But it also was of interest to me because the more sincere and dedicated NIA members (such as the Theesens) that we can motivate to become more involved in our hobby, the stronger and larger our hobby will become.

### ETHICS COMMITTEE REPORT

NOTE: The following article comes to us from Don Fabbi, Ethics Committee Chairman, on "fake" insulators.

One current problem of concern is the altering of insulators. Otto R. Boll of Appleton, Wisconsin has prepared an article for <u>Crown Jewels</u> on the subject of persons irradiating insulators.

There are many number of ways that glass insulators are presently being altered from their original design.

- 1. Grinding off embossing Bill Galloway has a star pony that the embossing has been ground off and the roughness wiped with resin to cover the altering.
- 2. False coloring This is done by heating purple Cal Helmets to turn them yellow. With the passing of time they usually fade back to purple or clear. Some #145 aqua postals have been heated and they turn a bluish lavender.
- 3. <u>Irradiating</u> Using radiation sources clear insulators are darkened to an amber color. Depending on the number of hours of exposure the insulators may turn to a dark amber or black amber.
- 4. Some threaded glass have had the threads ground out to represent threadless insulators.

### ETHICS COMMITTEE REPORT (CON'T)

- 5. Repaired Many hundreds of insulators have been repaired (usually with glass resin) and there is nothing particularly wrong with this if done without the intent to defraud. These should always indicate as repaired and the buyer specifically told where the repair has been made.
- Dyeing and Flashing This is becoming more common. Most dyeing and flashing can be exposed by scratching with a thumbnail or holding up to the light and looking for light and/or dark spots or any unevenness in the coloring.

It however is not all inclusive of the variety of ways that insulators may be altered.

One dealer (who at this writing shall remain unnamed) may have as many as 3-4 hundred of treated glass insulators he has sold. Certainly a national rip-off to the unsuspecting collector.

Bob Alexander has a collection of "fakes" which he displays from time to time. It would be nice if we could borrow his collection and have everyone coming to the National Show in Reno that has a fake insulator they would be willing to display, show them also.

This would serve to help educate the collector. According to Don Harned "If you are an amateur collector, you would be wise to check with one who knows or deal with a reputable dealer before laying out too much money." Caveat Emptor - Let the Buyer Beware.
