After spending much thought about what would or could turn into a long dissertation on values, responsibility, ethics and change I decided it might be best to just share some of the material that will be found in the new NIA handbook. I think it's always good to revisit and reacquaint ourselves with the foundations of our Association.

# The Mission Statement

The National Insulator Association, Inc. will perpetuate the insulator collecting hobby by setting goals that:

- Encourage growth and public awareness of the insulator hobby through collecting, dealing, and educational endeavors.
- Protect the interests of insulator collectors and dealers.
- Establish standards and ethics that govern fair dealing between collectors and dealers.

# **ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION**

The NIA was registered as a non-profit corporation in Arizona on July 22, 1999. Pursuant to Arizona Revised Statutes, Title 10, Section 3206, the Board of Directors adopted the initial bylaws, rules and policies for the corporation. Chapters 24 through 40 of Title 10 of the Arizona Revised Statutes govern non-profit corporations in Arizona. The NIA's Articles of Incorporation are on file with the Arizona Corporation Commission located in Phoenix, AZ.

The Articles of Incorporation were amended in 2009 and the amended and restated corporate Bylaws, voted on and approved by the membership at the 2009 annual general meeting, were duly adopted by the Board of Directors of the Corporation pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors dated July 10, 2009.

The NIA is tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and classified as a public charity.

# From the BYLAWS OF THE NATIONAL INSULATOR ASSOCIATION, INC.

# ARTICLE 3. Establishment and Purposes

<u>Section 3.1</u> Purposes and Powers. The Corporation is established as a charitable organization, and is organized exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, literary and scientific purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), or corresponding provision of any future federal tax laws. The Corporations goals are (i) to encourage growth and public awareness of the insulator hobby through collecting, dealing, and educational endeavors; (ii) protect the interests of insulator collectors and dealers;

and (iii) establish standards and ethics that govern fair dealing between collectors and dealers. To the extent not inconsistent with the purposes of the Corporation, the Code or the law of the State of Arizona, the Corporation may engage in any and all lawful activities for which nonprofit corporations may be incorporated under the laws of the State of Arizona and may exercise all powers enumerated thereunder.



<u>Section 3.2 Limitations on Activities.</u> The Corporation is not formed for pecuniary or financial gain, and no part of the assets, income, or profit of the Corporation is distributable to; or will inure to the benefit of, its directors or officers, or other private individuals; provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be construed to prevent the payment of reasonable compensation for services actually rendered by employees, officers or directors of the Corporation and/or the reimbursement of reasonable expenses incurred in connection with service rendered to the Corporation by volunteers, employees, officers, or directors.

Additionally, no substantial part of the Corporation's activities shall be the carrying on of propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation. The Corporation shall not participate in or intervene (including the publishing or distribution of statements) in any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office.

<u>Section 3.3</u> Contributions and Transfers. The Corporation is empowered, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws, to accept donations, contributions, gifts, bequests, and devises of monies and properties ("contributions").

<u>Section 3.4 Gifts, Grants and Distributions</u>. The Corporation is empowered, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and the Articles of Incorporation, to make gifts, grants and distributions for any charitable, educational, religious, literary and/or scientific purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, including for such purposes as the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code.

# Preamble to the CODE OF ETHICS

(Bylaws, Article 7, Sec. 7.1(b, c) & Bylaws, Article 19)

The following mandates govern NIA members conduct. Any member found by the Board of Directors to be in violation of any of these mandates risks loss of privileges, suspension, and / or expulsion (Reference Bylaws, Article 4, Section 4.6, Removal of a Member) from the NIA. Refer to the "Definitions and Terminology Chapter" of this Handbook.

The new Membership Handbook, <u>A Manual of Operations, Procedures, Rules</u> <u>and Guidelines for the National Insulator Association, Inc.</u> will be completed and submitted to the Board of Directors for review and approval within the next few weeks. Change comes with both new rules and new opportunities. Both are good! Rules that we are required to follow dictate that we establish rules, policies, and guidelines relating to how the NIA conducts itself and how the NIA interacts with its members. As an example, the NIA will now have a Gift Acceptance Policy (GAP) as well as policies regarding gifts, grants and distributions such as scholarships.

There is much activity within the Association. Enthusiasm is high! The committees and advisory panels are actively pursuing their assigned tasks.

Lastly, a reminder and my personal invitation to you to make plans to attend the 2011 NIA National Show and Convention is San Jose, California. Tables are going fast and the exhibit spaces are nearly full. It's shaping up to be another fantastic event. I wouldn't want you to miss it! I'm looking forward to seeing you there.

I want to update everyone on the Hemingray Historical Plaque Fund. For those who don't know about it, you must be living under a rock! As a reminder, I'll briefly mention it anyway. After submitting an application to the State of Indiana in the fall of 2009; and then the approval by the state in December 2009; we have now entered the stage of privately funding the

fabrication of the plaque. A sample of a similar plaque is pictured in this article.

Since my first mention of the Hemingray Historical Plague Fund at the NIA 2010 Boxborough National Show, then the Fall 2010 Drip Points (about October 2010). and lastly my reminder in the Winter 2010 Drip Points (about December 2010) I had received no donations and was sort of discouraged. I thought to myself. I wonder if people just are not reading the newsletter?

That's when I started picking up the phone and calling people and creating a list of those people with enough interest in seeing the project through. I started this just before Christmas in hopes of catching those who wanted to take advantage of the tax write-off. A mass e-mail of a letter was also sent through both the NIA mailing list and ICON. In January I sent a letter to one of my contacts with the fruit jar hobby, and that letter was distributed at the Muncie fruit jar show and an e-mail was sent to those members. Hemingray is well known to them for their fruit jars. That e-mail then got picked up by the



Findlay Antique Bottle Club. This was great as the news was starting to get out.



I started feeling better as a number of checks came in before December 31st, and continued to come in. The NIA set up a link on our website and set up an electronic payment portal with Google Checkout. So far I recognize all of the donators except one, I have no idea who they are. I am sure this must be from some of the press we are now getting from various collectible organizations. Not every donation is in monetary form either. The Minnetrista Cultural Center in Muncie has offered free use of chairs, podium, and microphone for a dedication ceremony.

I was able to craft a large article for Crown Jewels of the Wire which appeared in the February issue. At the time of this writing, a few more checks have come in now that the article has appeared there. The Federation of Historical Bottle Collectors will likely run an article sometime this spring as well. So at the moment, we are about 70% on our way to our goal. If we surpass it, the money will be used for another plaque project.

Hello everyone.

In my last correspondence I mentioned that the 11th annual YUMA Arizona show was coming up in February 2011. Well, the show date has come and gone now and it was a great show. The past two years we had fairly warm conditions, but overcast and just a little rain. This year was bright (once the sun came up) and topped out at 74 degrees on February 5th ! That is the YUMA we are all familiar with here in the Desert

Southwest and the weather that normally dominates this show. There were as many or more attendees than last year and the show does not show any signs of contraction.

It is somewhat humorous that the show posts a 9:00 AM starting time. I arrived about 6:30AM to find many of the better table setup spots already gone and around 10 tables already setup and selling. About 25 minutes after I arrived I was able to take a fairly nice sunrise picture. Yes, the show unofficially starts in the dark!



Related to NIA business, the online membership renewal and store at Google Checkout was down for a couple of days due to a perceived violation of Google Checkout Policy. We were notified that we could not accept donations unless we were a tax exempt 501 (c) (3) organization and that Google could not verify that this was the case. Well, that led to some changes including posting a copy of the IRS determination letter on the NIA website for all so see. The letter can be accessed at: http://www.nia.org/general/501c3.htm

The original trigger for the Google enquiry was when the NIA added an online store entry to donate to a special fund to support a historic plaque for the Hemingray insulator factory site in Muncie, IN. If you are unaware of what this is, you may want to check it out at: http://www.nia.org/special/special2.htm or I suspect it is in First Past President Bob Stahr's article.



This matter is resolved now but is made me wonder just how many of our membership realize what being a 501(c)(3) Charitable Organization really means. When most people see 501(c)(3) in text their eyes glaze over and visions of tax time or the IRS appear.

How many of you know that the NIA is a "Tax Exempt Public Charity?" Did you know that contributions, bequests, devises, transfers or gifts to the NIA are deductable from YOUR income taxes?

Below is an excerpt from our IRA Determination letter:

Dear Applicant .:

We are pleased to inform you that upon review of your application for tax exempt status we have determined that you are exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Contributions to you are deductible under section 170 of the Code. You are also qualified to receive tax deductible bequests, devises, transfers or gifts under section 2055, 2106 or 2522 of the Code.

Because this letter could help resolve any questions regarding your exempt status, you should keep it in your permanent records.

Organizations exempt under section 501(c) (3) of the Code are further classified as either public charities or private foundations. We determined that you are a public charity under the Code section(s) listed in the heading of this letter.

As you are doing your tax return this year, consider what a donation to the NIA might do to reduce your burden to the government and help the hobby instead. It's too late to take it off your 2010 return unless you made the donation in 2010, but planning ahead never hurts.

The contribution can be in a number of forms. Just as charities like Goodwill accept donations other than monetary, so does the NIA. Our standards of what is acceptable as a donation is a bit different than theirs, but like Goodwill and other public charities, we can accept donated items and you can deduct the fair market value of the item from your federal taxable income.

Insulators and insulator collections are certainly one form of acceptable donation. The NIA Commemorative Insulator mold which was previously privately owned was a donation to the NIA in 2010. These commemoratives are now produced by the NIA. The donators of acceptable items set the value, not the NIA. Please think about us at the NIA this year, we need your help to build the NIA organization into a thriving educational and research institution. If you are considering a donation of other than cash to the NIA please contact us for what is acceptable and what is not. We are working diligently to define a list of suitable items that will be available, but in the mean time, we are addressing this on a case by case basis. # Eastern Region VP Matt Grayson NIA # 387

The unusually cold and snowy winter here in the northeast, has left me with more free time than I would usually have this month. I would prefer to be out hunting for insulators, but given the amount of snow on the ground and treacherous driving conditions, that has not been possible. Thanks to the internet, collecting activity goes on, quite comfortably in front of the small computer screen.

When I began collecting in the seventies, conditions such as these would leave us with few alternatives. The SASE (self addressed stamped envelope) mailed to a collector who prepared a list of what he had available for sale or trade was most common. The ads in Crown Jewels and other resources were vital to find those who had lists, and thus the potential to add to the collection. There were rarely photographs, just a simple written descriptions and a CD number or after Jack Tod's book was published an U number for porcelain. Even phone calls could be difficult, no cells, calls had to conform to work schedules and time zones, and long distance rates were anything but cheap. This process was slow a number of weeks would pass, before the deal was complete. I recall purchasing some multipart porcelain pieces in the late seventies from a hand written sketch, I could tell they were old, but I really was not sure as to what I was getting myself into. Elton Gish's development of M numbers for categorizing porcelain multiparts has made this type of transaction routine. Buying from the internet and paying online, new insulators can be in your hands in a few days. Times have certainly changed!

With the internet at our disposal, NIA website, ICON, various other sites for buying, selling and means for instant communication, this weeks weather did nothing to dampen my collecting activities. This is the time of year I would like to send a hearty thank you (and perhaps a bit of financial support) to all those who maintain those websites we often take for granted, since they function so well, it seems as if by magic.

The growth of interest in foreign insulators, I believe, has also been fueled by the internet. Who would have thought it possible to buy insulators in Eastern Europe, with foreign languages translated by Google. for 2011. There are still several more waiting to be processed now that I'm back home.



A house break-in, natural disaster or related tragedy can be a real upsetting experience for a collector. Discovering what your insurance coverage is afterwards can be even more upsetting. You might not even be entirely sure as to what your insurance coverage is until you have to file a claim, but by then, it is too late. Unless you have a specific insurance policy covering your collection, the reality is, it is likely not covered for theft or loss. Can you afford that kind of loss?

Being able to easily identify what was lost or document its value is essential.

Now the odds are remote that someone is going to burglarize your home or car and haul off several hundred pounds of glass in a pillowcase. However, it has happened in recent years and has resulted in the disappearance of some highly coveted pieces. But what if your collection isn't stolen but is damaged or destroyed in the process of someone looking for other easier to carry-off valuables and cash? What if some other natural or man-made disaster was to occur? Do you have an inventory of your collection and have a realistic estimate as to what its value is?

If you don't really know what you have in your collection, it might not be a bad idea while the ground is still frozen and covered with snow and ice to start or finish that inventory of your collection you've been meaning to do but just never got around to. A simple spreadsheet will suffice. It doesn't have to be overly sophisticated. This exercise will help you see the potential monetary value of what you have sitting on shelves, boxes and everywhere else. But then again... maybe this is something you really don't want to know!

It is a lot of time consuming work to inventory a collection. An inventory of what you have and pictures is likely one of the first things you'd need if you were to insure a collection so the time invested is not time wasted, especially as a collection grows in size and value over the years. There are multiple insurers available. Do your homework and ask around. http://www.nia.org/general/insure.htm is a good place to start. I am not recommending any one provider over another but it is something that I've thought about more over this long cold winter. Maybe cabin fever is starting to set in?

As always, I encourage you to contact me if you have a personal matter where you believe the NIA Code of Ethics, as stated in the NIA Membership Handbook, was violated. The Code of Ethics provides a guide to the general membership for conducting their collecting and dealing activities honorably, honestly and in a manner which will present a good image of the hobby to the public.



**1)** The Friday seminar will be presented by NIA President Lou Hall and Mike Doyle who will be detailing the history of this historic telegraph line, including their 10+ year field project to map this line in Nevada.

**2)** There will also be a combined display of insulators and other artifacts from the Transcontinental Telegraph Line. Contact Lou Hall if you have a contribution for this display.

**3)** One of our club members is designing a working telegraph line that will span the width of the show hall. Conventioneers are welcomed to try the telegraph equipment, but we are looking for talented telegraphers who are interested in showing us how it is done.

Happy winter everyone! Out here in the mountains of Southern Utah we have had lots of snow and rain. There has been some flooding and lots of mud..... of both kinds : ) but we're starting to dry out now and I am looking forward to my annual trek down to the Grand Canyon Insulator Club's show in Yuma, Az.

Fresh avocados! Good friends and insulators!

Have you ever thought about what insulator each state in the U.S., or even each country is best known for? This could be a very rare style found in a particular location or perhaps a color found in abundance in a certain area. How about insulators named after places where they were used or found?

The CD 283 "PROVO", for example, was used on a 32 mile line from a power plant in Provo, Utah to the mercury mines at Mercur, Utah. The line was installed in Nov. 1898 and was the first transmission line to use power above 16,000 KV. (There is a lot more info regarding the use of "Provo" insulators in Elton Gish's book Multipart Porcelain Insulators page # 11.) Also, some interesting historical information on the mines at Mercur can be found at this web site: <u>http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Mercur,\_Utah</u>

Another insulator for which Utah is well known is the CD 126 Brookfield blobtop in purple that was used on a military telegraph line from Fort Duchsene, Utah to what was at that time Price Station, Utah. The

line was constructed in 1886-1887 and used surplus iron poles left over from the Civil War. We find mention of the line in the following report (found online):

Annual Report of the chief signal officer

of the Army to the Secretary of War for the year 1887."

Signal office, War Department, Washington City, September 7, 1887. "There is now under construction, out of old material collected from abandoned lines, a connection between Fort Du Chesne and Price Station, Utah, a Distance of 87 miles. This work is being done by the labor of troops and without expense to this Service."

Two years later we find that the line is still in service and requiring replacement poles:

The United States Military Telegraph Lines Appendix 2. Report of the officer in charge of Telegraph Division. Signal Office, War Dept., June 30, 1890.

Department of Platte- "Twelve hundred iron poles have been shipped to Price, Utah, for use on the Fort DuChesne line, and the department commander has directed that the work of making general repairs be begun immediately on the arrival of the last invoice of poles from the Indian Territory; troops and government transportation to be furnished from Fort DuChesne. The line has been maintained in a very efficient working order considering the rough nature of the ground, and its liability to damage from cattle and freighters."

Later in the report we find:

"Owing to the abandonment of the post of Fort Laramie, the telephone line from that post to Bordeaux, Wyo., was discontinued on December 4, 1889. The Iron poles were recovered for use on the Fort DuChesne section and the rest of the material offered for sale at auction."

(Note: In the two Military reports above the name of the now current Fort Duchesne was shown as "Du Chesne" and then "DuChesne")

As far as I know, this line from Fort Duchesne to Price, Utah is the only place that the CD 126 has been found in purple, but were the purple 126s new when installed on this line? For in the report of 1887 it clearly states that the line was being built of salvaged materials from other lines. So perhaps the purple 126s were originally installed on a military line in some other part of the country.

If you would like to learn more about this line I would suggest reading Rob Tucker's article 9 Mile Road Adventure in the July 1997 issue of Crown Jewels of the wire.

If anyone wants make a suggestion of an insulator for a state or country they can send me an email and I will tally the results for the next Drip Points. (For anyone without email give me a call..... I love to talk insulators!) I will start this off with the suggestion that the purple CD 126 Brookfields found near Price, Utah is the insulator for which Utah is best known. (Or, perhaps the CD 283 "Provo".)

I hope everyone has the opportunity to get out to a show or two this spring. That's where the real fun is in this hobby. My schedule will prevent me from getting to anything other than Springfield again this year, but if you can only make it to one, that's the one. It also sounds like Lou Hall, Colin Jung, and others are planning a great National in San Jose in July.

In this issue of DP I am going to suggest a couple of wording samples for folks who may be considering donating insulators, go-withs, collections, etc. to the NIA now that it is a 501(c)3 organization. These are just samples. Be sure and check with your financial advisor before making any final decisions on adding a codicil or wording to your will or estate plans. But before the samples, a few words on why you would even consider this act of generosity.

First, many of us have children who do not share the same passion for our hobby as we do. If you're like me, you probably plan to sell off your collection someday so your family won't be burdened with what to do with it, especially if they have no clue as to its value. But life can deal us some uncertainty and what if you never make it to the point of selling your collection? What then? In my case, my wife and two grown children would be lost with what to do. If they could find the time to photograph and list the pieces, an auction might work, but their lives are very busy and it's unlikely they would find the time. They certainly couldn't go to shows or have the knowledge to contact collectors about selling pieces. Should I go out and get hit by a truck, my family would have a sudden burden that they would not know how to handle.

Of course, I hope this doesn't happen so I can dispose of my collection however I see fit someday. If it does happen I would be helping my family and the hobby in general by taking steps today to ensure that the best scenario happens in my absence. One of those scenarios is donating my collection to the NIA where I can be sure it will be handled by astute collectors and most likely be returned to the hobby for future circulation. I will also be assured that any funds raised by the NIA in the dispersal of my collection would be used to further the educational and historical mission of the NIA. And how can I be sure? Because as a donor I can stipulate, within reason, how the NIA handles my

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collection as part of my instructions when the collection is gifted. Of course, the NIA has the right to determine if my instructions are reasonable and if they do not, they can turn down the gift.



So here are a couple examples of how to word your will or trust:

Gift of Property

I give and bequeath, to the National Insulator Association, an Arizona non-profit corporation

located at-----: the following described property (describe property and where it's

located) and legally described as (legal description if needed) from my estate to be used as

(describe or) their Board of Directors deems appropriate.

In most estates, if you do not own the gifted property at the time of your death, then this gift will fail, unless a specific provision is added to your will or trust directing that the proceeds from the sale of this property during your life, be gifted to the NIA.

Gift of a Contingent Bequest

If any of the above named beneficiaries should predecease me, or in the case of failure or

lapse of any legacy, I hereby bequeath his/her share to the National Insulator Association, an


Arizona non-profit corporation, located at-----, to be used as their Board of

Directors deems appropriate.

If for unforeseen reasons those beneficiaries you have selected and named in your will or trust pass away prior to your death, you can provide the option of directing that portion(s) of your estate to the NIA. This contingency alternative is also commonly used with other financial instruments such as IRA's, 401K's and life insurance.

Again, your financial advisor is the best person to speak with about how you should make any such arrangements or changes to your estate plans.

For those that don't know me, I've managed the NIA website since it's inception in 1998. This has been a labor of love with the goal of increasing the visibility of insulators to the general public and providing research information to the collecting community. Please regularly visit http://www.nia.org and look through the site as there are significant resources there. Reviewing the update history will give you a good overview.

It has been a while since I've submitted an article to Drip Points but I'm excited about a new major addition to the NIA website <a href="http://www.nia.org">http://www.nia.org</a>. It has been 18 years since Marilyn and Woody published the Glass Insulators from Outside North America and there have been a tremendous number of new discoveries since then. The number of collectors outside North America has increased significantly in the last 10 years or so. But the number of collectors that have joined the NIA, especially in Europe, has remained small. I've been wanting to expand this section of the website for sometime but only had my small GIFONA collection to draw from. In Early December Don Mecklenborg volunteered to take quality pictures of his extensive collection to expand the site. He has provided hundreds of quality photos and the associated information. Seven more collectors are also now providing pictures and information so the momentum has started!

The primary goal is to capture as many different styles as possible with quality pictures and a secondary goal to capture embossing and significant color variations. If you are willing to contribute I would ask that you contact me to work out the details. To preserve quality and consistency there are some guidelines on the photos (background, camera angle, etc.) as well as the need for capturing accurate measurements and embossing. The site is organized with summary pages showing relative size accurate thumbnail pictures of each CD – If you click the thumbnail it will take you to a detail page. A view by CD and not by country is coming. The detail pages are intended to capture size variants, color variants and different embossings within that specific CD. This enables a place to capture any history, in-use photos, etc.

There has been much discussion recently on the CD numbering system and the current goal for the site is to accurately document the known styles as defined by N.R. Woodward and to assist in clearing up any inconsistencies of confusion about assignments as well as documenting new styles for assignment and to provide a temporary number for communication until officially assigned. If you have pictures or information to contribute please contact me at pyrex553@aol.com.


