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### What's in a Name?

"Drip Points" is named after the feature seen on many insulators produced from the 1890s through the 1950s. Drip points are the bumpy protrusions around the base of an insulator. They were patented by Ralph G. Hemingray and James C. Gill on May 2, 1893 (Patent #496,652) and were originally marketed as "teats". Their purpose was to help draw water off of the insulator.

Each year there are a number of sitions, we have had a variety of changes to two Advisory positions and three Committees. Ellis is the new Eastern Region Representative. Relative to the Development Committee, Darryl Wagner is the new Committee Chairman replacing Mike Green. In addition to Darryl, following are the Development Committee members: Bill Rohde and Tom Katonak are the Western Region Representatives, John Weber is the Central Region Representative, and Dario DiMare is the Eastern Region Representative. Relative to these changes I want to express my thanks to Dario for his former participation on the Events Committee, and my thanks to Mike Green for his work on the Development Committee. Additionally, I want to thank Mike Funderburk and Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes for their years of service to the NIA.

During the Board of Directors' Meeting in Kansas City, the Board approved a revised list of benefits related to NIA membership. Going forward we plan for the benefits to be listed in each edition of Drip Points (see page 60). Please share the benefits with hobbyists as you encourage them to become part of the NIA. Additionally, the Board approved five Goals for the NIA to strive toward. Due to the length of this article I will not go into detail with all of the background concerning these goals; however, I will share the list of goals with you. They are:

- 1) To Increase NIA Membership by five percent per year and improve retention of first year members.
- 2) To seek donations of \$5,000 annually to increase the Scholarship payout.
- 3) To update the design of the NIA website.
- 4) To seek donations of \$5,000 to enhance the Fake and Altered Insulator Display with a durable traveling display case, and to create an online version of the display.
- 5) To seek \$10,000 initially, and then \$2,000 annually to create a Virtual Insulator Museum\*

\*Part of the initial funding will be used to solicit a design proposal to gather more specific information concerning the viability of this goal.

Please know that the Board realizes that some of these goals may take an extended period-of-time to come to fruition. However, our organization has grown to the point of needing Goals to strive for if we are going to continue to expand and enhance our organization in an ever-changing environment. Additionally, these goals have been discussed with the Development Committee. They are aware that we are very dependent on them if we are going to succeed with several of these Goals. Finally, let me express my appreciation to Colin Jung. Recently he contributed 153 historical periodicals to the NIA Historical Archives. I'm sure there is a great deal of interesting information in these documents. Additionally, recently I have been in communication with Jack Tod's heir, Jane Jimenez. She has signed a Permission to Use Copyrighted Materials agreement, allowing the NIA to place two of her father's works on the NIA website. The two books are "Porcelain Insulators Guide Book For Collectors" (Unipart Pin Types) Third Edition, and "A History of the Electrical Porcelain Industry in the United States". Please be patient as it will take some time for us to get these books digitally scanned and then placed on our website. The good news is we are working on it!

However, the top bidder backed out as did the second highest bidder. At some point, I was offered the piece for around \$21,000 but declined the offer. Eventually, I received another offer to buy it for \$17,500 plus buyer's premium and agreed to the \$19,250 final price. That \$20,000 line is still a tough line to cross and I'll be selling a lot of insulators during the next six months just for getting close to it.

### **Auctions!**



Not everyone can make it to the NIA National, and some of you don't have a local show you can attend. With that said, I'm sure there are weekend auctions near virtually everyone. The trick is finding the auctions that have insulators you might want a shot at. If you have access to the Internet, you can set up notifications that will come to your inbox every morning. There are many websites, but I use AuctionZip (http://www.auctionzip. com). Once you set up your account (FREE), you can set the search criteria based on your zip code and how far you are willing to travel. Enter what you are looking for (insulators, railroad items, bottles, etc.), and you will receive an e-mail every morning highlighting auctions that match your search criteria. This is the process that led me to an auction in Beaver Springs, Pennsylvania recently. Here is the listing that came up:

I looked up the insulators in the ICON "For Sale (Sold or No Longer Available)" Folder (<u>https://www.insulators.info/pic-</u> <u>tures/?op=list&folder=34</u>) to get an idea of what they might be worth so I could figure out what I was willing to bid in advance (always a good idea). I packed up my car with boxes, wrapping paper, and my price guide and headed out for the auction.

Arrive early to adjust your bidding expectations, as there may be more than you saw on the web site, and auctioneers have a tendency to reorganize lots for bidding. In the case of my auction, I was pleasantly surprised to find a significant cache of CD 257 Wide Groove Mickey Mouses.

Never assume that you are the only one going to the auction looking for insulators. On arrival I met a fellow collector who had also seen the auction. There were three other insulator collectors there that I didn't see until the bidding started! Since my goal was to build trading stock rather than add to my collection, my maximum bid was lower than the other bidders, and I only won two lots. I knew what my friend was looking for, and didn't bid on his lot (Carnival Sombrero), which he won.



I introduced myself to the other folks bidding on the insulators, and invited them to the 4th Annual End of Summer Swap Meet at my house on 29 September. As I was leaving, a gentleman came up to me and asked if I wanted to see his collection. As he only lived a short distance, I went to his house and spent over an hour talking insulators – great time!

Local auctions are a great way to meet other collectors and pick up additions or trading stock for your own collection. Setting bid limits before arrival, bringing packing supplies, and a handy price guide will set you up for success. Don't forget to bring a comfortable folding chair and something to stay hydrated with! Auctions provide great opportunities when you don't have the ability to attend local, regional, or national shows. Who knows? You may find some long buried treasure...

Greetings to my fellow NIA members,

I want to personally say thank you to Jacque for the great job she has done as the NIA Research & Education Advisor. I am honored to be asked to fill this position.

For those of you who do not know me, I started collecting in the early '70s, took a recess for college, marriage, and establishing a home. I came back to the hobby in '98 when I started to frequent the (then comparably new) Internet. My specialty areas were initially HGCO PETTICOAT 145s, anything that caught my eye, and 162.1 Brookfields. Later I was intrigued that although all the letters composing a set of molds of PETTICOAT beehives were known, what constitutes a set of the prominent shop numbers (or SNs) on crown embossed Brookfield beehives was still not known. My research started, and after fifteen years, a guide for these CREB beehives, along with an extensive history of Brookfield (which was also forgotten to time) was published.

While researching the CREB shop numbers, I noted others in the hobby were also taking an interest in discovering which molds were used for other styles of insulators. I am now hoping to harness the power of the Internet with the knowledge/collec-

tions of NIA members who would be willing to aid in making an online list of known SNs and MNs (mold numbers) for every insulator company's CD styles.

The ultimate goal of the project would be to make a web page with pictures of each SN/MN. People would be able to check and see if the numbers they have are known, and if not, they could add their numbers to the database.

While not obvious at the start, I found knowing these numbers unveiled information such as the day to day operation of each group of men using a single press, locating which molds were used by more than one company, and also the numbers allowed cross referencing with patents to imply approximate dates when certain CDs were produced.

What else can be learned by knowing these numbers? Only time and participation by NIA members will tell! Stay tuned for more information concerning this project in the future.

My big brother, Wesley, and I started collecting in 1969 when we found our first Hemingray 9 at an abandoned farm site. I initially thought it was a salt shaker, but found it odd that it had no holes! From there it progressed to full exploration of old phone lines and railroads for insulators (however far we could ride our bikes in a day!) I have always had a love for railroads, history and the Old

West, so naturally this interest spilled over into looking for insulators along the Union Pacific. 

As you travel north along California's backbone on US 395, halfway between the quaint towns of Lee Vining and Bridgeport, there's a fairly unremarkable right turn nestled into a rocky canyon: California State Route 270. As you traverse its 10 miles of paved road and gentle curves, savor them! Just ahead, the highway ends and the final three miles out to the venerable ghost town of Bodie are rough-dirt, gravel, ruts and washboards-but it's well worth it. In 1991 when I was 10 years old, my dad Bud took me out to see this historic landmark, and I was instantly enamored. When we returned home, he even helped me build a scale model of the town out of toothpicks for a fourth grade project, complete with little telephone poles and sagebrush.

Now, 28 years later, I was returning to Bodie with my own family—my wife Maggi, and three children: Christian Jr., Caitlin, and Ethan. What made this trip even more special for me was that my dad Bud and his wife Nancy were traveling along behind us in their trusty Subaru. As the pavement ended and our suspensions got a real workout, I smiled as fond memories returned, and of course the kids were having a blast bouncing around in the back!

I won't spend a lot of time explaining the history of Bodie here—entire books have been written, and web sites are dedicated to this ghost town. It is a veritable treasure trove of gold mining history. Rather, I'll be describing Bodie from the viewpoint of an insulator collector. However, just to set the scene, here's a quick summary:

Bodie began as a small mining camp following the discovery of gold in the area in 1859 by several prospectors including W.S. Bodey. In 1876, Bodie exploded into a boomtown with a significant gold discovery by the Standard Company. From 1877-1880s, the population soared to an estimated 10,000 people and the town sprouted as many as 2,000 buildings, before its gradual downsizing and abandonment in the 1940s.

With a town of that size, it was only natural that it would have telegraph, telephone, and electricity. And we all know what that means: insulators... *lots* of insulators!

In 1892, the Standard Company built a hydroelectric plant at Green Creek about 13 miles away from Bodie at a site known as Dynamo Pond. It was one of the very first long-distance electrical transmission lines in the country, and was one of the few locations where the rare CD 244 Pomona style was used. An excellent article written by Carver Mead & Barbara Smith was published in the November 2005 issue of Crown Jewels of the Wire Magazine, and describes this line in great detail. You can read an archived copy online at <u>https://www.cjow.com/archive/</u> <u>article.php?month=11&a=11GoneToBodie</u>.

Needless to say, I didn't see any Pomonas laying around! Much of the town's resident insulators still present are either porcelain or common fare such as Brookfields and Hemingrays. However, a lot of pieces do still remain, either up in the air on poles or nestled in the museum. As a brand new collector in 1991, to see insulators still up on poles and on the sides of buildings was a new sight for me. They were everywhere, and I was on a mission to find as many as I could.

Now, with 28 years of "spot the insulator in the dusty corner of a junk shop" under my belt, I realized I missed several in my youth!

Some of the ones I didn't miss can be seen inside the museum. I took a picture of these same pieces as a kid. Comparing the photos, I see that

they rearranged the insulators, but they're all still there! You can see a CD 259 Roman Helmet, a glass Johnny Ball, a CD 287, CD 107, CD 160, CD 162 CREBs, CD 102, CD 164, a dog bone radio strain, a small porcelain power piece (unknown U#) and a small porcelain knob. It's interesting to note the age range of these pieces, spanning the c.1880s-1940s. On the other side of the room, you can see one of the first electric motors that was used in 1892, and a couple of porcelain multiparts keeping it company.












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Poles line Green Street and dot other streets as well, and a few crossarms and side pins are even still attached to buildings by various means. Most insulators are still faithfully sitting atop their crossarms, but some have managed to pop free and are swinging in the breeze. Most of the buildings that still stand have all manner of porcelain knobs, wall tubes, spools and cleats still attached. There were simply too many to take pictures of them all, but I tried to include a good representation here.

One area I have yet to see is the stamp mill, which is off-limits except for special tours. There is a small transformer building where the power lines likely came in from the substation down the hill, and there are undoubtedly more insulators to be found inside the many buildings surrounding the mill. I have an excuse to visit again in the future! And Bodie will be waiting for me—perhaps a little older and little more weather-worn, but still the same old Bodie. Until next time!

### MAMMOTH MUSEUM: HAYDEN CABIN

Nearly a week after returning to Mammoth Lakes, CA from our Bodie excursion, we attended the town's Fourth of July parade, where we were treated to a Navy F-18 flyover, and all kinds of festooned vehicles, including one from the Mammoth Museum. Intrigued, the next day we decided to visit the historic Hayden Cabin. Located just a few blocks from the parade route on Old Mammoth Road, the rustic 1920s log cabin is situated in a picturesque spot right on the bank of Mammoth Creek. We walked around the grounds, and as we entered the cabin, my gaze was immediately drawn upwards. Lining the walls of the room was a collection of-yep, you guessed itglass insulators. I introduced myself to docent Mary Canada and asked her about them. They aren't sure how they came to be included as part of the exhibits, but it's possible that the cabin owner was a collector, or they were found on the property or around town. We may never know, but it's good to see insulators represented as part of Mammoth Lakes' history! I told her all about the National Insulator Association.

I counted about 27 pieces in all, representing a fairly good range of manufacturers, colors and styles, including Hemingray, Brookfield, Star, Whitall Tatum, and Lynchburg. CDs primarily consisted of 102, 115, 106, 133, 134, 152 and 154. There were even a couple of true green pieces that stood out. I informed her that most of them probably dated to the 1900s-1930s, which would fit the time frame in which the cabin was built.

The exhibits showing local history were well laid out and engaging, and the cabin and grounds are kept in immaculate condition. It's well worth a visit if you're in the Mammoth Lakes area! The Mammoth Museum at Hayden Cabin is located at 5489 Sherwin Creek Rd., Mammoth Lakes, CA 93546. Hours of operation are 10AM-6PM daily, from Memorial Weekend through September. ### AUSTRIA INSULATOR SHOW

The 2018 International Insulator Collectors Meeting took place in the village of Wildon in Austria on June 30th. Collectors from eight countries were in attendance. Friday was setup day where collectors unloaded their treasures. Later that day there was a meal at a local vineyard where we sat in the outdoor dining area in the pleasant late evening sunshine. Saturday was the main day of the show. The show was scheduled to start at 8am but we arrived to find the door locked. A short while later someone arrived with the keys. For those who have never attended a European show there is a subtle difference to North American shows in that no money changes hands. Insulators are traded and swapped freely. This doesn't mean that all insulators are common or low value. The general etiquette is to give and take insulators of equal rarity so everyone has a fair deal. At each European show a souvenir is handed out to everyone who attended. The gift this year was a cake cutter in the shape of an insulator. These were used to produce some insulator shaped cookies which were available at the show. T-shirts were also given out. By around 3pm the show was winding down. After a quick shower it was off to the banquet at the host hotel. All the meals were pre-ordered in advance. As this is Austria the Wiener schnitzel is a must and it didn't disappoint. After the banquet we all said our goodbyes and look forward to seeing everyone again in two years.







The next European show will take place in 2020 in Krefeld which is just outside Düsseldorf. This is 15 miles from the airport which has direct flights to the USA. #### NIA General Membership Meeting

Friday, June 22, 2018 • KCI Expo Center

11730 NW Ambassador Dr. Kansas City, MO 64153

President, Steve Roberts, called the meeting to order at 4:15 PM.

The Secretary did not read the minutes in the essence of time. Walt Baumgardt stated that they had been published in Drip Points Volume 45 # 1 in the fall of 2017. He had a copy available if anyone had any questions. With no questions, a motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes of the 2017 General Membership meeting as they appeared in Drip Points. Walt further stated that all of the paperwork and fees related to our 501(c)(3) status were in place and up to date and records were on file.

Treasurer, Bill Rohde, reported the board had signed off on the 2017 budget with a slight excess. The 2018 budget was re-approved, expecting a small excess. He further stated that the Board had approved a balanced budget for 2019, again expecting a small excess at the end of the year. The budgets will be re-visited, periodically, via conference call to insure we remain on track.

Membership Director, Andrew Gibson, stated that as of a week before the National we had 1610 members, which is down approximately 75 members from last year but that some fluctuation of about this size is fairly normal. He added that we normally add 50 – 75 new members at the show.

Christian Willis was not present. He is the current Drip Point's Editor, Drip Points Ad Manager and Information Director. All three positions are inter-related. Steve pointed out that he is doing an excellent job, despite having a full time job, a growing family and is working toward his Master's Degree, evenings. He has published two issues of Drip Points and has asked to retain that position. The copy of Drip Points on our web site will be updated.

Western VP, Mike Doyle, stated that the Lou and Mike show is alive and well, and getting a lot of attention on social media. He is working to expand our presence on the web and also on social media.

Central VP, Kim Borgman, was not present. He is finishing his term as VP, as of this meeting and Steve thanked him for his service on the board.

Eastern VP, "Gus Stafford", reported a number of shows in the

eastern region. There are plans for future shows including a National in the Eastern Region

Don Briel, as 1st Past President, had no report.

Authentication & Classification Advisor, Paul Greaves, was not present. Paul had submitted a report stating that increased conversation on social media regarding Fake and Altered Insulators is doing a lot to reduce the demand and the price for these insulators.

Steve added that it is not illegal to alter or to sell a piece of glass and that if it's not an NIA member there isn't anything we can do about it. If it is an NIA member there are things we may be able to do, but we need definitive proof of the prior knowledge and the intent to defraud before we can do anything. Paul watches this issue very closely. He's working to create a pictorial library of fake and altered insulators which ultimately would be on our website.

Award & Recognition Chair, Gene Hawkins, stated that we have a new award this year. The N.R. "Woody" Woodward Award for the Best Use of Threaded Glass in a display. It will be available for viewing all day tomorrow at the show. It will be given at the judges' discretion.

Historian, Rick Soller, said he has plans to keep Bob Berry very busy adding things to the website. He is scanning pictures from past shows and expects to need help identifying individuals in those pictures. He is constantly adding new items to the archives.

Ethics Advisor, Darrell Stahler, was not present, but reported that the need to deal with ethics issues is decreasing. We had no ethics issues in the past year.

NIA Commemorative Coordinator, Carolyn Berry, says that we are on track to meet the expected income from commemoratives this year. This year's color is Cherry Blossom. She will be retiring within the next few years, after approximately 20 years of service to the hobby.

Research and Education Advisor, Jacque Linscott Barnes, reported that the lesson plans on the website continue to be downloaded. She further reports that she is resigning as of this meeting. Steve thanked her for her many years of service to the hobby. Steve added that Lee Brewer will be the new Research and Education Advisor.

The Development Committee is being reorganized to include

people from each region rather than just the Western region. The function is to raise funds to balance our budget each year, as we endeavor to do more as an organization. Increasing scholarships is one thing we want to do.

Rules and Procedures Advisor, Mike Funderburk, is taking a sabbatical from the NIA and from collecting for short time. Tim Wood is taking over this position. Tim reported that as of the day before the board meeting the handbook had been updated with all the latest changes, and had been approved by the Board. Steve thanked Mike for his good work in maintaining the handbook and our Rules and Procedures.

Product Manager Margaret Wagner, reported that sales were down slightly because they had gotten rid of excess inventory last year. They keep looking for ideas for new merchandise. They're planning something special for next year which is the 50th Anniversary of NIA shows or meets. 2020 will be the 50th Anniversary of the NIA and, again, something special is being planned.

Events Committee Chair, Darrell Wagner, reported that they had five people interested in hosting the 2020 show in the West, winding up with two bids. Now they're looking for hosts for the 2021 show, which again will be in the central region. They're also looking for ways and incentives to get people to attend the shows.

Scholarship Committee Chair, Jeanne Briel, had nothing to report. Tammy Brewer is now serving on the scholarship committee, replacing Lee Brewer who has assumed Research and Education Advisor. Two scholarships of \$1000.00 each are being awarded this year. The recipients are Anthony Eiting and Nathan Hardage.

Webmaster, Bob Berry, reported that 230 catalogs from Elton Gish have been digitized and are on the website. A portion of the website is password-protected. Contact Bob to get a password to access those sites. He is working with Elton Gish on identification of foreign porcelain. He is working with Dario on assigning CD numbers to foreign glass. He stated that there's about 40 insulator related sites currently on the Internet.

Special Projects Advisor, Mike Doyle reported that the there are thousands of members on social media insulator sites. He's working to convert old publications to the web. Jacque Linscott-Barnes has donated the Blue Bell issues to the NIA. He asked if anyone had a way to contact Ron and Patty Norton. He's looking for permission to use the Rainbow Riders Trading Post. If anyone has information on the Norton's, please contact Mike Doyle. Finance Chair Bill Snell reported that there was agreement to perform a financial audit any time the there is a change in the treasurer or upon the wishes of the board. He stated that he had performed a preliminary audit and found nothing amiss. He added that this in no way reflects negatively upon the integrity of the treasurer or that we suspect that there has been any wrongdoing. It is merely good fiscal practice to have an update from time to time to assure the collectors that the organization is fiscally responsible.

That ended the reports by board members and advisors. Steve reported that since last year we have processed 27 significant documents and voted on several motions. As usual, it's been a busy year for the Board.

Steve reported on the status of our attempts to register our name and the logo with the government. We had procured the use of an attorney, who reported back to us that the term NIA already exists. It's the National Insulation Association. Our request was denied because The National Insulation Association's name is very similar to our name. We were able to make contact with the National Insulation Association's CEO and were told that if they could get approval from their board they had no problem writing a letter on our behalf to the government. This letter never came and the government deadline passed. Rather than push the issue in court, and upon the advice of counsel, the Board decided to drop the issue. We were advised by counsel that if we pushed too hard they could get a court order causing us to cease and desist, in which case we would lose our name and logo altogether.

This past year the board successfully used conference calls to further enhance our decision-making process. We had two three-hour conference calls, one in October and one in April, essentially adding another board meeting. The Board decided upon the success of the calls to continue their use.

Steve added that the Board had approved a revised list of Benefits of NIA Membership. Although not much different in content from the current list, the wording has been updated to appeal to Millennials.

The Board has also approved a list of goals for the NIA

Steve introduced the new officers for the NIA.

Incumbent, Walt Baumgardt was re-elected to another two year term as secretary.

Darrell Wagner was elected as the new Central Vice President.





He's looking forward to serving the NIA. He is looking for volunteers for the next National in the central region in 2021. A letter of intent needs to be in by November 1 of this year, with the proposal by February 1 of 2019.

We could not find any volunteers to run for President. Pursuant to our By-Laws, 1st Past President, Don Briel submitted Steve Roberts (with permission) to the Board for a vote. By Board vote, Steve Roberts will remain as President.

Don Briel will be serving as the new Events Chairman replacing Darrell Wagner who is now the Central VP.

Steve asked for questions from the floor there was one question regarding the name and logo situation. What was the danger of someone else coming in and getting a name approved over us? Steve stated that if we were not able to get our name approved then no one else would be able to either. They would have the same problems we had with the existence of the National Insulation Association. Changing our name came up with Nation Insulator Collectors being suggested. Since we have had the National Insulator Association name for 49 years it was not a recommended change. Steve did state that such a move would not be taken lightly, requiring a lot of discussion by the board. He added that discussion could and would take place. There was a question about our logo. Steve stated that there was also a problem with our logo because the T in National is actually a telephone pole. Our attorney said that this would very likely be a problem when it came down to getting the logo approved. As it stands the issue has been dropped by the Board. We are confident that if we could not get our name and logo approved, no one else will be able to, either.

Steve announced a 2019 regional show in Helena, Montana, hosted by Ron Yuhas, Doug Rusher and Jay Bernasek. It is July 26 to the 28th and Ron advised watching the website for details.

The 2019 National Show is in Orlando Florida, hosted by Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes, Graham Barnes and Clay Bledsoe. This is the 50th Anniversary of the national meet or shows. It is June 14 to the 16th and again, continue to check the website and ICON for details. Show rooms will be available at a reduced rate for 5 days before and 5 days after the Show, for anyone wishing to take an extended vacation.

The 2020 show in the Western Region was announced for Logan, Utah. Don and Jeanne Briel and Arnold and Linda Smith are the show hosts. It will be held in a brand-new facility; 20,000 ft.2 available for sales and displays. The dates are June 12 through the 14th of 2020. Tomorrow night's Banquet will be in this room. A cocktail reception starts at 5:30 PM, with a Buffet Dinner at 6:30 PM.

Sunday morning Devotions will be at 8 AM immediately across the lobby from where we are now. The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 PM upon motions by Jacque Linscott-Barnes and Lou Hall. ▲

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the *First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to* in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 1/4 inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project continued on by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemoratives through 2009 at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. <u>Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go directly to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(c)3.</u>

## Farewell to Doris Wilson By Rick Soller, NIA Historian

I am sad to report that collector Doris Wilson passed away on April 18, 2018 at the age of 89. Whenever I learn of the death of another collector, I reflect on how they mirrored the image of the hobby. In the case of Doris, she reflected how collecting was a family adventure for many, how it was a long-time activity, how it opened doors to new friends, and how anyone could amass an amazing collection.

The family was involved in the hobby in important ways. Doris was preceded in death by her husband, James (NIA #1950) who collected insulators and lightning rod balls with her and died in 2000. I met their son, Dennis and his family, at the recent Tama, Iowa swap meet and learned that the dad would spy insulators worth retrieving and then the two of them would return to the spot and Dennis would climb up the pole and retrieve the insulator. Instead of climbers, he would throw a rope over the cros-

sarm and use that to crawl up the pole. I also learned that, in the winter, the family would

travel to Florida and would look for insulators during the trip. I thought they might have been to the Maitland, Florida show but none of the Florida collectors I talked to at the National recalled them so perhaps they just searched antique stores and abandoned lines. I had a picture borrowed from Wayne Alexander of Doris and Jack Bateman posing in the shelter house of a Tama, Iowa swap meet and was happy to let the Dennis family get a copy of the picture for their own family album.

Doris was involved with insulators and lightning rod balls for at least 39 years. Her husband received his NIA number in 1979 and was certainly actively collecting before that.

Over the years, many people enjoyed seeing their collection. I was never lucky enough to meet James but Russ Frank and I called on Doris a couple times on our way to the nearby Toledo/ Tama show. I know John and Carol McDougald, Jack Bateman, and one other unknown collector visited her too. Doris would also occasionally make it to the swap meet held in the area.

I believe even beginning collections can contain gems, and the long tenure of collecting that the Wilson's had made this a near certainty. The insulator that stood out most for me in their collection were several U-202 baby blue porcelain transposition made by Pittsburg. Seeing several of these in one collection confirmed the rumors I had heard that they were used in the area. Doris seemed especially attracted to the piece since she preferred buying colorful porcelain when I saw her at the local swap meet. Living in a state where lightning rod balls were used extensively, it was also possible to put together an impressive LRB collection.

Dear Fellow Collector,

The NIA is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, and as such gifts may be tax deductible. Gifts of support will help the Association improve existing benefits and services as well as create new benefits and services for members and those collectors who are yet to become members.
