I want to thank those people who voted for my candidacy for the Central Vice President's position. I am enthusiastic in the voter turn out which I was told the best in years and the fairly close split of the votes. I will continue to be a member of the NIA as I think there is a need in the hobby for such an organization and I will continue to express the need for a change in the NIA and the NIA Executive Board structure as long as I feel that it is not properly representing the grass roots collectors. Unlike the outgoing 2nd Past President who remarked in the Spring Drip Points, "Unless you've walked in the shoes of a board member, one is unqualified to evaluate the quality of the journey", many of us view that there is an arrogance among board members which excludes both criticism and the small

collector. As collectors and NIA members, we should be more critical in our examination of the board members and their actions because they are supposed to represent <u>us</u>. When people serve past three years and continue in a position six or seven years, you lose the vitality of new blood on the NIA board. When an organization pulls people from a small and narrow group, the perception of a "click" can be created.

On the other hand, we as members need to be open with our gripes and complaints. If the Executive Board is not inundated with these complaints, they become insulated and somewhat smug. If the only reason you join the NIA is to attend NIA Friday, you should express your dissent with the NIA either by addressing an NIA official or by writing

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Drip Points. There is a growing apathy that was dramatically demonstrated by the low turnout in attendance of the NIA business meetings. Lack of collector voice and participation only weakens the NIA.

NIA. This may be accomplished by getting more collectors from a more diverse section of our hobby to be involved in the NIA and the NIA Executive Board.

Greetings Members,

I realize all the hard work it is to gather the large and small details to pull off a national show, and have it run smoothly. In talking to the dealers, they seemed to be satisfied with their sales. Some of the highlights of the Board of Directors meeting on Thursday, June 30th are as follows:

This list will also be available to the Show Standards Chairperson and to the hosts of sanctioned shows, as aid an to identification.
- 7. The scheduling of National Show dates over the 4th of July weekend detracts from show attendance and therefore, other options should be explored within reason.
- 8. Dwayne Anthony reported that a number of members have taken out insurance policies for their insulators.
- 9. The Hemingray office site was discussed as a possible museum site, but the costs were too high to even think about a purchase.

As you can see, the topics discussed do have great impact on where <u>you the membership</u> want the association to head.

I want to thank every one of my Directors

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and Chairpeople for a job well done and for continued progress as the year goes on.

This problem is not isolated within the insulator and/or LRB collecting hobby. Reproductions of all types of early glass collectibles are showing up more and more at flea markets, in antique shops, in mail-order catalogs, etc. As many of us are also antique bottle collectors, I'd like to briefly bring to your attention the recent disclosure that unscrupulous persons are altering common and semi-rare bottles to appear as rare variations. Specifically, expanded or wide mouth bottles, which

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are sometimes referred to as whimsies, are being fabricated after slow, controlled heating to the glass softening point. These items are very difficult to tell from originals, which demand very high prices, so be very sure of the authenticity of any items of this nature that you purchase!

Finally, some great shows are coming up in the Central Region this Fall, so try to attend a few. While you're there, try to promote our hobby to the less knowledgeable! The following is a list of cities and dates for upcoming insulator (in

WHAT THE NIA CONSIDERS ETHICAL CONDUCT

s a member of the NIA, you must conduct yourself in an ethical manner. This means **that** you must conduct collecting and dealing activities honorably, honestly, and in a manner which will present a good image of the hobby to the public and collectors, whether they are NIA members or not. The guidelines are guite simple and straight forward. If you can answer yes to the question, "Would I be offended or feel cheated if I were on the other end of the transaction?", then chances are you are not following the NIA Code of Ethics. To put it even simpler, "Treat others in the same manner that you yourself demand to be treated by others."

Everyone knows what is right and wrong, but the NIA decided from the start that it would be beneficial to establish a Code of Ethics to act as a guideline to help settle problems and disputes between its members. The NIA Code of Ethics can be found in your Membership Handbook (if you can find it). It is reprinted on the next page to refresh your memory.

Too often I hear the questions: "What are the benefits of becoming a NIA member?", "Why should I join if I cannot go to the National Show this year (to get in on NIA Day on Friday)?" One of the little known major benefits of NIA membership is having an impartial representative fight for you to attempt to settle problems and disputes. That person is the Ethics

If you have a problem with a collector, please make several attempts to settle the matter, including calling the person (more than once) to discuss the situation. Often the dispute is simply a misunderstanding. If you cannot resolve an ethical problem, please do not hesitate to contact me directly (P.O. Box 1317, Buna, TX 77612, 409 -994-5662). Sometimes a phone call can help settle the matter. Written details and copies of documentation

are required in the more difficult cases. You may be surprised at the options available and the success of our efforts in your behalf. Only in extremely rare cases do we have to resort to canceling the membership and publishing the name and address of the offending party in the NIA Drip Points. Remember that you must be a NIA member to utilize this service -which costs you nothing more than an annual membership. Happy Collecting!!

NIA CODE OF ETHICS

Adopted by the NIA Board of Directors to guide membership in conducting their collecting and dealing activities honorably, honestly, and in a manner which will present a good image of the hobby to the public.

NIA members:

- 1. shall not engage in the manufacture of insulators or related items which can generally be termed frauds and which include, but are not limited to, deceptive reproductions or altered physical characteristics in any manner.
- 2. shall not engage in the manufacture of any reproductions, reprints, replicas, commemoratives or the like without first clearing the design with the NIA to make certain the items produced will not be termed "objectionable" to the hobby for any reason such as perpetration of fraud by secondary parties.
- 3. shall not engage in the sale, advertisement or exhibition of any insulators or related items deemed by the NIA to be "objectionable" in the best interests of the hobby.
- 4. shall make every effort to comply with standards established by the NIA for the accurate description of the type and condition of insulator specimens.
- 5. shall carry out trade and sale transactions expeditiously and fairly to the <u>satisfaction</u> of all parties involved.

- 6. shall conduct their collecting activities in a lawful manner and refrain from inferring to the public that the NIA or its members condone any harmful or unlawful practices in the pursuit of the hobby.
- 7. shall not knowingly misrepresent the rarity or value of insulators or related items they offer for sale or trade.
- 8. shall not make public accusations to fellow collectors about possible misconduct of any individual member or affiliated club, and shall refer such matters to the NIA office for arbitration.
- 9. shall not use any NIA emblems, insignia, or credentials in any manner detrimental to the interests of the NIA and shall report to the NIA any such use by others.
- 10. shall abide by all rules and policies established by the NIA and not be a disturbing influence at any NIA meetings or insulator shows.

Minutes of the General Membership Meeting of the National Insulator Association

Houston, TX July 1, 1994

he meeting was called to order at 6:32 p.m. by President Dwayne Anthony at the Hobby Airport Holiday Inn. Approximately 89 persons were in attendance including 14 members of the Board of Directors and various committees. After welcoming those in attendance, Dwayne introduced and thanked the show hosts Marilyn Albers, Jimmy Burns, Elton Gish, and John Hall.

OLD BUSINESS

The minutes of the 24th National Convention in Denver, CO were approved

on the motion/second of Kevin Lawless and Ross Huth.

Treasurer Ross Huth presented the financial report for fiscal year 1994.

Western Region Vice-president Grant Salzman announced the Western Regional Show scheduled for August 5-6, 1994 in Auburn, CA, and invited all to attend.

Outgoing Central Region Vice-president Marilyn Albers is leaving the Board of Directors after 9 years of service. She

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introduced special guests Marco Schmitz-Lehanne (Krefeld, Germany) and Warren and Faye Forster (New South Wales, Australia) who traveled great distances to participate in the show. She congratulated President Dwayne Anthony for a job well done.

Outgoing Second Past President Mike Guthrie thanked all of his friends in the hobby for providing so many happy moments during the past 8 years he served the hobby on the Board of Directors. He said that long after insulators have turned to dust, the friendships made would remain.

Kevin Lawless (Education & Promotions Chair), speaking for Eastern Region Vice-president Dick Bowman, invited everyone to the Eastern Regional Show in Kulpsville, PA on Sept. 24-25, 1994, and the Capital District Insulator Club Show.

Dwayne Anthony discussed the recently implemented insurance plan for insulator collections of NIA members. A question was raised about whether or not the membership was consulted about the program before it was approved. ln response it was mentioned that the program was discussed in Drip Points before it was finalized and input was not forthcoming. In addition, it was explained that the NIA had no power over the terms of the plan offered by the insurance carrier so that even if requests had been made which were different from the carrier's proposal, it was highly unlikely they would have been adopted.

Dwayne then discussed the NIA's recent actions on the subject of fakes and reproductions. He explained the background of the recent problems and

the NIA's efforts beginning with a position paper already published which is to be followed up with a listing of known or suspected fake and altered insulators and LRB's. A number of items had been removed from tables at the show already because they were not permanently marked as required. Any input from the membership on how to deal with the problem was requested and encouraged.

NEW BUSINESS

Rick Baldwin was introduced and installed as the new Central Region Vicepresident. He expressed his ambition to listen to the ideas of the membership on how to improve the hobby.

Grant Salzman encouraged members to start thinking about possible sites for the '96 National in the Western Region.

Tom Katonak (Info. Director) encouraged the submission of articles and stories to Drip Points.

Jill Meier (Product Marketing Chair) introduced the new NIA t-shirts and ambidextrous coffee mugs. Several of the NIA products were then given away to those present through drawings sponsored by Grant Salzman.

Dwayne Anthony, speaking for Bernie Warren (Exec. Director) announced the schedule of NIA shows for 1995:

John Foster (Texas) commented on the need for education of the general public about the nature of the hobby.


