I like to feature these type of stories because it's important to document these finds and it will reinforce that good stuff is still out there, just need to go track it down!

Some of the amazing insulators found are as follows: CD 164 H.G.Co. in Purple CD 145 AM.INSULATOR CO. Yellow Olive Green CD 145 AM.INSULATOR CO. in Honey Amber **U-982 Bennington Threadless** CD 729 in Dark Teal Green CD 169 Hemingray Type I There also is a fantastic article by Matthew Willett talking about some of his finds over the years.

You will find more details on these finds throughout the Magazine so be sure to read it cover to cover.

CD 164 H.G.Co. in Purple

This is my find so let's talk about that now! This was not an "In the wild" find but an Internet auction find (no, not eBay). This insulator was found by the auctioneer's son in a barn in VT. It had a really nasty, ugly thick cloth covered tie wire on it. This insulator was definitely "Farm Fresh."

He agreed to let me bid via phone. I was shocked when the bidding stopped at a fairly low number (for what the insulator is). I got this for about the price of a regular lilac CD 162 H.G.Co. signal!

It took about a month for the seller to ship it but it definitely was worth the wait! Drips are mint. Insulator is over all is VNM. One crack in the back. One of about seven known and one of the better condition units.

As someone who has a passion for Hemingray glass, it doesn't get much better then a find like this!

The 46th Annual NIA National Insulator Show is now history. In preparing for that show there were some last minute glitches that put the whole show in jeopardy, but thanks to the persistence of our show hosts and the NIA Events Advisor the show went on without a hitch. Attendees knew nothing of the issues and all had a great time. My sincere thanks go out to Jason Townsend, Bob Stahr, and their wives for a fabulous show. A special thank you also goes out to Darryl Wagner, NIA Events Advisor, and his committee for their unwavering support of our show hosts. Many thanks also go out to all attendees and especially those that helped with setup, tear-down, and cleanup.

The NIA Membership meeting was well attended. Some exciting changes were announced at that meeting. The NIA is changing the rules in regard to hosting National shows. Without going into a lot of detail, the NIA will take on all of the financial responsibility for the National shows. The actual show will still be in the hands of the show host(s) to add their personal touches, but any income above expenses will be shared while any loss will be covered by the NIA. The NIA Membership handbook will be updated with all of the details.

New rules and a new category were announced for exhibit awards. There will now be a new category for youth 12 years of age and under. They will be allowed to display anything insulator related. There will not be any categories and they will not compete with older exhibitors. 1st through 4th place awards will be given along with "NIA Kid Kash" that can be spent at the National show. Other changes and details will be presented by our Awards and Recognition Chairman. Gene Hawkins.

Over the past few years many comments have been made about the NIA bank account growing too large. You are now seeing why it has been important to grow that account. The NIA can now afford to fund endeavors such as National shows, scholarships, Kid Kash, etc. Your generous donations have helped immensely. Please consider additional tax exempt donations to the NIA to keep these and other endeavors moving forward. Maybe we can get to the point of funding Regional shows in the future.

Several member suggestions were made at the Membership meeting. Each will be discussed and considered. Remember, this is your organization and all suggestions are welcome. While not all suggestions are immediately acted upon, all suggestions are considered and help set the direction of your organization. In some cases volunteers are needed to move ideas along. Consider giving your time to further the organization.

By now you undoubtedly heard about the 47th NIA National show to be held in Muncie, Indiana July 29-31, 2016. Show hosts are Bob Stahr and Rick Soller. While 2016 is the year for an Eastern National, no bids were received by the March 1st deadline. The NIA Board of Directors then solicited bids from all regions for a 2016 National show. Two excellent bids were received, but obviously only one could be selected. Our Events committee did an excellent job of coaching the prospective show hosts, put together a side by side comparison of the two, made a recommendation, and turned their data over to the Board of Directors. The Board members independently reviewed all of the information, each independently voted, and the Muncie bid was selected. The 2017 National show will go back to the Western region keeping the regional sequence intact. Preparing a National show bid is a major undertaking and my sincere thanks go out to our Events committee and all those involved in submitting both bids.

Now is the time for prospective show hosts to get serious about submitting their proposals for the 2017 National show in the Western region.



As a reminder, 2016 NIA elections are coming up and February 1, 2016 is the deadline for nominations. While that date seems a long way off, there will only be one more Drip Points reminder before that date. The offices of NIA President, Eastern Region Vice President, and Secretary are all up for election in 2016. Nominations may be submitted at any time now to Matt Grayson, Eastern Region VP and Nominations Chairman. I know some folks don't believe the NIA has elections. They are nearly correct! We have not had an election for some time now because so few people are willing to submit their name in nomination for the open offices. Now is your chance to volunteer and cause an election to take place. Consult the NIA Membership Handbook to see what is required for each office.

I hope all of you are having as much fun as I am in this great hobby. Each time I return home from a show I can't wait for the next show to come along. That's when I get to go and visit with the fine people that make this hobby what it is. Thank you for all you do to make insulator collecting fun!

U-982 BENNINGTON THREADLESS INSULATOR FOUND!

Normally when some one says they "Found a Bennington insulator", it turns out to be a common modern insulator. This is not the case this time! "Digger Dave Beeler" recently dug up this rare and in excellent condition U-982 Bennington threadless insulator in central Illinois.

These unique style insulators were made by Bennington Pottery Works who was located in Bennington Vermont. Insulator has a beautiful Rockingham glaze and was made in the 1850s. This new find represents the 2nd known example. Quite possibly the most desirable porcelain insulator in the hobby.

CD 169 EXPERIMENTAL HEMINGRAY TYPE I FOUND!

Michael Green hit it lucky and was able to score a rare Hemingray CD 169 Type I. Just getting one is a hard task as there is only 6-7 known. What makes this find even more exciting is it was a "Buy it now" on eBay for \$350! The seller was not a Insulator collector but knew the insulator was odd. So they put what they thought was a "High" price on it.

The CD 169 Hemingray type I (Yes, it is Type 1, but the one is represented as a roman numeral) was one of the several prototype designs Hemingray sent to AT&T for testing. They also sent the "Tepee" CD 157 and CD 152. Ultimately AT&T chose the CD 152

NIA General Membership Meeting - Friday, July 3, 2015 Sandwich, Illinois Best Western Timber Creek Inn & Suites

NIA President, Don Briel, called the meeting to order at 4:15 pm, and welcomed everyone to the meeting. Don asked for a report from the Secretary. Steve Roberts advised that the Minutes of the 2014 General Membership Meeting were published in the 2014 Fall Edition of Drip Points. (Volume 42, No. 1). Additionally, Steve advised that the NIA Corporate papers have been filed with the State of Arizona, and they are current.

Following the Secretary's report, Don asked for reports from the following Board Members:

Treasurer – Bill Rohde advised that the current financial balance is \$48,114. Bill also stated that the Board of Directors approved a proposed Balanced Budget for the fiscal year of July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2016.

Membership Director – Vickie McConnachie reported that the NIA membership was 1585 as of the middle of June. She also stated that our membership has been 1500+ since 1998, and our lowest membership since then was 1508 in 2006.

Eastern VP – Matt Grayson stated that nominations for Board positions should be submitted by February 1, 2016. Board positions that will be elected in 2016 are the President, Secretary and Eastern VP.

Western VP – Ron Yuhas reported that the Western Region has been very active in this past year. There have been good shows which have been well attended. Additionally, there was a new show in Utah. Ron also stated that there are good things coming related to Youth Displays.



2nd Past President – Bob Stahr reported that he is still working on placing a plaque at the former Hemingray plant property in Covington, KY. He has received verbal approval from the current property owners to place the plaque on their sidewalk. Bob also, caught an error on our part. Earlier in this meeting we failed to receive a motion to approve the 2014 General Membership Minutes. Bob made a motion to approve the 2014 General Membership Minutes as printed. The motion was seconded. The membership approved the motion.

After the Board of Directors' Reports, Don asked for reports from the following Advisors and Chairpersons:

NIA Commemorative Coordinator – Carolyn Berry informed the membership that we have now exceeded \$9,000 in commemorative sales. She also stated that we do not know the color for next year. She is working with the manufacturer to secure this information.

Product Marketing Manager – Tina Rienstra report that she is in the process of transitioning this positon to Margaret Wagner. Margaret will become the new Product Marketing Manager at the end of the Sandwich National. Tina expressed her appreciation to everyone for their support.

Research and Education Advisor – Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes advised that requests for lesson plans continue to rise. However, there were no requests for boxes of insulators related to the science lesson plan. She is continuing to interview collectors. Last year at Farmington she interviewed twenty-eight collectors. This year she will interview "Past National Show Hosts".

Webmaster – Bob Berry reported that hits to the website are up this year. People are downloading information available on the website. The McDougalds' kindly donated their works to the NIA. These publications will be downloaded as a PDF. Bob is still working on listing Foreign Glass Insulators. Additionally he has taken on the task of compiling Foreign Porcelain CD's. Bob asked for input from the membership concerning these endeavors.

After the Advisors/Chairpersons' Reports, Don shared with the membership the following decisions made by the Board of Directors:

Don called on Darryl Wagner, the Events Chairman, to explain the action taken related to future NIA National Shows. Effective with the Proposal/Bid process for the 2017 National Show, the NIA will assume financial responsibility for the National Shows. The Events Committee will be more involved with the potential Host/Hosts in the Proposal/Bid process, and they will be more involved with the Host/Hosts who are awarded the bid related to the implementation of the National Show.

Don asked Gene Hawkins to share with the membership changes that have been made concerning Judging of Displays, and the addition of a new category of "Children Displays". Gene reported that improvements have been approved related to the Judging of Displays. Primarily the judging process has been simplified. With this new process it is less cumbersome and detailed. The new category for Children pertains to those who are 12 and under. There will be awards for them which will appeal to their age. Additionally, there will be play money called "Kid's Cash" which will be giving to the Children Displayers as an award. The "Kid's Cash" is to be used at the National for the Kids to buy insulators from dealers. The dealers then have the option to submit the "Kid's Cash" to the NIA Treasurer for reimbursement. This process will also be used in the Youth Display Category.

Don then introduced Kim Borgman as the new Central Region VP. Don also advised the membership that Bill Rohde will remain as the incumbent Treasurer. Additionally, Don advised that Mike Green was appointed as the Development Advisor and Margret Wagner was appointed as the Product Marketing Manager.

Don opened the floor for Questions and Answers. Don advised everyone that our budget will be much tighter in the future. With the NIA assuming responsibility for the finances of the future National Shows, we will need to work on increasing our assets through donations. Additionally, we need more donations for our Scholarship efforts. Don gave a personal note of thanks to Lou Hall for his assistance this past year.

Gene Hawkins shared with everyone his idea of the kind of trophy that would been given to children who are displayers. He wants to create something that the kids can relate to and will be fun for them. Something different, something bright/colorful, and something that will not break (so the child will not get hurt) when it is dropped!

There was a question from the floor, "can we create a Lifetime Membership that can be purchased"? Don advised that this has been discussed in the past and will be revisited; however, there currently is an award given by the NIA called the "Lifetime Member Award". We need to be careful that we do not make a decision that would diminish the significance of this award.

Don gave a review of the schedule of events for the remainder of the 2015 NIA National Show.

- 1. Saturday, July 4th, there will be a Cocktail Hour from 5:30 6:30 pm. in the Banquet Area.
- 2. Saturday, July 4th, the NIA Awards Banquet will be from 6:30 9:00 pm. in the Banquet Room.
- 3. Sunday, July 5th, there will be a Devotional time from 8:00 8:30 am. This will be held in the same room as the General Membership Meeting.

As the last order of business, Don presented the 2016 NIA National Show Hosts. They are Bob Stahr and Rick Soller.

Bob and Rick stated that the 2016 National Show will be held in Muncie, Indiana, from July 28, through July 30. The Show location is the Horizon Convention Center which is a Marriott property. There will be guided tours to the Hemingray Plant property. They are not sure if the tours will be allowed to enter any of the buildings. They will advise the membership when that information is available. Currently they have reserved one-half of the Show Hall. That space will accommodate 125 tables. The total hall space is 24,000 square feet. Tables will be \$55.00 each. The Banquet will be in the Convention Center. Muncie is about seventy miles northeast of Indianapolis. Show packets are available.

As there was no additional business, Don accepted a motion to adjourn from Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes. The motion was seconded. The motion was approved by the membership.

10 pts Public Appeal - Attractiveness to new & non-collectors (less jargon, more info)

5 pts Use of props & go-withs - Non-insulator items to support/assist the display (platforms, pins etc.)

5 pts Exhibitor biography & explanation - Who I am, why I collect & the significance of the display

Education (total of 35 possible points)

10 pts History – Describe when/who, research, time line, people & company info.

10 pts Information – Describe what/how/why display items were used, methods, etc.

10 pts Good use of Titles & Labels – What are we looking at? Which items are rare/unusual?

5 pts Handouts – Long term education after the show

Note: The Showmanship & Education totals are used to determine the Millholland Educational Award winner.

Content 25 pts

Rarity, variety, condition, completeness & how overall display meets the category.

The display is to be judged within display context/ theme.

Bonus +5 pts

Judge's optional bonus – Can be awarded for exceptional merit in 1 above category

Adult displays should have a minimum of 65 points to win a category award.

Junior (13-18 yrs old on 1st show day) displays should have 55 points to win a junior category award.

NIA Kid Kash will also be awarded: \$40 for 1st, \$20 2nd, \$10 for all others in category.

I was, however, able to attend the Colorado Springs show in May, generously hosted once again by Dan Gauron. There was a great turnout this year! Lots of new and familiar faces, and even NIA President Don Briel was in attendance. I've only been to a handful of these shows to date, but this was by far the most tables I had seen, with aisles of glass stretching all the way outside. The barbeque was excellent, as always! Plus, this will allow our ads to appear on other web sites that use Google AdSense, and could help widen our exposure there as well. I'll report on my findings in the next issue.

The "Social Side" of Insulator Shows "What kind of show attendee are you?"

What kind of show attendee are you? I have always loved observing people and especially fellow collectors and their nuances. As a photographer and construction project manager, I honed my observation skills. As we become known to our fellow collectors our personalities, our likes and dislikes, what we collect and how we collect start to brand each of us. Many times factors outside the show environment shape or influence what and who we are as collectors. I will use myself as an example. For several years running I built a new educational display for Springfield (Mid-Ohio Show). My geographic proximity permitted me to transport the display. My teaching background and love of the electrical industry (I grew up around an electrical generating station where my father was Chief Engineer) molded my curiosity and interest. Consequently, one of my best friends and insulator collecting mentor (several years my senior) was a lineman who worked with my father.

Probably key to the multiple displays was the desire for more knowledge and boredom. I always hated bringing the same display twice. So once it was built and displayed, I would start to liquidate it and invest in new specimens for the next display. Many of my friends found this humorous and always joked with me about what I might be collecting this year. Most of the displays were specialties. That direction gave me the opportunity to really study an insulator set and understand what was truly hard to find. Specializing also had the benefit of understanding pricing and color variances.

Attending hundreds of shows over the years, I had the opportunity to encounter a large population of collectors. The following are some categories of collectors I have personally observed (you may choose to add yours): Happy Puppy......This collector is "walking on air" in anticipation of the show and seeing old friends. Much like a puppy greeting its owner, this person is in high spirits and bounces from table to table to catch up on old news. Oh, insulators get discussed and bought but this person puts socializing as a top priority. He/she is well known, has hundreds of contacts and is generally well liked.

A sub-category of this group is the Story Teller. One of my favorite "story-tellers" was the late Steve Blair. Steve always reminded me of my Uncle who lived in Texas. He was always relaying his hundreds of experiences that captivated you. You could always find Steve talking with friends and collectors about the early days, experiences as a lineman, etc. I always considered these people the nucleus of the hobby because they had a wealth of knowledge.

Dumpster Diver....no box, no table, no area under, back or near a table or car trunk is missed. They are ferreting out anything and everything that could be valuable to them. The free table is like being on drugs to them. A most common insulator with some minor deviation can make their show. They are willing to invest whatever time it takes and are often easily pleased by new finds.

The Sherlock Holmes.....the detective. I have seen this type in many hobbies. They mask the insulator to compare mold styles and how many styles might have existed. They have a complete checklist of what they need to compete their collection. They have their collection cataloged, photographed, digitized, stored on their iPad or lap top. If they could finger print their collection they would. My friend Gene Hawkins is an example of this collector.

The Beginner.....of course we all experienced being in this group. The first show is so overwhelming. We have never seen so many shapes and colors. We probably have little direction in where we are head-



ed and want everything. Every shiny object gathers their attention. These are the people we need to "befriend", assist and help educate. These are potential life-long friends. You may only see them a few times a year but they can be special relationships. I have collected many things, but absolutely no collecting arena replaces insulators, in that I have established friendships in almost every state of the Union and also in Canada. The evolution of the Internet has facilitated the lines of communication with those we meet at shows. Sometimes it works in reverse. You meet or deal with someone, only to later meet them at a show. In earlier days of collecting there were not many shows within easy driving distance. Additions via the mail were accomplished by sales lists. There were almost no collectors locally to share your hunting experiences and knowledge with. Consequently, I lived from show to show and after a few years lost interest causing me to find other interests. But when I returned the scene had changed as the Internet put a whole new perspective on collecting and even added to the show experiences.

One form of Beginner is the "Hoover" because they are an effective "vacuum" picking up anything and everything for their collection. Most ultimately mature to understand that you cannot own them all and they start to focus.

Closet Collectors During the 90's I dealt in bottles and antiques. I had booths and display cases in antique malls. The reward was that it "pulled" a significant group of collectors into the light. I was never so surprised how many collectors were in my geographic area. When I would place new insulator inventory in the sales cases, it might sit for a week or two and then suddenly sell. Often I would have a note to call someone or asking if I had some particular piece. If you meet them get them to attend a show. I actually had a trucker that passed through about 3-4 times a year and would buy anything he did not have.

Insulators are my Second Interest..... I enjoy these collectors who may have several collections. Generally they are somewhat related areas like railroad collectibles, model railroading, lightning rod and weather vanes, electrical tools, electrical meters, historic photographs, bottles and jars, telegraph material, postcards, glass whimsies, and the list goes on. Expand your horizons and get to know them and learn about what else they collect.

Personally, there is never enough time for me to pursue all my interests which range from model rocketry, landscaping and gardening, sports photography (I shoot for a National Sports Publication for Officials), collecting insulators, bottles, vintage toy moving and storage trucks (I manage a large storage facility), bass fishing, collecting antiques, and spending time with 8 grandchildren and family.

Diggers....for the longest time I counted myself among this group. They constitute a small group but are good to know. They are the cutting edge of new finds and a great source of a possible new additions. There is still much to be found in the ground. I had the experiences I wish all collectors could have had of walking lines and railroads, digging in local dumps and hunting the Muncie Dump. The thrill of the "hunt" will always remain with me. Generally speaking, these people who are successful are researchers. They study local history, speak to old timers, study maps and look for clues to places to dig. There are still avid diggers in the hobby who are willing to share their methodology. Get to know them they occasionally come upon some great finds that they desire to trade or sell.


Wheeler Dealer.... This person may or may not be a collector. The collector version is one who trades and sells to achieve a new collecting goal: better quality ("upgrading") or a specialization. The other form is the person who is more a dealer and acquires to create income. This person is good to know as they often can aid in finding something you want. They also tend to be very knowledgeable.

Minty Mike... While I have absolutely no issue with collectors who want the best condition, I have experienced a couple of collectors in my lifetime who demanded MINT. As any veteran insulator collector knows, this is best handled as a direct contact purchase (at a show or in person). This is not to berate any of my friends who have catalog auctions. But if you consider yourself a CONDITION NUT, make sure you communicate with the seller and see photos and ask questions. Reputable catalog sellers encourage



this as they prefer a happy customer. My Minty Mike experiences in early collecting were unreasonable resulting in the glass being shipped back on several occasions. Of course this was pre-Internet. Remember that pieces coming from the factory had imperfections. Sometimes this is hard to differentiate from later damage. Some collectors I have encountered deem cooling cracks as less than mint. Remember, It's an avocation, not a vocation for most of us. Have Fun and be Safe my friends! And by all means, collect responsibly.

It's that time of year again and if you are thinking about putting in an application to host the 2017 NIA National Show for the Western Region, get your applications in. The NIA Events Advisory Committee will look it over and help you with your submission.

The NIA Board of Directors voted this year to help hosts with the National Shows. Beginning in 2017, the NIA will assist (if necessary) in paying for expenses of a National Show. If the host has not collected enough revenue for the initial payments for an event contract, the NIA will write the check. As revenues are collected, they will be forwarded to the NIA on at least a monthly basis. The host can either pay expenses themselves and submit receipts for reimbursement or simply let the NIA pay for any invoices. Invoices will have to be for items or services that were included in the budget submitted to the Board for approval. Any unforeseen or additional expenses will need to have Board approval or the host can provide from their personal funds.

The general idea of what the NIA has agreed to do is that if an approved bid proposal is accepted by the Board and comes up short on revenue, the NIA will provide for the shortfall, taking the risk away from potential hosts. This does not mean that the Board is going to accept any bids that simply want the NIA to pay for the show, it means that the host still needs to work for the show to pay for itself, but if it does not, they are not at risk.

The Events Advisory Committee will also need to review any contracts that the potential show hosts may sign for the show. This will allow the committee to assist the potential show hosts in negotiating costs and also help avoid any potential issues that might put the show host and the NIA at risk.

If anyone has any questions or is ready to start the submission of an application, please let myself, or someone on the committee know. If you want more information, go to the NIA website, <u>www.nia.org</u>, then go to the NIA Membership Handbook. There are 4 separate tabs regarding shows, General Rules of Conduct at NIA Sponsored Shows, Show Facilities Standards & Procedures, Exhibit & Judging Rules and Administrative Show Rules. There is also a tab on the main web page, "Information for Show Hosts". This information is there for anyone to access. In addition, any Officer of the NIA, Club officers or prior show hosts can answer questions for potential show hosts.

History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 ¼ inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project was continued by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemorative struggle at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(3)c.





My name is Pete Wilson and I just became an NIA member! I have been collecting insulators on and off for over 35 years now, so I feel a little funny having only now applied for an NIA membership. If there's one thing I could tell new collectors, it would be to join NIA!!! I should have done it a long time ago! The Drip Points magazine is awesome and the wealth of information from everyone is priceless! My collecting started when I was around 10 years old. My mother and I, along with our neighbors, used to go to a local auction house run by a thin, wire-haired

go to a local auction house run by a thin, wire-haired old character named Arnold. It was amongst the chaos and disorder of this messy old auction house, at an auction many moons ago, that some glass insulators caught my eye. It was my first taste of insulator collecting, and from that day on I was destined to glass madness! After that I was always looking for different shaped or colored insulators every time I went to the auction. I certainly did not know that much about insulators in those early years. It was not until many years later that I became a true collector, understanding and appreciating the providence of each piece. These early years of collecting for me was a time before laptops, tablets and iPhones, long before Google, Bing, apps and FaceBook, so I didn't have a lot to work with besides Dewey decimal and his awesome card cataloging system. I knew what insulators did, functionally that is, but that's about it. I knew that the purple and 7-up green ones looked super cool when you shot 'em!!! (I still have terrible dreams and cold sweats over this, may the glass gods forgive me). I searched for insulators for many years as a teenager and went to many an auction to grow my fledgling collection. The numbers quickly grew and soon filled some shelves in my room where I had my collection proudly displayed in a prominent place where it could be seen well by all who entered.

When I was around twelve years old I started playing the drums (much to the chagrin of my parents I am sure). One day at around age seventeen I was banging away at the drums when suddenly it was as if the world had turned to slow motion, almost animated! I watched with liquid emotions as my entire collection tumbled off the wall like a glistening glass waterfall. In stunned time-altered disbelief I watched them plummet, my heart falling along with my humble treasures to their demise. Suddenly, time rapidly caught up with itself as I was abruptly awakened from my temporary comatose state by the thunderous claps of what sounded like artillery bursts! It cracked through the slow-mo silence like a lightning bolt. Concussive explosions of sadness shattering into blooms of colored glass tears which rained down heavy upon the room, until slowly subsiding into a sprinkle of despair!!!!! It hurt! I cried! I had managed to vibrate the bolts right out of the wall! Idiot! The worst part was that not one survived. Not even a stinky 42! Needless to say I was extremely heartbroken and vastly discouraged. I couldn't even look at another insulator for a long time! It was a broken relationship so to speak!

Several years later my friend Steve Deck and I were walking some railroad tracks taking a shortcut back to his house, when Steve found an insulator! He wondered out loud what it could be and where it came from? ...and that was it! That was the moment of rebirth of my love of insulators! My collection now pushes a couple hundred, a respectable amount I suppose. There's nothing crazy in my collection, I'm by no means rich! If I had a \$30k insulator I would probably sell it and pay off all my debt! So I collect what I can with my meager income. My insulators range from your basic less-than-a-dollar type to one's worth a few hundred dollars. Some insulators which I know I will never find I have bought, like my Muncie, coolie, stacker, etc. Most of the insulators in my collection I have actually taken from a pole, or dug from the ground myself. Thus, many of my insulators have a memory associated with them. I can remember the day I got each one, for the most part. Who I was with, what time of the year it was, what line it came from, and crazy things that have happened along the way that made it a fun and exciting insulator hunting day! To me, this is what makes insulator collecting is a great hobby! Oh by the way,



Steve caught the bug that day too and is now also an NIA member and a full-fledged insulator nut too! I grew up and currently live in Tonawanda, New York. A quiet suburb just north of Buffalo and south of Niagara Falls. Originally called Tonnewanta by the native Iroquois tribe, it means 'swift waters', referring to the fast moving waters of the Niagara River. Tonawanda is best known for being at the western end of the Erie Barge Canal. There are several bridges over the canal here, including one cantilevered railroad bridge designed to open for tall ships moving freight down the canal. It's a smart bridge designed with a huge concrete counterweight on one side that is filled by pump with water to raise the bridge, and gravity drained to lower it. However, the bridge was only ever raised once because by the time it was completed over the canal, the railroads had showed that shipping by rail was much cheaper and canal shipping quickly waned off and soon became obsolete! The Buffalo area was second only to Chicago in miles of railroad track for any city in the world. The reason for all this railroad track was because of the massive amount of industry in this area. The industry was attracted by cheap Niagara Falls power and the unlimited fresh water access the Great Lakes and the Niagara River had to offer. I mention bridges, rails, and industry, because with all this industrial sprawl came the need for communication and power lines, and to run lines you need boatloads of poles, crossarms, and brackets with LOTS and LOTS and LOTS of glass and porcelain insulators to go on them!

Most of these old bridges, rail lines, and industrial buildings are gone now, but some still exist. Much of what is still around is slowly decaying and will soon be reclaimed by the sands of time or knocked down to make room for the relentless march of progress. When the "old-timers" that remember how things used to be are gone, things will only be remembered in the pages of obscure history books. However! These last remaining relics of our once great infrastructure and icons of our past economic power, these veterans of a lost time, left in disarray and forgotten by most, have an awesome power! These dilapidated buildings, defunct railroads and rusting bridges have the power to bring history alive!!!! Many still hide their bounty of glass and porcelain. Treasures galore are just waiting for that right insulator collector to open that rusty hidden door to an

electrical room that no one's been in for years and years, or to stumble across a crumbling barn in the middle of nowhere with old wooden crates marked "insulators", or to dig in just the right place and find something completely new!!!!

In 2008 my friend Steve and I took a trip to an old industrial area on the Niagara River to see what we could discover. We ended up in an area formerly owned and operated by the Wickwire Steel Company. It once housed a huge complex of arc furnaces and manufacturing buildings supported by a giant docking area, larger than a football field, where lake freighters would dock to supply the raw ingredients of limestone, iron ore, coal and coke for steel production. Wickwire purchased the farm land in 1906 and immediately started to build a steel plant on the site. Wickwire started production in 1908 and continued making steel products until they went out of business in 1964. Like many cities in America, the time during WWII was a booming time for many of the industries in this area. Wickwire made all sorts of metal objects needed for the war effort including springs, barbed wire, wire rope, netting, screening, fencing, etc. as well as parts for jeeps, tanks, halftracks, rifles, etc. During this trip, and consecutive others back to the Wickwire facility, we discovered many insulators including emerald green 254's tucked in flooded basement caves, jumbos hanging 60 feet up on brackets, 4" thick porcelain 'pancake' insulators from the docking crane gantry, and several porcelain and glass types on building brackets, poles, and buried in the ground! I always bring a glass bible with me on digs and adventures, but never the porcelain guide, so upon arriving back home after our adventure I attempted to look up the porcelain insulators we had found. I broke out Elton Gish's guide to porcelain insulators and started identifying each one. I managed to tag all of them except one type, an odd-shaped Pinco. A total of five insulators of this type were dug from an area on the property which hadn't been touched in nearly 50 years. The insulators were still screwed onto the pins, which were still in the cross-arm, which was still attached to the pole! The entire pole was lying on its side and buried under tons of dirt, rocks, and trees. The five insulators from this pole didn't look like any porcelain insulator in the guide. So as per the instructions in the porcelain guide, I broke out a sheet of paper, a



pane of glass and a strong light and made a shadow diagram of one of them. I sent it off to Elton Gish and awaited a response. After doing some research Elton eventually sent me a message. He was thrilled with my shadow diagram saying it was the best he had ever received! Albeit he has only ever received a few shadow diagrams, three I think. He went on to inform me that I had actually discovered an insulator that was originally listed in a 1941 Pinco catalog but was somehow overlooked by everyone since!!!! Apparently they didn't sell many of this type of insulator so they were discontinued from the catalog after only one year in production. Now we know that Wickwire Steel Company was one company that bought at least 5 from Pinco that year!!! Anyhow, soon after I received another email informing me that King Elton had dubbed this insulator U-402A! Last year when Elton was getting his new price guide together he contacted me about getting him some pictures of the insulator. I promptly snapped some pictures and sent them off to him. As proof of being a loyal subject to the kingdom of clay I also mailed him one of the five U-402A PINCO porcelain insulators we found that day!






