FROM THE PRESIDENT



As most of you know by now, I have become the new President of the NIA and will be until my term expires in 2010. It looks like it will be a challenging few years ahead.

Long time collector "Mickey" Dutcher passed away on August 23rd at his home in Cortland, NY. Mickey and his wife Ellie were seen at many Eastern shows for years as well as the Springfield show in Ohio. Mickey and Ellie were the first to report the Emminger insulator to the hobby. Mickey was often seen wearing a yellow tee shirt with the words "I Buy Insulators" on it.

First of all, I would like to inform the hobby of the passing of a few collectors. The hobby lost long time collector Phoebe Adams on Thursday, May 22nd in Miami, FL. Phoebe and her late husband, Bob were bottle and insulator show regulars in the Southeastern US from the early 1970's until Bob's passing in 1999. For many years the Bob & Phoebe Adams showmanship award was given out at the NIA National shows.

The hobby also lost Galen Howard of Colorado Springs, CO on August 7th. Galen's life tragically came to an end during an automobile accident on his way home. At the request of Galen's sister, she would like donations be sent to the NIA for creation of a memorial plaque depicting Howard. This plaque, when complete, will then be given to Galen's widow. I have authorized Jack Roach, our Treasurer, to set up the fund and any additional monies collected beyond the cost of the plaque and shipping, will be put into a Galen Howard fund to be used at our future discretion.

On a happier note, we have now completed the 2008 NIA National. Hat's off to Howard, Linda, Steve

and all the rest involved with hosting the show. The combined exhibit of all of the CD's was quite impressive. I know Stacey and I both enjoyed

our time in Portland as well, the weather was great. As of the close of the show, the NIA reached an all time record of 1,681 active members.

Next year's National will be in Coralville, IA on July 10-12, 2009. The hosts are Larry & Pat Whitlock, Dennis & Jeanne Weber, and Bill & Linda Connell along with members of the Missouri Valley Insulator Club. Coralville is located near Iowa City and Cedar Rapids, IA.

We are actively looking for hosts for the 2010 NIA National to be located in the Eastern Region. If you have any desire to host a National, please contact me as soon as possible.

The NIA is seeking charitable or-

ganization status 501c(3) for future donations that might be given to the NIA so that donators can claim the donations as deductions on their federal taxes. We feel that we should have no problem achieving this, as we are already a non-profit corporation, which is more difficult to attain. It will become possible for you to will your collections, if you choose, to the NIA for creation of a traveling museum or for auctioning off the collection for the financial benefit of the NIA. Kevin Jacobson. First Past President, is spearheading this effort. We are targeting a January 1st completion date pending how long the government takes to process our application.

We are actively looking for hosts for the 2010 NIA National to be located in the Eastern Region. A lot of people these days are talking about the economy and the effect ever increasing costs of commodities such as copper, steel, aluminum

and fuel oil are having.

Our hobby is not immune either. It will be increasingly difficult for collectors and dealers to travel long distances to shows and be able to afford it. In addition, costs to host shows at many facilities are becoming increasingly expensive. I think, if we as a hobby, can continue to be creative in all of these aspects, we can still continue to grow and prosper. To this end, I have appointed Jim White to the position of NIA Promotion Chair.

Jim can fill in further details in his article, but just a quick recap is in order here. I envision occasional press releases to various media sources about our hobby. Jim has background in this and writes well.

I am planning to be at the September 27th Albuquerque, NM Enchantment Insulator Club's 21st Annual show.


Grand Terrace, CA, Oct 4th


my quick recovery. Our hobby is as much about friendships as it is about collecting i n s u l a t o r s. Thank you fellow collectors

A Letter of Thanks from Glenn Drummond

Notasulga, Alabama 20 July 2008

Members, Board of Directors National Insulator Association

Please accept this open letter as the means of expressing my most sincere thanks to the NIA Board for bestowing upon me the Outstanding Service Award at the 2008 Awards Banquet in Portland, Oregon. It was not possible for me to be in attendance and accept this honor in person inasmuch as Sandra was recuperating from knee surgery at the time and my presence was required at home.

I would also like to thank the unknown person, or persons, who nominated me for the NIA Board's consideration. Your actions are truly appreciated.

I have been informed that the primary basis for the award is the information and knowledge acquired and shared with fellow collectors during many years of researching glass-manufacturing processes in relation to insulator production during the latter half of the nineteenth century. I must acknowledge that the accomplishment of my goals has required mentors, associates, and the cooperation of exceptional friends. Please let me recognize a few of the individuals who have been a major influence in my quests for knowledge, critiqued my findings, and challenged me to dig deeper. First, it was John Webster, a fruit-jar collector in Florence, Kentucky, who, circa 1970, sparked my interest in researching the early glass works located in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Covington, Kentucky. My next associate was David Dale, a glassmanufacturing historian in Muncie, Indiana, who taught me research techniques and broadened my horizons. Later, it was a pleasure to associate with Clarice Gordon, San Diego, California, as she drafted her book about the Hemingray family and their glass company. Bob Stahr, now serving as NIA President, has shared a mutual research interest during more recent years. Bob and I have shared research findings, debated interpretation, and discussed missing pieces of the puzzle at length. I also must acknowledge the patience of Steve Blair, London, Ohio, with whom I have traveled extensively for years. On many occasions, we would leave for an insulator show a day or two early in order that I might search the holdings of a distant library, or the archives of a county courthouse located along the way. He never complained, at least not to me. Finally, thanks must go to Sandra who never grumbled about the inordinate amount of time that I have been absent from home while following my research pursuits. To each of the above, I owe a huge debt of gratitude for their roles in making it possible for me to accomplish the feats that have been recognized by the NIA Board.

With great sadness, I report the loss of Phoebe Adams to the hobby on May 22, 2008. She passed away after a short illness in Miami, Florida. Phoebe was truly one of the hobby's pioneers – and a wonderful person. She and her beloved husband, Bob, were married 50 years when he passed on nine years ago. Together, they would travel the country to attend glass shows. They were almost a "permanent fixture" at each of the National Conventions for nearly a quarter century. Both Phoebe and Bob were celebrated for their support of young people getting involved with insulator collecting, and many on our current NIA roster are members because Phoebe and Bob were their mentors so many years ago. Phoebe and Bob always felt that education was one of the most important aspects in glass collecting, so they developed a trophy to award at each glass show, to honor the display with the best educational benefits to the public.

Known for her quick wit and dry sense of humor, Phoebe was always available to tell a story that would enthrall listeners. They amassed a huge collection of glass and, more notably, a huge collection of friends! In 1984, after almost 10 years in the hobby, the National Insulator Association awarded the couple Lifetime Membership for their many contributions. And in 1991, they received the NIA Outstanding Service Award.

GALEN A. HOWARD

October 4, 1950 -- August 7, 2008

Galen Howard passed August 7, 2008 as a result of a car accident in Beaver County, Oklahoma.

Galen was born October 4, 1950 in Goodland, Kansas to Arthur and Edna Howard. His father precedes him in death. He is survived by his mother, Edna Howard of Colorado Springs and his wife, Mary Ann Howard of Colorado Springs, his mother-in-law and brother-in-law, Mary Marraffa and Johnny Marraffa, of Alto Loma, California, a daughter, Jessica Howard of Colorado Springs, a brother, Roy Howard (wife Pat) of Colorado Springs, two sisters: Karen January (husband Jerry), of Pasadena, Texas, and Sara Howard of Colorado Springs, and many relatives and friends.

Galen began his career working an incredible job for an insulator collector. He worked as a lineman on a hot shot railroad communications repair crew that responded from Omaha to the far Northwest. It was on this job that he discovered the first known CD162.3 with wedge drip points.

He began his telephone company career as a line foreman for Mountain States Telephone Co. He worked there for 30 years as the company became Mountain Bell, then US West and later Qwest. After many years of commendable service, he retired in 1999. Soon afterwards he established his engineering consulting firm in telecommunications.

Galen's love for insulators at an early age grew into an enviable collection displayed at many shows across the U.S. He leaves behind many friends and associates actively involved in the National Insulator Association. He will be sadly missed by his lovely wife, his insulator collecting, fishing and hunting buddies and his best friend and beloved "hound dog," Emmie.



Besides his passion for insulators, he was an avid hunter. Galen tagged most of the North American big game including the Alaskan brown bear.

Galen and Mary Ann would host a traditional pheasant hunt each year in October. Many insulator collectors were invited to their home for the hunt including Ross Baird, Jack Roach, Mike Green, Denny Hackthorne, Rob Baumann, and others. No matter how many showed up, there was always room for one more.

After a gourmet Italian dinner prepared by Mary Ann, out came boxes of, what else, insulators. Many great insulators changed hands in Galen's den. The next day it was an Air Force Academy football game all on Galen. He would always find tickets, (on the 50), no matter the head count.

The next two or three days found us in the field hunting quail, chucker, and pheasant. Again, all on Galen. Wherever he is now, he has a shotgun in hand with a golden Labrador Retriever in front of him.

To all that knew him, he was a brother and will be dearly missed.

The insulator fraternity lost a pillar in the hobby on August 23, 2008 with the passing of Mickey Dutcher. Mickey and his lovely wife Ellie were fixtures at many eastern shows and numerous nationals since they began collecting in 1971. Because of his infectious personality and his yellow "I BUY INSULATORS" t-shirt you always knew when Mickey had arrived.

Mickey was borne July 17, 1932, in Syracuse, New York. He was married and devoted to his lovely wife Ellie for 39 years. Their immediate family includes 6 children, 14 grandchildren, 6 great-grandchildren, and Mickey's 103 year old mother who is living with Ellie. I've personally noted that Mickey's passion for collecting has been passed on to some of his grandchildren, which means the hobby will be blessed with more Dutchers in the future. Good job, Mickey!

I first met Mickey and Ellie at the Ithaca, New York insulator show in 1971, which was the beginning of a life long friendship. During my many visits to Cortland we would talk and laugh late into the evening or early morning, often with friend and neighbor Howard Makela, about insulators, insulator collectors and the merits of a fine beer. Anyone who was fortunate enough to visit Mickey and Ellie knew the meaning of true hospitality.

Mickey brought much to the hobby of insulator collecting. He was one of the early CD collectors, beginning that passion way back in 1971. While the London and Springfield Ohio plus the Perkiomenville shows were often viewed as his favorites, he once confided to me that his favorite show was the York, Pa Bottle Show but I could not tell anyone until now. Why? It was this show that he found the first Emminger known, the first baby teapot and numerous other very rare treasures. I'm surprised that his success at these shows did not spark a run on yellow "I Buy Insulator" t-shirts.



One of my many fond memories of Mickey dates back to the early Chicago Jumbo shows that were hosted by Dick Augustyn and Larry and Mary Beth Veneziano. Mickey never missed these shows and it was at one of these shows that Mickey disappeared for a couple of hours and Ellie and I began to worry about him. Finally, late that morning he returned to the floor with his famous mischievous smile. I asked him where he had been! His reply. "Trunk Dumping" He further explained that there was too much competition on the trade show floor so he walked from car to car that arrived in the parking lot announcing "I buy insulators." Was he successful? After helping him load boxes of Columbia's, Mickey Mouse's, Hemingray 25's and CD 205 Transpositions and assorted other treasures I would say ves!

All of us will personally miss his enthusiasm for both insulators and the people in the hobby. Even as Mickey's health began to fade and he was unable to travel to shows, Ellie told me that he cried every time he could not attend one of those shows.

Mickey was laid to rest August 26, 2008. For those of use who knew Mickey it is not surprising that he asked to be laid to rest with a few special items in his casket which included: a pack of cigarettes, a lighter from Donna his daughter that said "Dad," a can of Piel's, a Hemingray 42, plus a very large picture of Ellie.

Goodbye Mickey, we will all miss you.

PROMOTIONS CHAIR



I really had hoped that the Olympics might feature bass fishing or photography among the competitions this year, so I guess my lifetime of training is sadly "down the drain". My vocation of residential real estate development is so slow I attend insulator shows to remember what it like to sell something. The good news is that I should have more free time to work on NIA public relations.

Some of you may know me by face or name; others may recognize my frequent postings on ICON. Probably most readers do not know much about my background despite the fact that I started collecting in 1970. Bob Stahr had the FBI run a background check prior to asking me to Chair public relations. Here are some highlights from the report:

Never been arrested, although it was noted that he received a warning ticket for a burnt out headlight on the way to an insulator show.

He frequently uses the Internet alias WOWOTN (Wicked Old Witch of the North ... it's a long story from college days).

He honed his writing and communications skills while teaching grade school, high school and college classes and writing his graduate thesis.

I am but one person, so each of you can help spread the word within your geographic regions and have hosts contact me if I can be of assistance.

I have developed a questionnaire to help collect basic information in order to create a press release. I also have received an emailed packet from a fellow collector that was developed some time ago which may be useful to show hosts, especially those new to the hosting activity. I will be reviewing this and determining if this can also be of value.

HISTORIAN CHAIR



Searching for History on the Internet

As the Internet develops, more and more resources become available to research insulators. Google offers several of these including book searches and patent searches. Book searches can be conducted at google.com/books and patent searches can be conducted at google.com/patents.

To create the book search feature, Google scanned every book in a number of major libraries. These scans also include the journals in the libraries. Results from a search identify books and journals with the specific key word(s) included in the search. For some books, you can see everything in the book. Usually this is for older books that are no longer subject to copyright. For other books, only a snippet can be seen, usually only a line or two. For other materials, no text is provided and you would have to find the book in a library to learn about the use of the search term(s) in the book or journal. Conveniently, Google has links to tell you what libraries hold the item.

For example, if you searched for "Hemingray" in the advanced feature of Google Books and selected the "full view only" feature, you could find an 1872 Cincinnati Superior Court decision indicating that R. Hemingray conducted his banking with Homans & Co., bankers, through the firm of R. Hemingray & Co. and did not have an individual account in his own name. You could also find an advertisement for Hemingray insulators in a 1917 book on Standard Wiring for Electric Light and Power.

To create the patent search feature, Google has scans of every United States patent in its data base. With the advanced patent search feature, you can search in a number of ways. You can limit your search to any time span that interests you. You can search by patent number, title, inventor, assignee, classification, or patent type (e.g., design, re-issues, etc.).

There are some limitations to this search. The one that I find most troubling is the typographical errors that exist in the scans. Although the actual images you can access from Google are correct, the software that read the images often had trouble with correctly identifying the text. For example, for one patent, the software read the phrase "INSULATOR TROL-LEY-CONDUCTOR CLAMP" as "INSULATOR TKOLLEY CONDTJCTOC CLAMP." As a result, some patents may be missed in a search because your search word was misinterpreted in the patent by the software.

To illustrate how you might use these resources, let me tell you about some recent research l've been doing. I had an oddball insulator in my collection and looked up the patent in Google Patents. I then searched Google Patents to see if the person had invented anything else and found that was the case. I searched Google Books and found some information on the company founded by the inventor. I also located some background information on the inventor in some trade journals. Next I used Switchboard.com (you could also use Whitepages.com) to find possible descendents of the inventor. Since the inventor had an odd last name, this made the process easier. Seven names turned up and I wrote a letter to all seven, including the research I had already done, and asking if they had any additional information. Right before the national I received a call from one of the relatives and am currently working on an article about this research.

Of course, these are not the only resources someone might use. You can also search images or videos through Google. You can access 19th century newspapers through a free trial at:

www.gale.cengage.com/freetrials/

For \$12.95 a month, you could search 88 million newspaper pages at newspaperarchive.com. I'm sure there are a lot more resources.

NIA Annual General Membership Meeting, July 4, 2008 DoubleTree Hotel, Portland, OR

Board and Chair Members present:

Members present:

Approximately 53 members attended in addition to the Board and Chair members listed above.

President Kevin Jacobson called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. PST. He reminded everyone of the Central Regional Show in two weeks, July 19 & 20, in Richfield, OH. The hosts are the Western Reserve Insulator Club members.

No one brought copies of the NIA General Membership Meeting minutes from last year's 2007 Orlando, FL National, but Kevin noted they were published in the Fall Drip Points. Rick Soller moved for approval of the 2007 minutes. Bob Stahr seconded the motion and the membership approved the 2007 minutes.

Jack Roach gave the Treasurer's report. The NIA had an income of \$14,070 and expenses of \$13,284 for a net profit of \$786.00. The main expenses were the Drip Points newsletter and the postage/mailing costs. Jack mentioned to the membership that if they signed up to receive the newsletter electronically, it would save the NIA on significant postage costs. Jack then described the proposed approved budget, which projects about \$14,650 in revenue and \$13,620 in expenses that will leave a net profit of about \$1,000 to the General Fund.

President Jacobson then mentioned a couple of Board and Committee changes: Tom Katonak would be terming out as 2nd Past President, Mike Green would be terming out as Western Regional Vice President, and Mike Guthrie was resigning from the Ethics Chair position.

President Jacobson then summarized the board meeting actions:

- Approved a new NIA membership card design that is better looking and less expensive to print.
- Added wording to the Award and Recognition text, which will clear up some ambiguity in the language.
- Approved a FY08-09 budget.
- Noted the board was still working on insulator authentication.

President Jacobson said there would be no First Past President's report as Dudley Ellis was not in attendance and still undergoing testing for a medical condition.

Second Past President Tom Katonak gave his final report. He was proud to serve on the NIA Board and thanked everyone for their support over the years. He was happy to spread the insulator hobby to the countries he and Linda visited. He introduced two new members from Australia who were attending their first NIA convention.

Eastern Regional Vice President Doug Williams reported that things were quiet on the east coast and there would be no Eastern Regional this year unless someone stepped up soon. Doug was very impressed with the National CD display and wanted to thank Howard Banks for organizing it and the membership for its contributions to the display.

Information Director Arthur McConnachie reported on Drip Point changes this year. He switched from sending members a file attachment to providing them with a Drip Points web link on the NIA website. The switch has generated fewer problems for member subscribers. He asked members to please take Drip Points electronically and noted the advantages: one, members would receive their issues sooner; two, members would get them in color; and three, it would save the NIA a significant amount of postage costs.

McConnachie noted that he was starting to receive reports of deaths of early NIA members. As he didn't know the decedents, he was not in a position to write the obituaries and he asked the membership for help in this area.

Membership Director Don Briel encouraged the membership to prepay their NIA dues by October. This will save the NIA the postage cost of mailing a reminder. He noted there were now many different ways to pay your dues: electronic payments, multiple year payments, etc. Briel noted that last year the NIA had 1,636 members and the record membership was 1,649 set in year 2001. Briel was proud to announce that membership set a new record in 2008 with 1,668 members.

By-Laws Chair Bob Stahr reported the updating of the membership handbook and the text changes in the Nominations and Awards section.

Product Marketing Chair Carolyn Berry reported product sales of \$2,378.56 in FY 2007-08 and a small net profit of \$180.42. She announced that a new product will be introduced to the membership next year.

Research and Education Committee Chair Bob Berry noted that his main goal was the maintenance of the NIA website. Web traffic was heavier this year than last year and he is trying to find the keywords that will help increase web traffic. He took numerous photographs of the National CD display, which will help fill in the CD photograph holes in the website.

President Kevin Jacobson announced that the NIA accepts on-line payments for NIA dues and recognized this year's show hosts: Steve Watkins, Howard and Linda Banks.

Authentication and Classification Committee Chair Paul Greaves said he will be preparing a report to the Board on what is known about EC&M insulators. He solicited information from the membership.

Historian Rick Soller said the estates of Phoebe Adams and Dave Ramp (?) donated old show ribbons that will be put in the NIA archives. Soller also received Jack Tod correspondence, business cards, and the loan of Jerry Turner's photographs of early Springfield Shows that will be scanned. Soller said he needs help identifying the collectors in the photographs.

Awards and Recognition Chair Louis Hall announced there were three nominations for life-time membership and one nomination for outstanding service. There was going to be a change of procedure. All club and NIA awards will be presented on the show floor instead of the banquet so we can have the dinner at a decent hour. Two Best of Show ribbons were transmitted to show hosts this year.

Ethics Chair Mike Guthrie said several situations occur this year. Two situations involved complaints against non-NIA members so no action could be taken. One case involved a NIA member. The case was resolved and sanctions were taken against the seller.

Secretary Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes was not in attendance at the Convention. No report was presented.

President Kevin Jacobson announced that the 40th annual 2009 NIA National will be held in Coraville, Iowa (Central Region) on July 10-12, 2009. Your host team will be: Larry and Pat Whitlock, Dennis and Jeannie Weber, and Bill and Linda Connell. The host hotel is the Marriott Hotel off Interstate 80. There will be 130+ sales tables and 25 display spaces. Table cost is \$55 for the first table, and \$50 each for additional 8-foot tables. There was some flooding in Iowa this summer and damage to the hotel, but the Marriott expects the flood repairs to be completed before the Convention. Show programs will be distributed by the hosts tomorrow on the show floor.

President Jacobson reported on the Karen Sanville letter that numerous members received in the mail. In summary, Sanville purchased a purple Brookfield blobtop, CD126, from dealer Kevin Lawless at the 2001 Scottsdale National. Six to seven years later when she attempted to sell it through a catalog auctioneer, she did not like the terms offered by auctioneer Dwayne Anthony, so she offered it to auctioneer Ray Klingensmith, who refused to auction the insulator because he felt the color of the insulator was altered artificially. Ms. Sanville complained to the NIA Board and subsequently Doug MacGillvary, a long-time friend and partner of Kevin Lawless, took the initiative and offered to buy back the purple Brookfield at the original sales price. Ms. Sanville accepted the offer and the transaction was consummated. President Jacobson commended Doug MacGillvary for his actions, considering he had no interest or involvement in the sale at the 2001 National.

Ms. Sanville subsequently formally requested that the NIA Board consider changing its by-laws to guarantee the authenticity of insulators sold/valued over \$3,000 and provide insurance of value for the same. The NIA Board is still reviewing Ms. Sanville's request and has nothing to report on the matter at this point. President Jacobson pointed out though that any potential change would only apply to NIA shows and currently there is no scientific test to prove the authenticity of an insulator. Furthermore, most insulators valued over \$3,000 do not have a provenance.

President Jacobson then introduced Louis Hall as the new Western Regional Vice President. Lou said the position did not come with a job description so he will be writing his own. Lou announced his goals for his term and they were:

- Visit a lot of shows in the Western Region.
- Increase western membership equivalent to the current NIA membership.
- Wants the next Western National to be in the desert.

President Jacobson then introduced Bob Stahr as the new NIA President and passed along the hammer of peace and tranquility. Bob thanked his new wife Stacey for her support and announced his new Board and Committee appointments during his term.

- Ethics Committee: David Wiecek replaces Mike Guthrie
- Promotions Committee: Jim White replaces Bob Merzoian
- By-Laws Committee: Rick Jones replaces Bob Stahr
- Awards and Recognition Committee: Gene Hawkins replaces Louis Hall
- Secretary: Colin Jung replaces Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes

Bob wants to promote the hobby to new members in order to deal with membership attrition. Both Bob and Kevin Jacobson will pursue a 501(c) tax exempt status for the NIA. Bob also expects to deal with the challenges of obtaining bids for Regionals and Nationals.

Bob Stahr asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Jack Roach moved to adjourn and was seconded by Steve Watkins. Meeting ended at 5:32 p.m. PST.
