Greetings Fellow NIA Members,

My wife and I returned from the 2017 NIA National Show just a few days ago. If you were there you know what a great show it was. For those of you who were not there, I'm sorry you couldn't attend. I wish there was a way for me to describe how good it was. Simply said, it was fantastic. Dan & Wendy Gauron, Mike & Lori Green, and David & Pam Baron hosted a National to remember. On behalf of the NIA, I'm sure evervone who was there would join me in extending to the Show Hosts a heartfelt THANK YOU! And, while we are talking about the National Show, the next two Nationals were announced while we were at Colorado Springs. For those of you who haven't already heard, the 2018 National will be held in Kansas City, Missouri, and the Show Hosts are Darryl and Margaret Wagner. And, the 2019 National will be held in Orlando, Florida, and the Show Hosts are Jacqueline Linscott-Barnes, Graham Barnes and Clay Bledsoe.

My time at the National went by very quickly as there were a number of activities that I needed to participate in. The NIA leadership team met for the Board of Directors' Meeting on Thursday prior to the Show. The bulk of the meeting dealt with administrative issues that needed to be updated. Following are a few of the things that we changed. First, the Board of Directors approved changing our budget year to coincide with our Membership year, and our tax and legal filing year. Basically, what that means is that our budget will be based on the calendar year. I realize that this will be transparent to most of you; however, for our Treasurer, this will make his job much easier. Next, we discussed the fact that the NIA should periodically conduct fiscal audits. During the next six months we will be transitioning our books from a July through June budget year, to a January through December budget year. After that, the Board agreed that we could utilize the assistance of the Finance Committee to assist us in an internal audit, or we may choose to conduct an external audit using the services of an external accounting firm. However, the Board agreed that we would require an audit should there be a change of personnel relative to the Treasurer's position. (At this point I want to make a very clear statement. In my opinion, our NIA Treasurer is a

man above reproach. I trust him without question. Our purpose for suggesting future audits is to show due diligence to you the membership. You have asked us to serve you and we as Board Members must do all we can to properly monitor our records.) The third thing I would like to mention about the Board Meeting is related to the Events Committee. The Board has asked the Events Committee to begin developing documentation that will better assist potential, or selected, Show Hosts relative to planning and implementing either an NIA National or Regional Show. Each year we are gleaning a better understanding of what is required to host one of these shows. We feel that having a guideline will greatly assist those who have volunteered to host a show for the NIA.

There was one specific topic that was discussed in the Board of Directors' Meeting that I would like to relate to you. One of our Board Members recently assisted a deceased member's widow with the disposition of the member's collection. This process became very difficult for the widow because of their uncertainty of knowing exactly how the collector would have wanted their collection to be disposed of. So, I'll ask you a question. If something were to happen to you would your family know your wishes relative to the liquidation of your collection? I'm sure some of you could say yes to that question. However, I'm also sure that many of you would have to say No! Please do your family a favor and write a plan for the disposition of your collection. There are many options you could choose from such as selling the collection via one of the many auction venues, to writing a bequest to leave the collection to a museum or even the NIA. The point here is not the importance of what you choose to do with your collection, but rather that you formulate a plan and write your wishes down for the sake of your loved ones. Be proactive. Plan well. Anything can happen to any of us!

Another activity was the General Membership Meeting which was held on Friday evening immediately following the close of the show on NIA Day. You will find the details of the meeting in the Secretary's report; however, let me express my appreciation to everyone for their participation. The meeting was in a very large room and it was full. We had to ask for more chairs to be delivered and there were still a few who were standing in the back! Why do I mention this? Because your presence tells me you are interested in what is going on in your organization. With that said, if you have a question or concern, please either contact me or the Vice President serving your region and communicate your interests with us. I can't promise you that we will find solutions for every topic that we may encounter; however, I will assure you that we will give your concerns due consideration.

At the conclusion of the Membership Meeting we introduced the new Western Region Vice President, Michael Doyle. Michael has been a participant in the hobby for many years and is very excited about serving the membership in this capacity. His predecessor was Ron Yuhas. Ron has done a great job as the Western VP for the last three years and we are very appreciative of his service to the organization. Additionally, we announced that Bill Rohde will continue for an additional term as the Treasurer.

In addition to the previously mentioned Board of Directors' positions, there were a few more changes in the NIA leadership that were announced. Recently Kay Bryant resigned as the Scholarship Chairperson. Jeanne Briel has agreed to begin serving as the Scholarship Chairperson. Additionally, Lee Brewer has agreed to serve on the Scholarship Committee. Also, Jim White resigned as the Promotions Advisor. I have asked Christian Willis, our Information Director, to absorb the role of the Promotions Advisor into the function of the Information Director. Christian has agreed to take on this added responsibility. The NIA can't perform to your expectations without the volunteer members of the organization who agree to help get the job done. Trevor and his family were not in attendance; however, Andrew was there to receive his scholarship check. It is very rewarding to see the NIA assisting these deserving young men as they continue their education. Like their families, we the NIA Membership are very proud of them!

Also during the banquet there were a few people who were recognized for their contribution to the communications industry, or to our hobby. We had two Hall of Fame inductees this year. They were Ezra Cornell and William Brookfield. Next, we had four recipients of the President's Award. They were Kay Bryant, Darryl Wagner, Bill Rohde and Don Briel. And last but not least, we have a couple who received the Lifetime Membership Award. They were Bob and Carolyn Berry! All of these recipients were very deserving and I'm sure I may speak for all of the NIA Membership in offering them our warmest congratulations!

In closing I want to recognize one additional person. That is Jason Townsend. All of the NIA National Awards that were presented this year were underwritten by a generous donation given by Jason and his family. Thank you, Jason! We appreciate it!

You'll be glad you did. Hopefully you will find that one insulator you've been looking for. 


As many of you may or may not know, I'm the individual who does the Consolidated Design drawings for the Insulator Price Guide. I thought I would take a departure from discussing our recent National and explain how I go about doing drawings for the hobby. I am not the first, nor will I be the last, to attempt to catalog insulator shapes, as I believe the need will continue for many years to come. For those new to the hobby, there have been many efforts through the years to record insulator shape variations. Early sales catalogs and advertisements were done by graphic artists of the era with varying levels of accuracy.

Later efforts, such as the 1912 Brookfield Insulator Catalog provided more drawings with greater accuracy:





By the time Pyrex started making insulators, illustrations were true technical drawings:






The challenge for collectors was that there was no single source of all shapes to refer to for identification. In the early days of the hobby Lynn Stuart, Francis Terrill and N. R. Woodward all had insulator guides with drawings. Woodward made the best effort at representing mechanical drawings in support of his Consolidated Design system.




Terrill's drawings were sketches of insulators in perspective, while Stuart's drawings had an artistic flair to them.





I became involved in drawing the CDs after doing several covers for Crown Jewels of the Wire in the 90's.



John and Carol McDougald asked me to create new digital drawings for the price guide following the format that N.R. Woodward established in his The Glass Insulator in North America Report. The original drawings done using Adobe Illustrator, and I subsequently redrew them using Inkscape with standard CMYK Colors and line widths. There are three colors: Black. White, and Gray, and four line widths corresponding

to external, internal, detail, and dimension lines. The Font is Arial 24, bold, and italicized. At least one third of the drawings have gone through additional revisions based on subtle profile differences or previously undocumented measurements. All drawings are done using a freeware vector graphics program called Inkscape. In this way, the files are transportable, at no cost, to whoever takes the task on when my days are done.

Early in the process I relied on Jack Tod's shadow



profile method to draw the initial profile of each insulator as described in the November 1978 issue of Crown Jewels. This is available on line at:

With the advent of digital cameras, and eventually cell phones with the ever increasing accuracy lev-

els I transitioned to digital images to eliminate parallax distortion and create the base profile for new drawings. I've found that photos take at a distance of five feet or more produces excellent results. Once I have a suitable photograph, I follow the process outlined below.






Figure 1. Measure the height and width of the insulator and create a grid (1/8" for large, 1/16" for small) rectangle matching those dimensions. Add a vertical center line and center it on the rectangle.



Figure 2. Insert the photograph behind the rectangle and resize the photograph until it fits in the box. "Trace" half of the outline of the insulator.




Figure 3. Copy the half outline and flip it horizontally, using alignment commands for vertical alignment.




Figure 4. Fill the left side with white, and the right with gray, adding external details on the left, and internal details on the right.




Figure 5. Add the appropriate threads to the right side (I have various thread drawings that I can swap in and out based on the insulator style: standard, American, segmented, etc.).




Figure 6. Add dimensions and Consolidated Design Number and you are done!

I produce two files for each drawing. One is a Portable Network Graphics

(.png) file for image reproduction like the price guide; the second is a vector graphics file for future edits that may arise. I do all drawings full size for accuracy (thankfully no limits to paper size when drawing a CD 331!). The final drawings can be reduced by percentage for any use.

I am always looking for any corrections to improve the accuracy of the drawings, or add variations to the Annex in the Price Guide. Feel free to e-mail me if you have anything new, or recommendations for how I can make the product better!

I was very much sorry to miss this year's National. From everything that I have heard and seen, it sounds like it was a good one, to say the least. While most of that involved visiting friends, seeing medieval architecture, admiring the countryside, and trying to avoid sunburn, insulators of course had their moment. My son Ian desperately wanted to get his hands on this CD 545 VA in purple that we walked past near Mt. St. Michel, but it was not to be. I was intrigued at finding CD 152 HEMINGRAY NO 40s in use in Lourmarin, down near the Mediterranean Sea. We found three of them on the side of an old Romanesque church, and there were others scattered around the town. Given the SDP and the embossing, these must have been put into service during or just after World War I. They are certainly a long way from home!

Now that I'm finally back from vacation, I'm catching up on all my mail. This especially includes recording all NIA members renewals and new membership applications that came in while I was away. If you renewed or joined recently (or know anyone who did, as anyone receiving this issue of Drip Points should already be a member!), please be patient (or let them know to be patient) for just a bit more. I have everything entered in our membership system, and hope to get all membership cards and new member packets mailed out this week so that I'm back up-to-date with my NIA duties.

My Membership Director's report to the NIA board this year included the comment that we looked to be in our third year in a row of membership decline, and that while there is usually a jump in membership around the time of the National, I didn't expect it would be enough to surpass the number of members from last year. Well, I'm happy to report that I was wrong. We added 94 members since that report, just over a month ago! Not only did we surpass last year's membership, but with 1,703 members currently, we have reached the fourth highest number of members since the NIA was started. It seems likely that this surge is due largely to the National in Colorado Springs. Many thanks to all of the folks who worked hard to make this such a successful show!

Now that the National is over, it's time to look forward to getting to other shows. Here in the northeast, that includes the CBIC show in Martinsburg, WV on August 12; the WRIC show in Richfield, OH on September 23; the Ontario Fall Insulator Show & Sale in Hillburgh, ON on October 14; and, of course, the 47th Mid-Ohio Show in Springfield, OH on November 3-5. Having been away for a while, I'm busy with all sorts of activities, but I'm going to do my best to get to as many of these shows as I can. Get out and support your local shows -- there's no beating them for the opportunity to see the insulators and meet the people!

Turning to some fun with numbers, I was wondering about this membership surge. I went and looked at the payments we have received in June, July, and August, under the assumption that many or most of these payments are probably from people getting ready to go to the National, at the National itself, or from new members after the show. Interestingly, this number hasn't changed much in the last few years, as you can see from the chart below.

The numbers from the 5 years before that are distinctly higher, especially back in 2008.



2017 NIA General Membership Meeting Friday, July 21, 2017 Hotel Elegante, Colorado Springs, CO

With a quorum in attendance, President, Steve Roberts, called the meeting to order at 4:15 PM. He thanked everyone in attendance, because without the membership there is no NIA. He thanked Dan Gauron, Mike Green, Dave Baron and their wives for the incredible job they've done in putting together the 2017 National. This got a Round of Applause.

Officer, Committee Chair and Advisors Report:

Secretary: Walt Baumgardt reported that the minutes of the 2016 General Membership Meeting had been published in Drip Points: 2016 – Volume 44 – No. 1. He also reported that our Corporate status as a 501-C3 organization is in order with the state of Arizona. The state of Arizona has submitted written verification of this fact. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Secretary's report. It passed unanimously.

Treasurer: Bill Rohde reported a good year for 2016 – 2017, finishing approximately \$1,300.00 short, and that the Board has passed a balanced budget for next year. He thanked everyone for their donations, mentioning that we count on them. He noted that last year we had approximately \$7,000.00 in donations.

Membership: In the absence of Andrew Gibson, Steve gave a brief update. The current active membership is 1609 with 930 Primary Members. The membership is split almost evenly between the three regions; East, Central and West.

Information Director: Christian Willis reported that Social Media is currently very active. He is reaching out to Google Ad Words, and this is working well. He has ad campaigns in various publications.

Western VP: Ron Yuhas said that this is his last report, with Mike Doyle having been elected to the post. Positive things have happened in the last year. More people and particularly more young people are attending shows, including tail-gaters.

Central VP: Kim Borgman reported that he is the Nominating Committee Chair for next year, and asked anyone interested in running for President, Secretary or Central VP to contact him.

Eastern VP: "Gus" Stafford reported 13 shows in the east in the 2016 – 2017 year. There is a new Insulator Club in the Eastern Region, The Twin Tier Insulator Club covering South Central New York and North Central Pennsylvania. He is working on a Lightning Rod Insulator project with Steve Bobb. Anyone with a LRI collection is asked to contact Steve to insure that as many LRI's as possible are included.

Authentication and Classification: Paul Greaves was not in attendance.

Awards & Recognition: Gene Hawkins reported the new judging format is working well, as is Kid's Cash and Awards. The information depicted on the Kid's cash reflects the area of the country in which the National is held. He would like to see more kids participating in displays. He also reported that next year there will be a new "Woody" Woodward NIA award for threaded insulators.

Ethics: Daryl Stahler is not in attendance.

Historian: Rick Soller reported that about 75 paper boxes of NIA archives are in storage, soon to be moved to his college office. He is working on insulator auction catalogues, and the voting demographics during the auctions. He reported that all the issues of Old Familiar Strains has been donated to the NIA.

Commemoratives: Carolyn Berry reported that very few commemoratives are left (\approx 50) and expects to sell out.

Research & Education: Jacque Linscott Barnes is not present.

Development: Mike Green thanked everyone for a good year; that donations had doubled over the 2015 – 2016 year. He thanked Lou Hall and Bill Rohde for their hard work. Accomplishments: a new membership renewal form asking for donations. He introduced Tommy Bolack, who was at the previous National in Colorado Springs in 1971, and is in atten-



dance today, 46 years later. He thanked Tommy for all he does for the Hobby. He encouraged people to vote on the various art works in the room. The Development Committee needs some direction from the Board. The Board will address this in the near future.

Marketing: Darryl Wagner noted that they have consolidated to 16 colors of T-Shirts. They also have bars for the National as well as bars for all Insulator Clubs, including the new Twin Tiers Insulator Club.

Promotions: Steve Roberts announced that Jim White has resigned as Promotions Director due to lack of time. He took this opportunity to thank Jim for his many years of service to the NIA, and to announce that the duties of The Promotions Director were being absorbed by Christian Willis. Christian now has responsibility for serving as the Information Director, Promotions as well as Drip Points Ad Manager.

Rules & Procedures: Mike Funderburk was not in attendance.

Scholarship: Steve announced that due to family considerations Kay Bryant has resigned as The Scholarship Chairperson. Jeanne Briel, a Scholarship Committee member, has agreed to assume the role of Committee Chair. This left an opening on the committee, which has been filled by Lee Brewer. Jeanne reported that in an effort to get better applications (the applicants must actually know what an insulator is) they are limiting the Scholarship ads to Drip Points and Crown Jewels. The essay criteria has been changed to a two part question; 1. How do you know about insulators, and 2. How would you spread the word to others. Jeanne announced that two scholarships are being given this year, to be announced at the banquet.

Drip Points Editor: Shaun Kotlarsky was not in attendance.

Drip Points Ad Manager: Christian stated that advertisers are needed. He added that NIA members get one free 25 word ad every year in Drip Points. He is working to run ads for other collecting venues on a reciprocating basis.

Web Master: Bob Berry reported the NIA club on Facebook has 1500 members. He has been working to update Glass and Porcelain Insulators from Outside North America. The updated GIFONA and PI-FONA are on <u>NIA.org</u>. A number of books have been digitized and placed on the website, including books by Marilyn Albers and "Woody" Woodward. A recent addition is Mark Lauckner's book on Canadian Railway Insulators.

Events Committee: Darryl announced that Contracts have been signed for the Nationals for the next two years. They are looking for hosts for the 2020 National, to be held in the Western Region. They are looking for hosts for Regional Shows, noting that there hasn't been a Regional in a number of years.

Special Projects: Mike Doyle reported that he is working behind the scenes on Forward Thinking ideas that will take several years to bring to fruition. He added that he has talked with three people from the Western Region that are interested in hosting the 2020 National.

Finance Committee: Bill Snell stated that they are working with Bill Rohde to smooth the budgeting process. They are working with the Events Committee to create a tool to better track Show finances. They are also working on being ready to perform an internal audit should the Board ask for one.

Steve Roberts apologized for failing to recognize the 1st Past President: Don Briel noted that he really had nothing to report, other than that he is pleased to serve the NIA in any capacity.

Steve talked about how active the Board has been this year. It has acted on a total of 17 recommendations. Highlights are as follows:

- Each Board position now has a back-up. Gene Hawkins is backed up by Kevin Jacobsen. Walt Baumgardt and Bill Rohde back up one another. Andrew Gibson and Christian Willis back up one another. Steve Roberts is backed up by Don Briel. The Regional VP's back up one another.
- The NIA has received a bequest from Elton Gish.



- A contract was signed for the 2017 National show, as well as for the 2018 and 2019 Nationals.
- The National Show Contract has been updated.
- The Membership Handbook has been updated, and is available on the website as a pdf.
- Both the Scholarship and Membership Brochures have been updated.
- The rules governing the possibility of Board Members receiving an NIA award have been changed.
 "Any NIA member who serves 6 consecutive full years in any NIA Board member, Advisor or Chair Person capacity are eligible to be nominated for an NIA award."
- The criteria for scholarship selection has been changed.
- Legal Protection of the NIA name and Logo are in process, awaiting Government action.
- In 45 years there has never been a financial audit. We will be pursuing an internal audit to show due diligence to the membership.
- We will be moving our budget year to match our membership and tax years (January 1 to December 30). This will facilitate the budgeting process. In order to accomplish this we have adopted two budgets. The first is from July 1, 2017 – December 30, 2017. The second is from January 1, 2018 to December 30, 2018. At next year's Board meeting we will adopt a budget for the 2019 calendar year.
- The Development Committee was formed with Mike Green as Chair and committee members Lou Hall and Bill Rohde.

Steve opened the meeting to the floor.

In lieu of the fact that the Board has passed a balanced budget, the motion was made that all NIA Board Members run for National Congress. Steve thanked them for their confidence in the Board but stated that a second would not be recognized. Someone asked if the Board had considered non NIA members being able to subscribe to Drip Points. This could be of interest to members of related hobbies such as Railroad and bottles. The Board has not considered it, but will take it under advisement in the near future.

There being no other questions. Steve thanked the show hosts once again. The show hall opens at 8 AM on Saturday and Sunday, and opens to the public at 9 AM. The show closes at 4 PM on Saturday and 3 PM on Sunday. Sunday devotions are at 8 AM.

The upcoming shows were announced:

The 2018 National is in Kansas City, MO with Darryl and Margaret Wagner as show hosts.

The 2019 National is in Orlando, FL, with show hosts, Jacque and Graham Barnes and Clay Bledsoe.

It is noted that show hosts cannot sell anything until the Saturday morning of the National Show preceding their own National Show.

It was noted that the NIA was actually formed at the 3rd Meet (National). Therefore 2019 is the 50th Anniversary of the National Meet (National) while 2022 is the 50th anniversary of the NIA.

A motion to adjourn was made and seconded. Steve adjourned the meeting at 5:30PM with a reminder of Mike Tucker's seminar on the Transcontinental Railroad at 7 PM.

I took a chance because it looked promising. This one was in a lot with 3 or 4 old Ball mason jars, a vintage breadbox, and the other insulators.

I got a cobalt blue CD 162 thrown in as an extra for a \$10 bucket of commons, and I paid \$30 for the threadless CD 742.

I would like to give some credit to Robin Plewes, who has been my resource for all things insulator-related. I ran the auction photo by him to get his opinion, and he did a great job of laying out the possibilities and factors to weigh. I may not have followed through without his encouragement that it may possibly be a "top-shelf" find. He has been extremely patient and generous in sharing his expertise with an insulator- rookie."

History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"


Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 ¼ inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project was continued by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemorative sthrough 2009 at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(3)c.




