The nomination form can be found at www.nia.org/archives/ index.htm. General guidelines for qualifications for each of these awards can be found in the Membership Handbook. When you fill out the form please know that the information you provide is what is used by the Awards & Recognition committee and Board of Directors to determine whether the member truly deserves the award. The information you provide must be sufficient enough to justify the award.

The NIA also recognizes individuals, member or non-member, for induction into the NIA Hall of Fame. These are people that have contributed significantly to the insulator industry or the insulator collecting hobby. To nominate someone for this recognition a biography of the person as it applies to insulators must be submitted. If you have a photo of the person being nominated, particularly deceased nominees, that is very helpful as well.

As you are well aware by now, this year's election of NIA officers includes NIA President, Eastern Region

Vice President, and Secretary. As promised previously, there will be an election this year. Be sure to read the bios of the candidates in this issue of Drip Points. A ballot is included with this issue as well and must be filled out and submitted to the NIA Membership Director no later than May 1st. Normally the ballots are submitted to the NIA Secretary, but since the Secretary is a nominee for President the Membership Director will tally the votes. Only the final results are shared with the candidates. Individual votes are kept confidential.

Donations have fallen off from the highs in 2011 and 2012, but we still received just over \$2,000 in 2015. A very special THANK YOU goes out to each of those that have contributed. Your donations help keep the NIA moving forward doing more and better things. For those that have not yet donated, please consider joining those that do contribute by offering a donation this year.



Since my last report, I've been working on expanding and improving our Google AdWords campaign for people who search online for information on insulators. Here's what's been going on behind the scenes:

- 1. Added additional keywords. As Google learns what people are searching for, they suggest we add additional keywords—terms that I wouldn't necessarily have thought to include. In some cases, these are very specialized searches that people have used, such as "telephone pole insulators" or "glass insulator crafts."
- 2. Removed irrelevant keywords. Of course, with positive keywords also comes negative keywords—that is, keywords we do not want our ads to appear next to, such as "fiberglass insulation" or "conductors".
- 3. Added additional ads. In addition to our standard ad (shown in my last report), I've added a couple of specialized ads for Hemingray and Brookfield insulators. The ads still urge the user to visit www.nia.org, but if they're searching for information on that particular manufacturer, they may be more likely to click on the ad.
- 4. Added URL tracking for each ad. Along with the new ads, Google allows you to add custom attributes that will show up in the URL when the user clicks on the ad. Basically, this allows us to better track which ads people have clicked on to reach <u>www.nia.org</u>.

Here are the total statistics since beginning the ad campaign in August:

- 733,955 impressions (how many people have seen our ads)
- 3,275 clicks (how many people have seen our ads and clicked on them)

In closing, I'll put on my "Drip Points Ad Manager" hat for a bit. As we gear up and look ahead to the spring and summer shows, please consider placing an ad in the upcoming issues of Drip Points! Whether you're hosting a show or just want to get the word out on your specialty, graphical ads are highly visible and all proceeds go straight to the NIA. If you want more information, go to the NIA website, www.nia.org, then go to the NIA Membership Handbook. There are 4 separate tabs regarding shows, General Rules of Conduct at NIA Sponsored Shows, Show Facilities Standards & Procedures, Exhibit & Judging Rules and Administrative Show Rules. There is also a tab on the main web page, "Information for Show Hosts". This information is there for anyone to access. In addition, any Officer of the NIA, Club officers or prior show hosts can answer questions for potential show hosts.

History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 ¼ inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project was continued by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemoratives through 2009 at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(3)c.



my collecting toward West Coast glass... E.C.& M.'s, California's, C.G.I.'s, C.E.W.'s and Cal Elec.'s. Granted, I only have a few of some of these, but they are my current interest.

Related to serving on the Board of Directors, for the past three and one-half years I have served as the NIA Secretary. I have worked very closely with the current President, the 1st Past President, and the Treasurer and therefore have a general understanding of how the NIA works. 

When it comes to color in Threadless CD's the 718's stand out especially the Canadian pieces, ice aqua to deep cobalt,lavenders,cranberry, 7up Green etc.

Names like Saratoga Minnesota, Tillotson Mt. Washington Canadian Banded Base, American Black Glass. Thames Primarily used in the Northeast US and Canada with some also used in northern Minnesota and Wisconsin (I've been told this "Minnesota" style has also turned up in southern Manitoba). A few show up in crazy places like all CD's.

Based on my research and talking to both US and Canadian hunters the earliest seem to have been made around the mid 1850's those used in the Mt Washington line. These, although not confirmed, were likely made at Sandwich Glass. Canadian pieces appear on the telegraph lines around 1858. The last lines in both countries were likely used until the late 1860's.

This Egg style was made in numerous mold styles. The tallest was the Mt Washington and also the heaviest style, designed this way to withstand the brutal weather the mountain is known for including the highest winds ever recorded. The shortest is a stubby based Blackglass style used in the U.S. Northeast; inches separate these two molds. One style that grabs my attention is the Canadian Banded Base; these have been found in very intense colors including Smoky Peach, Light Green, and Lavender.

The Tillotson is probably my favorite; the embossing and colors produced were certainly eye catching and the only known U.S. (Non black glass) Colored glass 718's known (With the exception of the 3 known Mt Washingtons) The holy grail of 718's is the Thames embossed piece made in CT; to date one complete piece is known. A full crown exists as well as a small shard; these were most likely a prototype.

The "Saratoga" style no one can confirm but the rumor is some bottle diggers excavating an old glass house area came across some 718's. A full piece showed up at auction with a sticker inside stating it was dug during a Saratoga bottle dig!!

Upon further investigation, [price guide look up] I realized I had just won a lite electric blue mouse.....for \$14! Rather clean, very little damage, and a glower in the sun.

Folks, I'm here to say, nice stuff really is still out there to be found!

PS, I sold it at the 2015 mid-Ohio show for a wee bit more than \$14, and to a good home....I hope!

"Watcha got?", I asked my son, Mark Reilly, as I continued to metal detect along the banks of the creek that runs along-side of Highland Road in south Baton Rouge, on a muggy day in November of 2015. "Some strange glass relic", Mark replied. I walked over to where he was standing, to check it out. He was cleaning a very-attractive, but very-strangely shaped deep emerald-green colored glass object. I had a fairly good idea that it was some sort of insulator when I examined it, but I had no idea about what, exactly, it might be, until after we got back to the house, and started doing some research.

We got on my computer, and googled up "unusual glass insulators", and about 5 or 6 items down on the google list of articles that popped up, was a link to a page called "Early and Unusual Telegraph Insulators", a site set up by someone named Mike Guthrie. From there, it took only a few moments to see that what Mark had found was called a "Block Glass Insulator", dating from around 1848-1850! To say that we were 'excited', would be an understatement, and the more we researched, the more excited we got.

Mark found a contact for an insulator collector, a man named Michael Doyle who lives in California, and we all started to converse. We sent him a few pictures via the phone, and Michael was also very excited about the find, and he suggested that we join a couple of Facebook groups that specialize in insulator collecting, which we did, so we could share this piece with collectors. During our conversation, he also mentioned something called "The People's Telegraph Line", which ran from Louisville, Kentucky to New Orleans, Louisiana.

I found a few bits of information regarding that line, but at first, I didn't think it was relative to our find, because what I found said that it ran through Jackson, Mississippi, and continued to New Orleans, meaning that Baton Rouge was probably not in its path...but then I found a map, and sure enough, The People's Telegraph Line did a dog-leg out of Jackson, Mis-

sissippi, and came through Baton Rouge, and from here, went on to New Orleans. Bingo! I was now convinced that Mark's insulator came from The People's Telegraph Line, which was built around 1850.

Fast forward to 2 weeks later, December, 2015... we had a couple of hard rains since our last relic hunt, so I headed back over to our spot, this time with a friend of ours named Anna Byars, who was just learning how to metal detect. I knew there was a good chance that she could find a couple of Civil War bullets here, because we have been finding them here for over 25 years, since I first discovered and hunted this site, which is only a few hundred yards from my house. As Anna was detecting, I strolled a few yards downstream to check some eroded areas... and there, rinsed-out on the side of the creek, was another Block Insulator! I knew exactly what it was this time, because it had the same basic shape as Marks find, except instead of being made of glass, this one was ceramic. I was shaking with excitement, but took a few photos of the ceramic block, still sitting where it was found, and then I called Mark to share my excitement, right from the creek!

One interesting (and ironic) bit of trivia that we found out about The People's Telegraph Line was that the section that ran through Baton Rouge was called the "O'Reilly Line", which was just fine with these 2 {lucky} Reilly boys. It was obviously meant to be.

So there you have it...2 Block Insulator variants to be added to the historical record of these fine pieces of Americana, one a Block Glass, and one a Ceramic Block. As far as I have been able to find out, these are the first 2 of either style to be found in Baton Rouge, and perhaps, to have ever been found in Louisiana. For a couple of history lovers, it doesn't get much better than that.



CD 134 Pennycuick Find



I started digging the Lyndeboro glass factory in 2003 knowing nothing about Insulators; I've been a bottle digger/collector since 10 years old. The first day digging the site I started finding insulator shards with embossing on the base (American Insulator Co. NY) so decided to start researching insulators, not realizing I

would catch the "Bug"! I became fast friends with a handful of collectors who taught me everything I needed to know about the pieces I was digging up. I spent every spare moment trying to get a whole example of every different insulator CD I dug up.

Shards of the unembossed CD 134s. Pennucuick threads were coming out of the ground too so once I learned about them I started to realize how rare they are. My friend David Whitten emailed me one day saying he found me an example at a show down South and mailed it to me. Turns out it was a CD 134 Pennycuick but in a nice green color! I finally picked up a nice aqua one to go with it a few years later and also dug into a pile of rejects all twisted up and thrown away at the site. (see picture). A while later I dug shards of a light amber one too and had heard of an example but of course had no chance of finding one to buy.

Fast forward a few years and I dig this big chunk of red amber insulator. My friend said it was unlisted so I put it on Facebook—sure enough it was. I wish it was whole but am glad to have this much of one on my shelf. In the right light you can't tell it has a big chunk out of the side!




