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



NIA Board Action The following actions were approved by the Board of Directors and announced at the General Membership Meeting held during the 2012 National Show and Convention.

- 1. The Board approved the redesign and printing of the pamphlet "What Are Insulators?" This document will be sent to new members. Additionally, it will be given to anyone who expresses interest in the hobby and is searching for information. Copies will be sent to clubs as needed for distribution. The creator of this pamphlet, Clarice Gordon, has assigned the Copyright to the NIA. When updated, the revised document will give acknowledgement Clarice for her generosity.
- 2. Dues for 2013 will increase. Individual and family dues will increase by \$10.00 to \$22.00 per year. Junior's dues will continue to be \$5.00. Club or Organization dues will be \$50.00. Clubs/Organizations will receive a one ¼ page ad in one issue of Drip Points. The new dues are effective with 2013 subscriptions or renewals.
- 3. A Finance Committee was created. Rules and procedures are being developed to guide the committee in its charge from the Board.

I want to welcome our two new Board members. Barry "Bear" Spitler is the Central Region Vice President and Steve Roberts is the Association Secretary.

NIA Annual General Membership Meeting Kansas City, MO. By Steve Roberts

Friday, June 22nd, 2012

Lou Hall called the meeting to order at 4:15 pm. Lou welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked them for their participation.

The Minutes of the 2011 General Membership meeting were published in the March issue of the Drip Point newsletter. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes. The motion was approved.

Lou asked the respective Board Members to submit their oral reports.

Secretary - Colin Jung advised that the Corporate Papers have been filed and are current.

Treasurer - Bill Rohde advised that the cash at the beginning of the fiscal year was \$32,600, and the balance at the end of the year should be approximately \$35,500. Additionally, Bill advised the membership that the Board had approved the new budget for 2012-2013.

Eastern VP - Matt Grayson shared that the hobby appeared healthy in the eastern region. He advised that he had attended several shows in the past year and the attendance was good at each of these shows.

Central VP - Bill Snell thanked everyone for their attendance at the Kansas City National. He advised the membership that the Boy Scouts would attend the show on Saturday. He asked that everyone please welcome them. Bill also shared that it had been a privilege and an honor to serve the NIA.

Western VP – Dan Gauron expressed his thanks to those who are hosting the Kansas City National and also thanked the attendees for their support of the National. Dan advised that he had attended several shows and observed that dealers had been flexible with their prices to encourage sales. Dan stated that a new CD had been discovered in the Western Region. The new CD assignment was 115.2. Also, a very rare porcelain was found this past year. Dan closed by encouraging the members to be positive, support the NIA and get involved.

1st Past President – Bob Stahr asked the membership to work outside of the box to involve new people in the hobby. He stated that the Hemingray plaque in Muncie, Indiana was a huge success. He is currently working on the Hemingray plaque at Covington, KY. Bob suggested that the next project may be the placement of a plaque at the site of the Fred Locke plant.

2nd Past President – Kevin Jacobson didn't have anything to report. Lou thanked Kevin for his work on getting the NIA approved as a 501 (c) (3) non-profit corporation.

Membership Director – Don Briel advised that the NIA membership is at an all time high. Our previous record was in 2008 with a total membership of 1719. Today our total is 1723. It is expected that this number will continue to increase as we are only half way through the year.

Lou spoke on behalf of the **Historian**. He asked the membership to please send hobby related items of historical interest to Miles McLall. He will inventory and store them.

Lou shared that the **Newsletter** had a new look and that Shaun Kotlarsky was doing a great job. Everyone agreed.

NIA Commemorative – Carolyn Berry asked everyone to consider purchasing a commemorative insulator. She stated that profit from this endeavor help fund the NIA.

NIA Show Advisor – Steve Blair stated that he has been working with those who have submitted proposals in preparation for future shows. If anyone is interested in submitting a proposal for either a Regional or National show, please contact Steve.

Philanthropy – Rick Jones shared that because of our 501 (c) (3) non-profit status, any donations, other than annual dues, are tax deductible. Please consider making gifts to the organization.

Product Marketing – Tina Rienstra stated that she brought a great deal of merchandise to the National. Purchase of these items help support the NIA.

Research and Education – Jacque Linscott Barnes spent several hours today during the show interviewing veteran collectors concerning their past experiences in the NIA and the hobby. She will continue this effort at future shows. Jacque is trying to gather this information before these "hobby treasures" are no longer available.

Rules and Procedures – Mike Doyle stated that he is using newer technologies (Utube, Facebook and Twitter) to communicate our hobby to the membership and to others who may have future interest in the hobby. Additionally, Mike said he is working on updates to the Membership Handbook.

Scholarship – Kay Bryant informed the membership that the NIA has awarded its first scholarship. She stated that the Scholarship Committee is making changes to the scholarship application to make it more relevant to the hobby.

Webmaster – Bob Berry is currently working on updating information related to glass insulators outside of North America. Additionally, he is updating the information concerning porcelain. He asked the membership to please send him information concerning these endeavors. Bob reminded everyone that dues and contributions can be made through the internet. Please review this information on the NIA website.



Old Business – During the past year the Board of Directors approved the following items: The inclusion of the Calendar of Events in Drip Points. This includes shows hosted by NIA members.

Approval for members to submit one free personal (wanted) ad and one free classified (for sale) ad per year. (Printed together or separately in one issue of Drip Points).

Approval of quotes from Modern Litho-Print Company to print the 2012 NIA Handbook and to print the NIA Drip Points Magazine. This includes providing packaging and mailing services. Approval for NIA members to place advertising in Drip Points The Board approved the recipient of the scholarship award

New Business – Lou shared the following items which were approved by the Board in their meeting on June 21, 2012: An opportunity/challenge has been offered to the membership. An anonymous donor will match all gifts/donations up to a total of \$10,000.00.

Lou thanked Bill Snell, Colin Jung and Glenn Drummond for their service to the Board and their contribution to the hobby.

Lou reviewed the schedule of events for the remainder of the Kansas City National.

Lou opened the floor to the members for any questions or comments.

A question was asked concerning who is responsible to insure that the 501 (c) (3) requirements are met. Lou advised that a newly formed Finance Committee, which includes the Treasurer, will be responsible to insure that the NIA is in compliance with all 501 (c) (3) statutes.

Another member asked if a financial contribution is given to the NIA, will the donor receive a letter of acknowledgement? Yes. Lou advised that the donor would receive a letter from the President and Treasurer. Additionally, all donors will remain anonymous unless a donor wishes to receive public acknowledgement.

Dwayne Anthony shared with the members that Clarice Gordon is experiencing some health issues. Dwayne suggested that we send her cards of encouragement.

In closing, Lou announced that the 2013 National will be in Nashville, Tennessee, on July 19-21. Lou introduced the show hosts... Bill Haley, Ken Roberts and Steve Roberts.

At 5:10 pm Lou received a motion and second to adjourn. The motion was approved by the members.

The Summer edition of Drip Points said "Last Issue" near the address on the back cover. This was an error on the part of the printer and no memberships had expired, nor would Drip Points cease being sent. All NIA memberships are for the calendar year and end on December 31st. If ever in doubt about when your membership expires just check the upper right hand corner of your membership card and it will tell you when your membership expires. The Board of Directors extends it apologies for any confusion on this issue.

This is a record year for NIA membership. 2008 was our previous highest membership year with 1719 current members by the end of the year. This year we have 1744 current members as of this writing and renewals and new member applications are still arriving. Part of what is driving the increase in members includes new endeavors of the NIA. The NIA is now a 501c3 non-profit organization, it now offers annual scholarships, various projects are becoming a reality and promoting the hobby in general, and the current format of Drip Points has been dramatically enhanced. While all of these are good things and the right things to be doing, the cost of doing them is going up. At this year's board meeting, the NIA Board of Directors approved an increase in NIA annual dues beginning with renewals for 2013 and beyond. This is the first dues increase in many years and still keeps the annual dues rate very low. The dues structure is as follows:

Regular members (including families)	\$22.00
Junior members	\$5.00
Club memberships	\$50.00

It was also reiterated that insulator clubs must have current NIA memberships to participate in NIA benefits such as insurance through the NIA for their shows.

Please keep these new rates in mind when renewing your membership to save having your renewal returned for insufficient funds. Also, by renewing prior to the renewal notices going out in October saves the cost of sending the renewal notice. Keep in mind that donations added to your dues payment are probably tax deductible. Consider sending a little extra each time you renew. Consider donating substantially to one of the projects (Insulator company plaques, scholarships, color for Drip Points, etc.).

What a great hobby! Thank you for supporting the hobby and the NIA!

Insulator Hobby Promotion:

You might be surprised to find that this article is not about the National Convention. I am sorry to say I could not attend this year and I am sure the largest part of this issue will focus on the great event. My article touches on a local show and the events that followed.

For the last two years Kim Borgman has hosted a show in Lebanon, Indiana (just north of Indianapolis). His show has been successful due to location and the fact that he has welcomed our "collecting brothers", the bottle collectors.

When I started collecting in the late 1960s, bottle shows were a large part of the how one acquired glass. Those were the days when "for sale and trade lists" were snail mailed. We certainly have advanced since then. I do not miss those days because the lists were tons of work and expense.

As a result of this renewed contact with the local bottle collectors, I recently joined the Circle City Bottle Club. Many readers probably belong to a local bottle club. Our club started only a few months ago when three privy diggers / bottle collectors decided to pursue a monthly meeting. It has grown considerably in just a few months. A typical meeting will have 20+ people.

We do a "show and tell" each month and also have a featured speaker; but the club has established a goal of growth. To that end, we are currently pursuing a number of display venues. We are currently putting together a traveling display that will offer education about bottles, milk bottles, candy containers, and I am sure we will get some insulators in there too.

The first target on our hit list was the local libraries in the nine county Greater Indianapolis area. We have already scheduled a number of locations in one County and I just received an email confirming the ability to place a display in our State Historical Museum.

If the train hasn't hit you yet, let me make it clear....one collector or several can undertake this venture. All the display venues we have found are secured. We started with libraries and working our way to historical venues. Schools could also be on the hit list.

We found that we have enough loaned material to fill the largest display venue and can reduce the display to fit smaller cases.

Think of all the visitors to a library, a school, church, etc. that could learn about the insulator hobby. For those show hosts, this is another activity that can precede your show and promote the show to the public. It can be a great teaser to get your attendance increased.

I hope some of you will consider this activity. It can be a real learning experience if you want to create some educational materials to accompany the display. I also suggest that if a club or group is doing this activity, a contribution of an insulator book to the library can be a great idea. Put the club contact information in the book so the read can find someone local.

Another great way to donate is to give your collection or a part of it---or even a single insulator or related item---to the NIA. You'll be required to state the value since the NIA is not allowed to establish value on any gift of a noncash item. If audited, the NIA would be asked to show evidence that the donor used some established and traceable form of declaring value that was consistent with current fair market value such as the Price Guide or recent sales activity (ICON, eBay, etc.). The NIA has the right to accept or deny any gift, especially if it's an item that they feel cannot be easily converted to cash.

Remember that any donated cash or item---unless it is specifically instructed otherwise by the donor---may be used by the NIA for any of its charitable purposes, but no board member, officer, advisor, committee member, or NIA member can benefit monetarily from any donation to the organization. This should ease any distrust held over from the days of the good 'ole boys when many NIA members were skeptical about the financial activity of the board. Such activity is now controlled and monitored by the IRS.

I hope to see many of you at The Springfield Experience (Mid-Ohio) in November.



2012 NIA National Show Report

The blur of what was the second half of 2011 and first half of 2012 went into overdrive early, Thursday, June 21 at the Expo Center with Darryl and myself meeting in the hall going over the last of the details. As tables were being set up and a few NIA Officers sticking their noses in awaiting the kickoff of their meetings, Darryl and I split up heading to our separate ends of the city in preparation for extracurricular activities.

I had previously placed flyers in my neighbors' doors warning them of their normally quiet neighbor filling the cul-de-sac with cars and busses making regular deliveries and pickups. I prepared for the onslaught of humanity at my home while Darryl assisted dealer setup and made last minute show tweaks.

Make Plans to Attend the 2013 NIA National July 19-21, 2013



Everyone is invited to the 44th NIA National Convention and Show on July 19-21, 2013, to be held in Franklin, Tennessee, just 10 miles south of Nashville. The show will be held at the Franklin Marriott Cool Springs, 700 Cool Springs Blvd, Franklin, TN 37067, an all-inclusive conference facility located within 2 blocks of I-65 and a 20-25 minute drive from the Nashville International Airport. Show hosts are Bill Haley, Steve Roberts and Ken Roberts and the Dixie Jewels Insulator Club will be the show sponsor.

Nashville and Franklin have much to offer you and your family within easy driving distance from the convention facility. Choose from the Grand Ole Opry, Country Music Hall of Fame, Musicians Hall of Fame and Museum, Nashville Sounds AAA baseball, Tennessee Performing Arts Center, the

Tennessee State Museum, the General Jackson Show Boat, numerous Civil War historical battlefields and more. Golf and a jogging trail are nearby. If you feel the need for shopping, the Cool Springs Galleria Shopping Mall is very close.

All scheduled meetings and the awards banquet will be less than a one minute walk from the show hall and parking around the conference facility is free. The 13,550 square foot Champion Ballroom show hall has space for over 130 dealer's tables and at least 25 displays. It is in the same building as the hotel, as are Lorraine's Restaurant, The Stirrup Cup Lounge, Coffee, Etc., an indoor swimming pool and whirlpool, exercise room and business center. High speed internet access will be provided all participants. Concierge services are also available.

We have secured a large block of rooms, all at an affordable rate. A room reservation code will be available after August 1, 2012 and you'll need to mention the National Insulator Association when making a reservation. As soon as this information becomes available it will be widely distributed in insulator publications and on the web. The show packet will also be updated as information comes in.

Over 40 sales tables were reserved at the Kansas City National in June. As an incentive to reserve early, six foot tables with tablecloth and skirt are available for \$45 each if reserved by May 31, 2013. After that the price will be \$55. Electricity will be an additional

\$25 per table charge. Each table will be furnished with two free chairs. There will be no charge for display tables.



NIA Hall of Fame Inductee | Jack H. Tod (NIA#13)



Jack passed away on September 8, 1990. He was employed with Motorola Research Labs in Phoenix, AZ after graduating with an electrical engineering degree. Jack was also a prominent coin dealer in the U. S. and apparently was very successful. In the 1960's he retired from Motorola after selling his coin business.

He was also very interested in the local Indian culture and often demonstrated basket weaving techniques.

Jack became interested in porcelain insulators some time around the mid 1960's. He was very inquisitive and started researching insulator manufacturers. He made many trips East to old plant sites to dig around for insulator shards and do research in area libraries and museums. He visited and corresponded with managers at all the major insulator manufacturers at that time and they helped him tremendously with what they could find in old files.

Jack's first book, Porcelain insulators Guide Book for Collectors was published in 1971. It laid out a system of identifying and cataloging Unipart pin-type insulators using U-numbers. The book contained scale drawings, which Jack made himself, of more than 900 insulator styles plus histories of all manufacturers and the markings they used on insulators. In 1976, he published the 2nd edition of the book and, in 1988, the 3rd edition with more updated material.

In 1977, the culmination of years of research and examining old insulator factory sites Jack published his second book, The History of the Electrical Porcelain Industry in the United States. Jack's curiosity led him to acquire a huge amount of information that was quickly being lost to time. His own words describe why he wrote the book:

"This book was also born out of fear – a fear that the vast amount of data I have accumulated might be accidentally lost to future historians. I might die, or the house containing the files might burn down! It thus became of paramount importance to stop being curious long enough to draw a line on the research and publish the key information already at hand."

In 1985 he also published a book about the more important insulator related patents: Insulator Patents 1880 – 1960. This is a publication of his entire personal file covering 695 insulator patents. Elton Gish has taken Jack's patent research and expanded it to more than 2400 patents.

Jack started editing the Porcelain Insulator News column in November, 1971, which appeared regularly in the hobby magazine, Crown Jewels of the Wire. He continued as editor until his last column appeared in the June, 1984 issue.

Jack helped Marilyn Albers with her books on Woldwide Porcelain Insulators by making all the scale drawings and laying out the U-chart for foreign porcelain insulators. In her announcement of the new foreign glass chart titled Glass Insulators from Outside North America, Marilyn wrote, "Without Jack Tod's beautiful drawings there would not have been a design chart at all, so I am most indebted to him for his help."

When Jack and Marilyn unveiled their book Worldwide Porcelain Insulators – 1986 Supplement, Marilyn also wrote "Now you will be able to see a total of 230 scale drawings of foreign glass insulators, beautifully done by Jack, as well as representative traced markings."

Jack also served the NIA as Chairman of the By-Laws Committee from 1976 to 1984.

He has been duly recognized for his contributions, having received the NIA Outstanding Service Award in 1979 and, together with wife Caroline, the NIA's highest honor, Lifetime Membership, in 1984.



When Jack died his wife asked Elton Gish to present the Jack Tod Memorial Award in his honor. The award is presented for the Best Exhibit Using Porcelain Insulators and is based on educational appeal.

NIA Hall of Fame Inductee | Marilyn Albers (NIA #541)



In February of 2010, the insulator hobby lost one of its finest jewels, Marilyn Albers. Marilyn was born in Libertyville, Illinois in 1927. In 1945, she met "the love of her life" Bill at the University of Colorado in Boulder from which they both graduated. They married in 1949. Bill's work in oil exploration took them throughout the United States and Canada and eventually to Houston, Texas. They were blessed with six children, and she became the grandmother of twenty grandchildren and the great grandmother to five. Marilyn's hobbies included playing classical guitar, Girl Scouting, running, sewing, and collecting insulators. She was an incredible hostess to all who visited and, in the finest Texas tradition, was one of the most gracious ladies you could ever know. In the decades preceding her passing she was one of the most influential and prodigious contributors in the history of insulator collecting.

Her collection began in 1973, like for so many of us, with a stop at an antique store. There was a window display of many colorful glass insulators and husband Bill gifted her three pieces for her birthday. Bill probably came to wonder what type of monster he had unleashed, after such a harmless beginning, because

Marilyn's insulator collection would ultimately number in the thousands.

Starting with a general glass collection, Marilyn subsequently developed an affinity for foreign insulators of all types and became heavily involved in collecting, researching, and documenting all she could discover about them. She traveled throughout the world visiting collectors, acquiring specimens, and conducting research. In 1981, with the help of Woody Woodward, Marilyn compiled the book "Glass Insulators from Outside North America," a companion book to "Worldwide Porcelain Insulators, which she co-authored with Jack Tod the following year. 1986 saw the publication of "Glass Insulators from Outside North America, First Revision" (Albers/Woodward) and "Worldwide Porcelain Insulators, 1986 Supplement" (Albers/Tod). These references remain the standard works on the subject of foreign insulators thirty-plus years later.

In addition to her books, Marilyn became the Foreign Insulators editor for Crown Jewels of the Wire magazine in July of 1979. She continued to serve in this demanding role until December of 2002, a period of over 23 years. The depth of her commitment can best be realized by searching the Crown Jewels online archives where the name Marilyn Albers produces an astonishing 379 hits!

Marilyn served the hobby in many ways other than her research and writing. She was active in several local clubs as well as the NIA which she served as Awards & Recognitions Committee Chair (1980 -1982), as our only lady President (1982 – 1984) and as Central Region Vice-President (1991 – 1994).

She has been duly recognized for her contributions having received the NIA Outstanding Service Award in 1982 and together with Bill, the NIA's highest honor, Lifetime Membership, in 1988. The NIA has also honored Marilyn by naming the award for the best competitive display at the National Show in the "Foreign" category the "Marilyn Albers Memorial Award."

She assisted with many local shows and was a co-host of the two NIA National Shows held in Houston, Texas, first in 1988 and again in 1994. Marilyn was also a prolific exhibitor at dozens of shows where she consistently developed some of the most creative displays ever assembled. She was a selfless mentor to countless collectors who sought her advice and assistance.

Husband Bill has stated: "Joining Jack Tod and Woody Woodward in the NIA Hall of Fame place's her in the company of two men that nurtured her love of the hobby.



NIA Hall of Fame Inductee | Nathan R. Woodward



Nathan R. Woodward was born in National City, California in 1927. He lived in western Oregon during the Depression and early war years. It was there that he first noticed insulators and began collecting them at the age of 8. As he grew a little older, he mastered the art of pole climbing. The man responsible for line maintenance in the area had decided that Woody was a potential insulator thief. And, if he ever saw Woody even looking at a pole, he would stop his Model A Ford in the middle of the road and deliver a scolding!

At age 15 he left home to work in Salem, Oregon. At age 16 he was living behind a restaurant operated by two older sisters who started calling him "Woody," and it has stuck ever since.

Woody moved to Dayton, Washington, Hillsboro, Oregon, and Corvallis, Oregon, working for Southern Pacific Railroad. Then came two years in the Army, from 1950 to

1952. Once out of the Army, Woody went to Portland, Oregon, working for the Union Pacific Railroad. In Salt Lake City, Utah he worked for the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad. Moving to Los Angeles, California he worked for the Atchison Topeka & Santa Fe and the Southern Pacific Railroads. He headed on to Chicago, Illinois, and worked for the Chicago Milwaukee St. Paul & Pacific Railroad (The Milwaukee Road). These were followed by other jobs in Chicago, Houston, back to Chicago and then back to Houston where he retired in 1993.

His work years can be summed up this way: he held numerous odd jobs, and worked for five different railroads over a period of ten years in six different cities. During this time there were weeks or many months wandering, drifting between odd jobs, visiting nearly every city and state. Often he would be employed only two or three months out of a year, and be "on the road" the rest of the time. Many of the insulators he observed were seen from the top of a boxcar! He once shared with Clarice Gordon: "This is not the choice location. A flatcar, gondola, or empty boxcar, if the door is open on the same side as the pole line, is less hazardous and gives a good view. On the other hand, riding the running board of a tank car is no doubt the most hazardous, but I've done plenty of that as well."

It was during those years that Woody collected most of the historical data on insulators, having begun collecting in earnest in 1951. Serious research began in 1955, and really got off the ground in 1956, with numerous hours spent in the patent files in the Los Angeles Library. After meeting William McLaughlin, Woody subsequently visited every location he could identify with the manufacture of insulators. It was from this research that the 1965 Report was compiled.

Woody has stated "My first visit with William McLaughlin was on July 24, 1956. We visited several more times, and continued to correspond through the years. I have two fat files of letters from him, and never threw away a word he wrote. Woody met many other old-timers who were able to provide valuable insight into various manufacturing operations. There was Goody Godwin, the last member of the Gayner family to remember insulator production; Charles J. McHale, who, in his 90's, described vividly the Harloe insulator plant; William H. Loyd, retired secretary-treasurer of Lynchburg Glass Corp., who supplied Woody with complete remaining company records; and William Brookfield. These are only a few of those who helped to make the picture as complete as it is.

In the 1980s Woody made two trips to England. He spent about ten days each time, courtesy of a fellow Mensa member with whom he had been corresponding.

As most insulator collectors know, Woody developed the Consolidated Design (CD) Number System now universally accepted as the standard for glass insulator identification. The idea was born probably in 1951. Woody has stated: "At the outset I developed a CD system that I used for a year or so, but it didn't suit, so I scrapped it and started the system we use today. The system we use today was finalized in 1953 or 1954." Every different threaded glass pin-type insulator style found so far has been assigned its own CD number by Woody, and he is the only person with the authority to issue new numbers.



Public use of the CD numbers was first initiated by someone other than Woody in 1965, when early collector Helmer Turner asked for and received a list of the numbers for use in his personal collection. It was later through his efforts that the CD numbers began to come into general use. They first appeared in Woody's 1967 Report.

Woody's literary contributions to the hobby are many. He has authored five books and co-authored two others. His first one was "The Glass Insulator in America, 1865-1965 Progress Report," which was soon followed by "The Glass Insulator in America, 1967 Report," 1969 Report, 1973 Report, and 1988 Report. With the exception of the 1965 Report, which was only text, the books contain scale drawings of the CD numbers. "Glass Insulators from Outside North America was co-authored by Woody and Marilyn Albers in 1986, with the "Second Revision" published in 1993.

For many years, Woody volunteered to answer questions related to insulators through the pages of Crown Jewels of the Wire. His first column, "Questions Answered," appeared in November, 1969. At times he also answered questions in a column called "Research Division." In December, 1986 his column was renamed "Ask Woody." Through these columns Woody has answered hundreds of collector's questions, sharing his vast storehouse of knowledge with others. He is a walking encyclopedia of insulator data, and willingly dispenses it to anyone who writes for help.

In addition to the question-and-answer columns, Woody has written at least eight articles for Crown Jewels of the Wire, which includes several obituaries, articles on insulator colors, and the use and explanation of CD numbers, among other subjects.

The Lone Star Insulator Club presents an award in Woody's name. In 1992, the club initiated the annual N. R. Woodward Literary Award. This award honors one writer each year for the published article that best demonstrates research or promotion of the insulator hobby.

NIA Outstanding Service Award



The "Outstanding Service Award" may be presented to an NIA member who has performed outstanding service for the NIA and contributed substantially to the insulator hobby.

This year's recipient's contributions to the hobby first appeared in the 1995 Price Guide. He has created all of the line drawings (profile and section) that have appeared in the price guides since. There are over 700 drawings in the current 2011 Price Guide. A couple of hundred of those drawings were created specifically for this edition. Many of these are included in the Appendix titled "Sample Insulator Style Variations within a CD Number."

The 2011 Price Guide author, Don Briel, has stated in the "Acknowledgements" section: Our recipient, "has provided all of the insulator drawings. Many were in the last Price Guide, but he also donated numerous hours in creating dozens of new drawings and improving older ones."

I learned from John McDougald that the cover graphics for the price guides from 1995 to 2007 were created by our recipient. The cover graphics used for the 1998 National in Williamsburg, VA and the 2003 Western Regional in San Jose, CA also were done by our Recipient.

He was a co-host of the 1998 NIA National in Williamsburg, VA.

He is a member of the NIA Rules and Procedures Advisory Panel.

He is the President of the Chesapeake Bay Insulator Club.

He is currently Chief of Staff, United States Military Academy, West Point.

This year's Outstanding Service Award is presented to NIA Member #8871, Col. Gus Stafford.



NIA Lifetime Membership Award



The NIA Lifetime Membership Award is the highest honor that can be given to a fellow hobbyist. Recipients include NIA members who have donated significant portions of their lives for the betterment of collecting. The effort taken to recognize those who have given hundreds or thousands of hours and/or dollars to the hobby should not be taken lightly.

Lifetime Membership is for a couple, as the spouse is often involved, or at least very supportive of the primary person honored. In some cases, the spouse is also involved in the hobby in a formal capacity and, in that case, the contributions of both people are recognized.

In keeping with tradition, I will be using "He, She and They" during this presentation.

"She" was born on a farm near St. Joseph, Missouri in 1948. After graduating from the University of Arkansas, she returned to St. Joseph and became a high school math teacher.

"He" was born in St. Joseph in 1947 where he has lived all his life. After military service he went to work for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in 1966.

"They" met in the fall of 1971 and were married in St. Joseph in 1973.

"He" first became interested in insulators in 1969. At that time, he had no idea that such color and variety existed. In 1978 he met an active collector who introduced him to Crown Jewels magazine, Milholland's book, and the NIA. That collector has since become their close friend. Quoting our recipient, "I owe Charles Brandon for getting me started seriously collecting."

Although "She" likes insulators, she has also collected cookie jars (about 120), quilts, crockery, and kitchen primitives.

"He" also is a multiple collector. He has collected telephone company advertising items, Bell paperweights, porcelain signs, employee badges, pocket mirrors, telephone company china, cast iron telephone trucks, buttons and pins, quilt lightning rod balls and, with that much stuff, DUST.

"They" attended their first National in 1979, in Denver, Colorado and have missed very few since.

"He" has served as President and Vice-President of the Missouri Valley Insulator Club.

"She" has served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Missouri Valley Insulator Club. She also edited the club newsletter until 2007. She is currently involved in archiving the club history.

"He" served as NIA Central Region Vice-President from 1985 thru 1988.

"They have hosted numerous local shows in St Joseph. They were co-hosts for the 1991 NIA National in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and again in 2009, for the NIA National at Coralville, Iowa.

They share 33 years as members of the NIA, He is NIA #1889 and she is NIA #1954.

In "Bea Lines," February, 1990, Crown Jewels of the Wire, author Clarice Gordon wrote: "[They] are very friendly people, and they always bring lots of laughter and fun with them to every show they attend." This year's Lifetime Membership Awards go to



NIA Scholarship Award



In order to encourage growth and public awareness of the insulator hobby through collecting, dealing, and educational endeavors the Association has established the NIA Scholarship Fund. Grants may be awarded as an Academic Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00 and/or a Vocational Scholarship in the amount of \$500.00. An Academic Scholarship is renewable for one additional year upon reapplication by the recipient. A Vocational Scholarship is not renewable.

It is the intention of the NIA and its Board of Directors to award at least one scholarship each year. Gifts to the scholarship fund can be made at any time and in any amount.

Our Scholarship Committee Chair, Kay Bryant, received 28 applications for the academic scholarship. After much deliberation by the committee, they submitted their selection to the Board of Directors for final approval.

The person receiving the first NIA Scholarship Award of \$1,000.00 is Mona Dai.

Mona is from Valley Park, Missouri. She graduated 2011, first in her high school class of 430. Her Cumulative grade point average was 4.745. Extracurricular activities included science fair, robotics and varsity tennis. She is enrolled full-time in Duke University where she has completed her freshman year. She is pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree in Environmental Engineering.

Her work experience includes Research Assistant for the Duke University – Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering. Here, she is helping research, design, and build an up-flow anaerobic sludge blanket digester which has the potential to be implemented for waste processing in third-world countries.

She was a Student Researcher during the summer of 2010 at the NASA Missouri Space Grant Consortium – UMSL Physics & Astronomy Department. She worked in a laboratory analyzing molecular gas emission from comet T7 using infrared spectroscopy.

She was unable to be in attendance at the NIA Awards Banquet because she was in Uganda during the summer, volunteering for a sustainable agriculture project sponsored and paid for by Duke University.

Austria, Hungary, Italy, Sweden, England and USA. After the show was a more formal tour of Frantisek's collection for those who arrived on Saturday.

In the evening we gathered at a local restaurant for the customary meal. By no means is this a banquet like you'll see at a National or Springfield but the host of the 2010 show in Germany, Ulrich Reiser, provided a short slide show on fake insulators and some images from a hunt in France.

The show is officially a one day event but a bunch of collectors were at Frantisek's place again on Sunday morning for yet another viewing of his massive collection. This tour also looked at other rooms in the mill, including one which is full of control panels from a 1920's power station.

The European Swap Meet took place in the village of Obratan in the Czech Republic on Saturday July 14th. Some collectors arrived on Friday and were treated to a guided tour of show host Frantisek Danek's property which is a former mill. Frantisek has the largest collection in Europe with around 10,000 insulators. His vast collection covers four floors of the mill together with a large suspension collection outside.

The main event was held on Saturday inside the sports hall of a local school. European shows are still considerably smaller than events in North America but size isn't everything. At its peak I estimated there were 30 people in the hall. The majority were from Germany and others were from Czech Republic,





The next European show is scheduled to take place on the east coast of Italy in late June of 2014.

London Calling

40 Years As Remembered By "The New Guy"



When Steve and Lois Blair asked me to step up to the plate and help out with the Mid-Ohio Insulator Show last year, I felt an odd sense of obligation based primarily on nostalgia. The "London Show"--the name used as reference in the early years--was where insulator collecting began for my brother and I in 1972. Earlier that summer, we had walked the railroad tracks near Unionville Center, Ohio with our grandparents and discovered our first big find...clear Hemingray 42s. It was a start and eventually led us to the Mount Gilead, Ohio bottle show in September, 1972 where we met a pair of local insulator collectors, the late Pete Bishop and Gary Curts. These two collectors were both courteous and informative, and they invited us to attend a gathering of exclusive insulator collectors at the Fairgrounds in London, Ohio. Could it be that such an event existed? As we all know, Steve and Lois had hosted the first Mid-

Ohio Show the previous November in the tiny and chilly quonset hut that early collectors came to know and dread. All of the early pioneers of the hobby earned their bones at the first few Mid-Ohio shows, which further helps to illustrate the longevity of the event.

It was a cold and dreary morning on Saturday, November 4th, 1972 when my brother and I entered the building for the first of what would become a 40-year annual journey. Just inside the door, we met Steve and Lois for the first time, paid a minimal admission, and made our first "legitimate" purchase...a CD 134 W.F.G. SCA signal. The Blairs sold it to us for only \$6, and our collecting had begun. 40 years and thousands of dollars later, we still own it. Our next stop was across the aisle where we met Jack Snyder and Bob Wicks from the Toledo area. These were two great guys and Jack remains a pal of ours to this day. We purchased our second insulator from Jack...a bubbly CD 112 S.B.T.&T which also occupies a space on our shelves 40 years later. We purchased an aqua Hemingray 25 from Pete Bishop for \$8, and a Pyrex 63 carnival from Logan, Ohio collector Roger Hosler. And just like that, our budget was tapped. After all, we were both teenagers so our \$40 shopping spree didn't last as long as we'd hoped.

Over the next few years, Alan and I came to know fellow collectors Dick Bowman, Paul Houpt, Jerry & Marilyn Turner, Glenn & Sandy Drummond, John & Carol McDougald, Bob Nobbe, Paul Kelly, Vern Russell, Bob Fast, and an equally young Ray Klingensmith. All of them gathered each November to bundle in the cold of the metal shack against the constant smell of chicken and noodles. Although other commitments have forced me to miss a few Mid-Ohio Shows over the years, my brother is proud to say that he has attended every "London Show" since 1972. Not even openheart surgery kept him away. Who knew that 40 years ago when we first entered that fairgrounds building we would ever behold five-digit insulator values or catalog auctions, much less have to deal with the burden of faked and treated insulators? To quote an over used phrase, "it was a much simpler time." More importantly, the hobby needed shows in the early years. We obviously had no Internet, no cellular phones, no on-line auctions...in fact, we barely had any heat! Which speaks even more to the longevity and success of the Mid-Ohio Show and the dedication its promoters have provided. My brother and I have witnessed many Mid-Ohio shows which have exceeded the expectations and quality of even the National shows. We have watched it grow from a small social gathering to a 150-table, sold out annual event. And I'm proud to say that after 40 years in the shadows, "the new guy" is now involved with what will hopefully be the continued success of an established weekend. The vivid memories of that first show persist where seemingly important thoughts from just last week fail me. And at the risk of waxing rhapsodic, that first London Show is paramount to 40 years of collecting glass and my reason for assuring Steve and Lois that it continues.

To be or not to be?

Maybe, "Is it or isn't it" is the better title; but regardless, this piece (see photo #1) was obviously not meant to be, or stay the cornflower blue it was thought to be by the seller, & myself when I took possession of it two Springfield Shows ago. Ever in search of scarce colors, it didn't take much for this AM TEL cornflower blue toll to catch my eve among the sea of glass, as I made my way along the aisles of the Springfield Experience 2010. Eureka! I thought, as I reached down to pick it up. Where'd you get this one you lucky bugger you, I says to the seller as I'm looking the piece over. In a 5 gallon bucket at a farm sale he replies. Though cornflower is a listed color for the AM TEL toll in the price guide, this was the first one I'd seen, and it didn't really surprise me that it would be found on this collector/dealers table, since he's always going to farm sales, auctions and antique stores, and I make a point of seeking him out in hopes that the previous year has produced a few out of the ordinary insulators for sale or simply show and tell. cornflower blue's one of my favorite colors, and I've managed to find a nice variety of differing shades within the Duquenses, Hemingray's, W.F.G. CO. and Mclaughlin lines, yet I'd never even seen the elusive cornflower AM TEL & TEL Toll, never mind the opportunity to add one to my shelf. I fondled the piece for a minute or two, took it outside for a look-see in natural light, attempting to give the impression of contemplation, all

the while knowing it wasn't going anywhere except home with me. A few "would you takes" followed by a few "I could go's" and there I am, walking away a happy man, knowing the Springfield Experience has once again exceeded my expectations for scarce and unusual finds. It wasn't until an hour or two of "look what I just picked" ups that I ran into our Authentication & Classification Chairman. Upon proudly showing my new acquisition to him, I got the unexpected reply... The color looks suspect to me, you might want to keep an eye on it for color change. Well, just hit me over the head I thought as I walked away thinking, come on, I can tell a good color from an altered one... can't I? Looking back (hindsight being 20/20), I probably should have gone back to the seller, shared the bad news and worked something out. Instead, being the hard headed... I know a real color when I see it- I don't need no darn map to get there. No I'm not going to ask for directions kind of guy... I decided to try and put any thoughts of it being a bad color out of my head until I got home and had the chance to put it through a few tests and prove it genuine. Upon arrival back in Colorado, I immediately prepared the insulator for its long stay outdoors in the Colorado sunshine. I was shooting for a half exposed, half unexposed effect so I did my best to block any of the suns UV's rays from reaching the dome portion by masking both inside and outside and spray painting the exposed dome glass with flat black paint (see photo #2). The piece was then placed outside in direct sun for 18 months. I was





tempted to cut the test period short when repeated viewings out the window showed no

obvious change in color, but I stuck to my original 18 month goal. Finally came the day of reckoning. I removed and placed the piece in a acetone bath for 2 hours and out popped the ugliest two toner I'd ever seen. (see photo #3 and #4) Actually both shades of blue are very nice, just one being a sickly reminder that my eyes had deceived me, and what I had actually purchased was a nice two dollar light blue toll, not a scarce cornflower blue toll. Though the result of this test was disheartening, its sting pales by comparison " it looks suspect to me". This wasn't mega dollar piece, so I can't help to my first hearing those words: but think of it as a learning experience. One thing's for certain, the memory of this experience will come to mind and affect the way I look at my next scarce color buy.

If there's a motto here... for me it may be: There are some pretty good copies out there (see photo #4 for altered compared to real deal). Don't let the initial excitement of a sought after find overshadow common sense and lead to impulsive buying.

As an aside: I want to make it very clear that the seller of this piece has always been a trusted and standup kind of person to deal with, and I firmly believe he was convinced this insulator's color was genuine cornflower, and therefore his name wasn't used in writing about this experience.

The National Insulator Association Glass Commemoratives



History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 1/4 inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project was continued by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemoratives through 2009 at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Many thanks to the McDougald's for 30 years of production and for allowing the NIA to take over this venture in 2010! Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives will go to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(3)c.

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

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
