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A fresh new Look for Drip Points Magazine! Over the winter I redesign the layout of Drip Points Magazine from the ground up. Literally starting with a black slate. The new design is flatter and more intuitive. Those that use iOS know where my inspiration came from.

The color bars at the bottom of the pages coordinate with the section that you are in (same as the ones in the table of contents on the inside cover). There are a bunch of small but nice changes like that, I will let you discover them as you go through the magazine.

If you get the electronic version of the magazine there are a couple of new bonus features for you. The table of contents is now interactive. If you click on a page number it will take you to that page. You can also view a list of bookmarks in Adobe Acrobat by clicking on the bookmarks icon. Or if you use Apple Preview on OS X click the top left button and select "Table of contents"

On the back cover there are two QR codes that you can scan with your smart phone to quickly go to the NIA website or to our Facebook group.

Special thanks to friend and fellow Hemingray collector Christian Willis for redrawing the NIA logo for me from scratch. It is 100% true to the original but is now vector and will print way more crisp. I have wanted to do this for some time and thanks to Christin I was able to get this done.

Suspension Type (ST) numbering system update. Last issue we (Steve Coffman and I) introduced you to the new ST numbering system for Suspension Type Insulators. I wanted to give you a "State of the Union" on this cool new system.

As of this writing we have a total of 170 listings! Amazing when you think that only a couple months ago this system did not exist. Over the last couple months we have been making refinements to the system. We changed the name of two ranges to eliminate confusion. What we use to call "Pre Austin patent" (ST-300-3999) we now call "Classic straight cap". To keep things neat we also changed "Austin patent" (ST-4000-4999) to "Modern compression caps". This is a cleaner way to name them. The assigned numbers are all the same just the naming of the ranges changed.

The ST-6000-6499 range has been reworked. The new subdivisions are:

ST-6000-6025 - (Solid Core suspension string) (ST-6026-6099 - (Half Motors) ST-6100-6499 - (Other non traditional styles)

Website enhancements have been made based on feedback and some ideas Steve and I had. There is now a thumbnail view that can be helpful as you learn the ranges. Also added a constant, but unobtrusive navigation bar at the bottom of all the ST pages for easily going to next page and switching back and forth to the above mentioned thumbnail view.

The Association has had the two volumes professionally scanned both in a .pdf and a word.docx format. The pdf files have been sent to Bob Berry to be posted on the website.

John and Carol, before and after their assignment of the copyright to the NIA, indicated their desire to make a gift to the hobby of their reference and research files. They are pleased that their books will be available at no cost as historic references to those who have become active in the hobby.

John and Carol have also presented to the NIA three boxes of reference and research material for inclusion in the NIA archives.

The Board of Directors unanimously approved the publishing of any or all of the copyrighted material assigned to or owned by the NIA on the NIA website. These materials will be made available without cost to anyone who complies with the following notification:

"This document is made available for personal use only. It is copyrighted and the contents thereof must not be reprinted or imparted to a third party nor be used for any unauthorized purpose without obtaining advanced written permission from the National Insulator Association."

Almost all of the first printing of the "What Are Insulators?" information booklets have been distributed so another

2500 copies have been printed. This printing has been updated with more pictures and a slight change to the layout. We are in the process of sending out quantities of these booklets to the show



hosts for all of the upcoming local shows. The booklet is also available for download on the NIA website. Our goal is to distribute these booklets to school and public libraries, other collecting organizations, antique malls and dealers, etc. With help from all our members

With the snow swirling around my window, and my prospects for getting out of the house this morning diminishing rapidly, I thought this would be the ideal moment to prepare something for this edition of Drip Points. I usually devote days like this to researching, photo taking and the like, more often than not, involving insulators. I have been lucky to have been involved in collecting long enough to have a fairly good library, including a number of early original manufacturer's catalogs. In the past few months I have been astounded at the great information that can be found on the Internet in books that google has scanned. It has been a fairly easy effort to come up with old corporate records on companies operating in New Jersey at the turn of the last century. The alternative up until a few years ago, was to visit a county courthouse or archives, driving a long distance, with no guarantee that the information would be readily available. For every outstanding librarian or archivist I have dealt with, there have been just as many, not ready to be bothered by Joe Citizen looking for some musty records.

New glass collectors have had a particularly hard time recently, with the most important hobby reference books out of print. It is thus quite the accomplishment that the NIA has begun to acquire the copyrights to the most significant hobby publications that have been prepared to date. The posting of these books to the NIA website, the MacDougal books, in particular, will provide an outstanding reference for all collectors. The MacDougal books being out of print have made it difficult for new collectors to round out their collecting knowledge. I have seen used copies of the books sell for significantly more than their original prices at shows. Another important guide, by Jack Tod, Electrical Porcelain, is available as a pdf on Elton Gish's website. This is one of the lesser known resources that has a wealth of information including the attribution of trade names of low voltage porcelain insulators. This little respected area of the hobby had a significant impact on the early use of electricity in the US, and was a major contributor to the local economies where electrical porcelain was made. Even today, porcelain is still frequently used in low voltage devices that run hot, plastics just do not cut it.

There has always been a fair amount of discussion as to what dues levels should look like for NIA members. I can honestly say that these initiatives make NIA membership an outstanding value. If one looks at their membership as a long term investment in the health of collecting, it looks to be down right cheap! There is still a fairly large hole in the NIA archives; what is missing, are first person accounts of early activities of collectors. With each edition of Crown Jewels and Drip Points, one notes the passing of early collectors, whose knowledge has passed with them. We all know that much of this information has not entirely been lost, many great stories had been passed on by these collectors to others before their passing. So, if you were involved in the early days of collecting, have heard unrecorded stories of those now deceased collectors, or have anything to tell, write it down. Let us all see it. Don't be afraid of your ability to write, there are plenty of editors available to polish your accounts.

I expect to see all of you a show very soon!!

Ethics Chair | Dave Wiecek

I had limited options as to how I could grow my collection in the early 1980s which is when I started collecting. I used to race through sales ads in Crown Jewels the day it arrived and wait until after 5:00 PM (because the calling rates were cheaper!) and hope the phone line on the other end wasn't busy already to stake my claims. It was almost always a disappointment to hear 'I'm sorry Dave but I sold that one already'. There were two-three shows a year within a reasonable driving distance that I would attend. It seemed no matter how early I arrived, there were always collectors who got there even earlier.

I saw the rise of EBAY in the late 1990s as a game changer. I was basically able to now search and shop for insulators 24 hours a day, seven days a week 365 days a year. I didn't and don't ACTUALLY do that but with the convenience of a computer, it's certainly possible to. Auctions have certainly just about become 'the' way for selling. They create excitement, interest and a sense of urgency. The last minute countdown can be as exciting as watching the ball drop on New Year's Eve.

The days of hitting local flea markets, garage sales and antique shops have since faded for me. I miss those more frequent opportunities to hold a piece in hand to see exactly what I was buying. There were no surprises and there was always the opportunity to negotiate the price down when buying in person.

When you are participating in an auction, you are in control of bidding the price up. You may be surprised what other competitors were willing pay when the gavel finally falls. You might be surprised at post auction fees but the reality is they're known up front, it is just easy to lose sight of them in the excitement of bidding.

Are things any different, better or worse than before? Well it depends on your perspective. You had little more than a CD number, manufacturer's name, a color and condition that was somewhere between VNM – VVVNM – Mint in the 'good old days'. Life was like a box of chocolates because ultimately you never really knew what you were going to get until you opened the box. You had to be fast with Crown Jewels and sales lists because otherwise you missed it! Today you don't necessarily have to be the quickest or earliest, unless of course there is that rare fixed price deal. Today it's more a matter of the one who bids last or bids the most that takes home the prize. There are an overwhelming number of auction opportunities all which seem to offer something that will fill a spot in the collection.

Feedback I occasionally hear in my role as Ethics Advisor is that I paid X for such and such a piece and I am (you fill in the blank) that the seller made no mention of the (you fill in the blank) on the (you know what to do at this point). I'll hear, and even observe on my own, that there was no shortage of clever superlatives to describe the piece. There were no pictures pointing out the negatives or the camera angle coincidentally minimized the damage shown.

Sellers that command the greater interest / and high dollar auctions are the ones that have became the better marketers. My advice is become the better buyer. Look closely at the pictures provided and read the description carefully. Determine a seller's return policy up front. Do not hesitate to ask questions regarding condition and request additional pictures before you've placed your final bid. It takes a little effort but so does the work you do to earn the money you make for life's pleasures. It's a lot easier to determine beforehand if that piece you think you really want is worth that extra sum you are willing to bid than it is negotiating miscommunication and repackaging things up after the deal is done. Remember that as a bidder in an auction that you are in control of what you are willing to pay for a piece.

I encourage you to contact me if you have a personal matter where you believe the NIA Code of Ethics, as stated in the NIA Membership Handbook, was violated. The Code of Ethics provides a guide to the general membership for conducting their collecting and dealing activities honorably, honestly and in a manner which will present a good image of the hobby to the public.

Springfield Community Display 2014

Messages related to attending shows:

- 5. If you plan on buying a lot, make sure your car or truck has room and you take proper packing to protect your purchases, whether buying a collection or attending a show. If there is an auction, such as that at Arlen and Tina's get together, also important to consider.
- 6. If you are in the Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Iowa and adjacent states, don't forget the upcoming Central Regional Show in Lebanon, Indiana and the Columbia City Show (Columbia City is west of Fort Wayne). Contact me if questions.

SECOND REPORTED M-3466 FOUND!

At first glance this may look like a M-3451 but the M-3466 is 1 inch taller. M-3451 is 11.5" tall and the M-3466 is 12.5" tall. Other then that the skirt width is the same. The M-3466 appearers to be a later (slightly thinker) revision to the M-3451. If you own a M-3451 double check the measurements, it may be a M-3466! Thanks to Elton Gish for helping with confirming this. Now on to how this one was found. **- Shaun Kotlarsky**



I found this insulator store in an Olympia, Washington antique mall. I went in on a whim before going to work, and saw this insulator sitting on the floor. I knew it was a Thomas based on the blue jean seam inside the third skirt, but beyond that, I had no clue what it might have been worth. A cracked crown from cement expansion and a small chip on the bottom rear of the second shell made me question the \$60 price tag on it, so I offered \$30, which was accepted. I took the insulator home, and tentatively pegged it as M-3451, and stuck it on my desk.

Fast forward to December when I acquired a gray M-3451 Thomas in trade, and I started noting differences between the two insulators. I shrugged them off, figuring it was just typical variances between insulators. In early February, Shaun contacted me asking for measurements of both insulators, and after some back and forth, it was determined that my brown "M-3451" was actually M-3466, which in turn is a revised and updated M-3451. So now I'm back to looking for a brown M-3451 to pair with my gray one! - Steve Coffman

M-2770 EARLY RFI LOCKE INSULATOR FOUND.



The first reported Locke M-2770 was recently found in an old abandoned substation in Rhode Island. The insulator has an incuse marking of LOCKE / 23524. It was found by John Wilson. I did not hear back with any more details by the deadline time for this report.

While looking up info for this report, I found a photo of a second one that was never reported to Elton Gish. This one was found by Zac Mirecki back in 2006. So we now know there are at least two of these known. The photos on the left show Zacs brown one and Johns reddish brown one.

What makes these different is they are an early attempt for reducing radio interference (RFI). The crown of the insulator is iron.

The list of know styles with this unusual top is as follows: M-2343, M-2639, M-2770, M-2961, M-3245, M-3650, M-4343

There is a wonderful article by Elton Gish in the January 1997 Crown Jewels of the Wire Magazine (http://goo.gl/ee2EY6). It talks about how these insulators came to be. Really good read.

As you can tell by all the articles on porcelain insulator finds, this winter has been a good one for the Porcelain Insulator collector!

Just a "Hemingray Oddity"

Battery Rest Insulator or Hemingray Oddity ... Where do I start?

Let's go back to December 1975 to an article that appeared in *Crown Jewels of the Wire* entitled "Something Different In Hemingray."

This article was written by Sandra and Glenn Drummond of Alabama. If you have not read this article, it is certainly worth finding an old copy and reading it. Sandra gets the actual credit for their "Hemingray Oddity FIND," and Sandra described the find by saying ... "You've got to see this to believe it." Sandra had just discovered one of the first Hemingray oddities, if not the first one.

We can now fast-forward to October 2013 when I received an email from a very excited Shaun Kotlarsky. He was excited because he had just acquired a piece he had "ALWAYS wanted" ... and it is referred to as a HEMINGRAY Oddity too. Shaun felt that this piece was a NEW Battery Rest - as did many others in the insulator collecting community. They thought this piece should have a CD number assigned to it.

H-U-M ... H-U-M ... Now I am thinking to myself ... "I wonder how many of these things are out there"? Can it be proved that this object really is a Battery Rest Insulator? ... I could NOT find anything that "PROVES" that it is a Battery Rest Insulator... and there must be proof in order to warrant the assignment of a new CD number

I started making some inquires and gathering information to document any information that I could find pertaining to how this object was used.

After conferring with Dario Dimare (now owner of the CD numbering system), it was determined that there just is NOT ENOUGH information at this time to confirm or to deny that this piece was used as a

BATTERY REST INSULATOR. As the November 2013 Mid-Ohio Insulator Show was quickly approaching, it seemed like a good idea to put-out a request on "ICON" (Insulators Collectors on

the Net). We needed to find answers to questions, like how many of these HEMINGRAY items were out there ... either in collections and/or just out-there ... and who owns them. Maybe we should try to get everyone that has one to bring it to the Mid-Ohio show so that we could see them all together in one place for an actual comparison.

Information trickled in for a couple of weeks with some outstanding leads. I was now able to contact the owners of these oddities to see if they were planning to attend the 2013 SPRINGFIELD Show. If they were planning to attend, I asked if they would bring their HEMINGRAY piece(s) with them so that we could measure and photograph them and then compare their oddity beside the others. All of the owners were more than happy to support this effort.

At this point in time, six of these objects have been located and verified and five have been photographed. They are all embossed (F-Skirt) HEMING-RAY, (R-Skirt) PATENT MAY 2 1893 (which just happens to be the patent date for drip points). Four of the five objects examined are very-very similar in dimensions and in color (aqua).

Five of the items measure approximately 6" in diameter and approximately 1 $\frac{7}{8}$ " thick. All have a hole in the base that is 1 inch in diameter and about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch





deep. All five have drip points like the ones found on some of the CD-257s, very big and sharp. The base extends about a ¹/₄ inch below the drip points and the top on all examples show none to various stages of very slight wear.

One of the five examples stood out more than the others because it had a thickness of three inches and

the hole in the base was one inch in diameter, and $\frac{3}{4}$ inch deep, and the color was a dark aqua. Surprisingly, this example has what I will call a four inch diameter "extended" base and is indented on the top $\frac{3}{8}$ inch.

One unique feature of the HEMINGRAY object in Rick Soller's collection is the embossing which is Embossed (Front) HEMINGRYY (Rear) PATENTT MAYY2218833 "HEMINGRAY" over "HEMINGRAY" and "PATENT MAY 2 1883" over PATENT MAY 2 1883

Other interesting facts that surfaced during this inquiry are ...

- All of these HEMINGRAY items came from the Mid-West area.
- The HEMINGRAY name reads correctly when the drip points face down.
- They sit on a base ... not the drip points.
- Two sizes are known to exist. Are there other sizes waiting to be discovered?
- With all the research that has been done on HEM-INGRAY, nothing has been brought forward as to documentation on the use of this oddity, i.e., catalogs, journals, advertisements, etc. that would





son (to be scrutinized by Shaun and myself). We really appreciated all their efforts and it was good that the insulator community was able to compare these pieces "all together in ONE location."

Special Thanks go out to ... Dennis and Jeanne Weber, Bill and Jill Meier, Shaun Kotlarsky, Rick Soller, Jim Crandall (sent insulator to the show via Bob Stahr), Sandra Drummond (sent the measurements of her Hemingray Oddity to the show via myself), and last but not least, thanks to Glenn Drummond for his continued support in the research that goes on within the insulator hobby.

This article would not be complete without recognizing, Shaun Kotlarsky, the photographer that gave of his time and talent in taking the pictures for this article. We had made a deal in the beginning ... I was to get the information together for the article and Shaun was to take the photographs. He kept his end of the deal and did a great job. Thanks Shaun.

Gray M-3451 and two Cobalt M-2322s found

I get the majority of my insulators from garage sales, craigslist, auctions or antique stores. Probably much like other collectors. Last year, I joined Facebook, which changed my collecting world. Before that, I had collected on my own, with zero contact with other collectors. In fact, I really had no idea of the CD system, U and M system for porcelain insulators. Joining Facebook put me in contact with other collectors, and exposed me to so much knowledge and experience. Shortly after joining, I started to trade with other Facebook collectors, which allowed me to access harder CD styles than I could get locally.

I generally preferred to collect glass, but in my local area, porcelain is really prevalent over glass. So in a short period of time, I amassed a large porcelain collection. Since I have only been collecting for a few years, I really had no knowledge of the U and M system. two years ago, I had purchased three brown multiparts at a garage sale for \$10, and knowing nothing of them, I just added them to the collection.

Not long after, I noticed a few multiparts listed in an upcoming auction. There were three brown ones, and one gray one. Since I already had some brown ones, I decided to put in a \$40 absentee bid. The day after the auction, I received a call from the auction house telling me I had the winning bid. The winning bid was a whopping \$20, plus \$2.50 fee and tax.

After joining Facebook, I started posting some photos of my collection, and that is when Shaun Kotlarsky gave me the M number for it (M-3451), but I still had no idea of the rarity, or value. I met Steve Coffman through Facebook, and discovered we live maybe 30 minutes apart. He immediately fell in love with it, so I reluctantly decided to trade it to him for glass insulators. He informed me what the value was, and we came to agreeable terms for a trade.

That now brings us to the blue M-2322. I was at a Christmas service at my local church, and I ran into a friend, who's dad owned an antique store. I asked how his business was doing, and if he had any insulators (I hadn't been there in a few years, even though it was only two miles from my home). She said she thought he had quite a few

in, so during a trip into town, shortly after, I decided to stop in and do a quick check. All he had were a bunch of over priced common glass and porcelain. But as I got down to the bottom shelf, tucked in the back, were the two blue porcelain multiparts. I didn't think they were all that old, or rare, but I loved the cobalt blue color, and being a mini multipart, I figured they'd display nicely on my shelving. They were priced \$45 each, or \$90 for the pair. I got him down to \$75, which I felt was still a bit steep, but I had to have them. After I brought them home, I posted them on Facebook, and that is when Shaun asked about them, and identified them for me. Shaun now proudly owns one and the other is in my collection

The **Gray M-3451** is a No Name Thomas with the unmistakably Thomas blue-jean seams. It is one of six confirmed units by Elton Gish.

The **Cobalt M-2322** is an incused with the Lapp insulator logo. There are now five confirmed units by Elton Gish. Note the odd hardware on the bottom. It is for mounting in a substation. There is a patent for this hardware, Patent number <u>1,663,007</u> - March 20, 1928.

International Lineman's Museum Insulator Show

International Lineman's Museum Insulator Show,

April 18-19, 2014

Just a few short months ago, I welcomed many of you to the NIA National Show and Convention in Franklin, Tennessee. While NIA Nationals are large, well-attended events, there is one show that usually tops them in number of sales tables and attendees. Of course I'm speaking of the fabled, long-running Mid-Ohio show in Springfield, Ohio.

I am pleased to announce a brand new insulator show that is a direct result of the excitement generated by the Mid-Ohio extravaganza. The First Annual International Lineman's Museum Show will take place in Shelby, North Carolina, just a little west of Charlotte, on Friday, April 18 and Saturday, April 19, 2014.

Last year Jenna Rawe, Thomas Rawe and Murray Walker, representatives of the International Lineman's Museum and Hall of Fame, set up an informational table display at Mid-Ohio. It was their first time. If you have ever been to a Mid-Ohio show, you remember your first time there and can understand what they experienced.

It is likely a number of you talked to Jenna, Thomas or Murray at that show, and perhaps bought chances on a great display of CD164 Maydwell – 20 milk glass insulators that helped raise funds for the museum. Some of you also donated items to their museum. That is where I first met them and learned a little about their museum. If you didn't have the pleasure of meeting them in Springfield, they were featured prominently in the Mid-Ohio report in the January 2014 Crown Jewels of the Wire Magazine.

Less than two weeks after Springfield, I got a call from Jenna, explaining that they were extremely excited by what they'd seen at Mid-Ohio. They really wanted to host an insulator show "like Mid-Ohio" near the International Lineman's Museum in North Carolina, and they wanted to make it an annual event. When I broke the news about the prospect of an annual show in the southeast at our November Dixie Jewels swap meet, the enthusiasm was unanimous. It was suggested some time in spring would be best. Coincidentally, Jenna and friends planned to visit Chattanooga two days later and they would be staying just a block from my office at the Tennessee Aquarium. Could I meet with them to discuss the possibilities of enlisting the Dixie Jewels Insulator Club to help them put together a brand new show? Would we like to help? The proposed show would be located in our club's "territory" - the southeastern U.S. (North Carolina), and since our club has great connections within the hobby due to our recent hosting of the national NIA event, we had plenty of experience with how an insulator show should be run. Needless to say, Jenna had my full attention, and no arm twisting was necessary.

Jenna explained the museum was already planning an event called the Bikes, Butts and BBQ Fundraiser and Ride, which will incorporate a motorcycle ride and lots of good barbeque. That event will start with a deep rumbling Vroom! Vroom! Murray stated many linemen are bike riders, which was news to me, but the more linemen the merrier. So all you insulator collectors / bike riders / linemen make plans to come on down for the party! For more info on this part of the event, go to <u>linemanmuseumride.org</u>.

Their excitement was contagious! All of them felt their museum and an insulator show was a natural fit, so why not make an insulator show a part of the big event? I had to agree. We settled on the dates of April 18-19, 2014. Note: It is not mandatory that you ride a Harley to the insulator show. However, if you have one and wish to, it should be a fun time! (Are you paying attention, Bear Spitler?) If you ride your "hog" you will need extra saddlebags to pack all those insulators you'll undoubtedly purchase at the show. It should be stressed that non-bike riding insulator collectors – and linemen - are welcome too. Before that meeting was over, we'd already begun working out some of the logistics for the first annual International Lineman's Museum Show. Murray,



a very enthusiastic guy, even volunteered that if we could make this inaugural show happen, he'd cover costs for tables, electricity and rental of the facility at the nearby Cleveland County Fairgrounds. And the show was on!
