walking into a show for 3 years. These are just a few of the examples.

I'm getting some good reports about the Southeastern Insulator Club recently organized by Keith Roloson. They are apparently meeting regularly, have a lot of enthusiasm and when I spent an evening with Jim Overstreet this winter he was again preparing his patio/deck for a club meet.

A gold star for Mark Foster of Rocky Point, NY. He has placed an exhibit in a local library and is being wooed by the local high school about putting one in there. He says he has met some nice people through the exhibit and says there is a lot of interest. What a great way to promote the hobby and to get younger collectors started.

On the subject of programs and exhibits: Just this month I put together an outline for an insulator program to be given to various groups. This is merely formalizing the outline that I have used several times. It can be adapted or individualized and comes with a listing of recommended props and a listing of handouts for the audience. These are handouts which are probably familiar to all of you and are readily available at no cost through people in the hobby. Kevin Lawless is currently the Commissar of Promotion and Education and I have sent him a coy of the program and a listing and sample of all handouts. Since this is currently Kevin's Bailiwick I would suggest working through him, but I would certainly be glad to help you also. Putting on a program for a group really isn't that difficult and with a semi "hands on" approach which I have used, is a very effective way to promote the hobby.

How many of you have seen or heard the following two types at insulator shows, bottle shows or flea markets? 1. The "Shooters"--This type will walk up to your table and with great glee and a loud guffaw announce how he used to shoot those things when he was a kid. There is then a pregnant pause while he waits for you to show great alarm or convulse with laughter as if you have never heard this before. 2. The "Bushellers"--This type will pick up a \$300 insulator off your table, chuckle and put it back. On the way away from your table he will be heard to comment to his wife "\$300 for that! I've got bushels of them in the basement!" Right. When a show gets dull, counting these guys helps pass the time.

Looking ahead. Attend the National show in Denver. It sounds super. In the East, look toward Claude Wambold's backyard show on June 19. There is a CDIC swap meet scheduled in Corning NY on August 8. We have the Eastern Regional on Sept. 25 & 26 in Kulpsville, PA. The fall Renningers extravaganza is nearby and the same weekend. A big bonus! It also sounds as if the Capitol District Club will be having a show in Albany on October 31. This is a pretty good menu, so please try to attend

Please keep the communications coming. It's nice to hear from the folks in the region, gives me something to pass on to others and keeps me from feeling like a mushroom.

FROM THE CENTRAL REGION V.P.

There have been several insulator shows in the Central Region during the early part of 1993. I felt that the two I personally attended were exceptionally good. Being in somewhat of a time crunch at the time of this writing, I'll touch briefly on some of the highlights of both shows.

The Second Annual Metroplex Insulator Show, held on March 13th in Fort Worth, Texas, was even larger than the first one in 1992. The Green Oaks Inn in Fort Worth was again the perfect facility to hold such an event. Of the 16 dealers occupying 20 sales tables, 5 were from out-of-state, representing Arizona, Arkansas, Connecticut, New Mexico and Oklahoma. There were also 6 fine displays. This one day show, supported by the Lone Star Insulator Club of Houston, was well advertised by Hosts Randy Wickersham, Ross Baird and John Wiggins, as evidenced by the many collectors and local curiosity seekers in attendance. Plans are already under way for the Third Annual Metroplex Show in 1994!

The NIA 1993 Central Regional (and Fourth Annual) Show in Kansas City, Missouri the weekend of April 17-18 was just super! Set up in two adjacent rooms at the Holiday Inn Holidome were 40 sales tables, 27 dealers (representing 12 states and Canada), and 3 fine displays. The aisles were crowded the minute the show opened and stayed pretty much that way all day Saturday. Among the attendees on Sunday were several of Saturday's shoppers making return visits to the hall to buy more insulators. Believe it or not, there were even visitors from Ireland and England who saw the write-up of the show in the local newspapers and came to see if people really collect such things as insulators! The man from Ireland took photos of several pieces, explaining that it was the only way folks 'back home' would believe him. I noticed that his eyes were a bit round as he jotted down the prices of some of the more desireable insulators.

One of the highlights of the show was the insulator auction held on Sunday. A dealer who put an insulator on the auction table had the option of selling it to the highest bidder for the price offered or holding out for a better deal. Most of the money collected from the auction was donated to the NIA for education and promotion of the hobby. Really a tremendous idea!

Show Host Chris Hedges put on a fine show with the help of his good insulator buddies Paul Wiltfong (of the Antique Telephone Collectors Association), Charlie Allmon, Paul and Carol Ickes, Dennis and Jeanne Weber, and Larry and Pat Whitlock. Following are a few pictures taken at these two shows.








