It is obliviously a Hemingray made insulator. It is possible that it was made without the threading mandrel so that's why it is threadless but that doesn't explain why it is an odd color for one of these or that it just is marked STANDARD (unlike any other 134 they made)

There is a great deal of activity before and during the National. The annual Board of Directors' meeting will be on Thursday, July 20. The Membership meeting will be held Friday afternoon, July 21, immediately following the closing of the Show Hall. The Awards Banquet will be on Saturday evening July 22, and the non-denominational devotional will be held on Sunday morning July 23, prior to the opening of the Show Hall.

Since the last edition of Drip Points there have been a number of topics developing that you may be interested in. First, as most of you are aware we have held an election to approve two positons on the Board of Directors. Bill Rohde was approved by the membership to continue as our Treasurer. Bill has proven himself to be an excellent keeper of our financial records and a true servant to the hobby. Additionally, Michael Doyle has been elected to serve a three year term as our new Western Region Vice President. Michael is well known and respected in the hobby and will make a great addition to the Board of Directors. Michael is replacing Ron Yuhas in the Western VP position. And, while speaking of Ron, I would be remiss if I didn't express my appreciation to him for his

dependable service to the Board and the Membership. Thank you Ron, you are very much appreciated!

Next I would like to share with you some of the activities that involve our webmaster, Bob Berry. In February the Board of Directors revised the Membership Handbook. Bob has advised me that the current edition of the Membership Handbook is available as a single PDF on the NIA website. If you desire, you can go to the website and print the Membership Handbook in its entirety. And while discussing the Handbook, I would like to say thank you to our Rules and Procedures Advisor, Mike Funderburk. Mike was very involved with all of the updates to the Handbook. Without his help we wouldn't have been able to provide a good up to date product. Thanks Mike and Bob.

When talking to Bob he also advised me that very soon we will have an addition to the website concerning Radio Strains. We have received permission to create PDFs of all of the "Old Familiar Strains" publications and make them available to you. I don't have a date for that project to be completed by Bob; however, he did say it would be soon.

The next topic of interest is one that has been a long time coming and will take some time to complete. Let me explain. Recently the Board of Directors approved a recommendation to have the National Insulator Association name and Logo registered. Through the assistance of the NIA's attorney we were referred to a Trademark and Registration attorney. After a great deal of preliminary work we have secured the services of the Trademark attorney and the process of Registration has begun. Without going into a great deal of detail let me just say it is very involved and requires a significant amount of time. Per the attorney, the minimum amount of time for the government to approve your request is approximately six months. However, in some instances it takes up to eighteen

months. Obviously we will have to wait and see how our request is treated. I will keep you informed as additional details become available.

Finally, it gives me great pleasure to announce the 2017-2018 Scholarship recipients. They are Andrew Hedges and Trevor Dean. Andrew is the son of Chris and Marilyn Hedges. In the fall Andrew will begin classes at the University of Missouri and desires to become a Sports Medicine Physician. Trevor is the grandson of Hal and Betty Dean. Treavor is a senior at Ohio State University and is majoring in Electrical and Computer Engineering. On behalf of the NIA I would like to express our Congratulations to both Andrew and Trevor, and their respective families.

Hosting a Local Show


Insulator shows and swap meets are the lifeline of the hobby here in the northeast. The Yankee Polecat Club, Western Reserve Insulator Club, Chesapeake Bay Insulator Club, Dixie Jewels Insulator Club, Twin Tier and Central Florida Insulator Club are responsible for multiple local shows each year. Insulator collectors from Maine to Florida and Virginia to Tennessee gather to see what unique insulators folks find in their neck of the woods. With good advertising, new collectors are drawn to the hobby and inactive collectors rekindle the desire to unpack decades-buried collections of mud and porcelain.

On Saturday, March 10th 2018, the Chesapeake Bay Insulator Club will host their 30th Annual Insulator Show and Sale. Once known as the "Maryland Line" show, this annual event is held on Saturday, the second weekend of March each year in conjunction with the Baltimore Bottle Show held the day after on Sunday. Starting in Baltimore, the CBIC has held the show in Hereford, Maryland; Maryland Line, Maryland; Shrewsbury, Pennsylvania; and in 2018 New Oxford, Pennsylvania. Renovation of the Shrewsbury Fire Hall, forced a change of venue bringing up all the issues involved in setting up a new show. I thought it might be helpful to share the process with the larger audience in the event that someone is thinking about starting up an annual or one-time event.

Timing. It is important to check the schedule of events on ICON, and coordinate with other clubs in your area before selecting a date. It is also important to look at holiday periods, school schedules, and weather conditions. CBIC hosts their show in March (making it one of the earliest shows in the Northeast) on the same weekend as the Annual Baltimore Bottle Show – allowing dealers the possibility of a double venue weekend.

Location. The CBIC show is held close to the geographic center of collectors in the northeast (though

it has gradually moved further North over the last 30 years). Road networks and proximity to air travel are also important for maximum participation. It also helps to have items or locations of interest in proximity to the show for those insulator widows and widowers who may want to do something else. New Oxford, PA is close to the Gettysburg Battlefield, Outlet Malls and numerous antique shops and interesting boutiques.



Facility. While all of us are used to the large venues for a National Convention, the average club or sponsor lacks the time and funding to put on a local show on the grand scale. The CBIC has always operated with local fire halls for the annual Maryland Line Show. In the Northeast, many small towns have local fire halls for their volunteer fire companies. These halls serve the dual purpose for fire department activities and as a revenue generating facility for the local departments. In our area, rental rates are very reasonable, and the halls usually come with an ample supply of tables and chairs for use in the show. Additionally, fire halls usually follow public accessibility regulations – guaranteeing access to our guests and dealers "rolling stock" on hand trollies. Lighting, electrical outlets, restrooms, and food preparation areas are also desirable.



Advertising. You have to get the word out if you want to maximize participation. The CBIC used Crown Jewels, Drip Points, ICON Show Calendar, and ICON postings to attract collectors. We do a mailing to previous show attendees, and distribute flyers to local antique malls to attract those who aren't part of the hobby. Finally, getting the local media, print, internet, and TV involved can boost your attendance. In addition to the wide variety of insulators brought by our dealers, there are always

walk-ins from non-collectors that add buzz to the show. In 2016 we had a Red-Flashed Pyrex CD 235 show up from someone associated with the Corning Glass Works!

Displays. It's always a great idea to set aside space for displays. It provides an opportunity for collectors to showcase their personal passion while educating show attendees on the hobby. Providing awards for

displays is another great way to build enthusiasm and get folks to box up something special for the show.



Food! As anyone who looks at the photo gallery on ICON knows, food and insulators always go together! For a show, you need to plan on donuts and coffee for set-up, and lunch for show patrons. We've always used the Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary, further enhancing the club's relationship with the hall. For New Oxford we'll be using a caterer from the Hall this year since they don't have an auxiliary, and we can't get Bill Rhode to come east with his BBQ Pit. It goes without saying that you need to allocate tables, chairs, trashcans, and table cloths to this endeavor.

Security. Finally, you should plan for security (club members with vests) to walk the hall during setup, show, and teardown. This helps keep order and is welcomed by dealers and patrons alike.



Final thoughts... With a little pre-planning, and a couple of willing helpers, you can put on your own local show. Looking forward to seeing all of you at the National (and any number of local shows between now and March 10, 2018)!







Membership is up nearly 200 from the last Drip Points, and we are getting close to the total from last year. Anyone receiving this should already be an NIA member for the year, but if you happen to know anyone who is not an NIA member and is planning on going to the National in Colorado Springs, CO -- please remind them to join now! The cutoff date for joining the NIA prior to the National is going to be June 18, 2017. That's a rather unusual length of time before the show, but necessary due to my circumstances. I am not, unfortunately, going to be able to make the National show this year. And I'm not going to be able to update the NIA membership information for about a month before the show. What that means is that if your renewal gets to me after June 18, I won't be able to get you added to the list of members, used at the door to verify your membership on NIA Day. Which in turn means that you would have to pay (again) at the door to become a member. We certainly don't intend to charge you twice -- if that happens, we will credit your extra payment to your 2018 membership. It would be far better, though, if we don't run into that situation. So don't wait -- be sure to renew your membership early!

The show season is in full swing. I made it to the CBIC show in Shrewsbury, PA; the YPCIC show in Enfield, CT; the WRIC show at it's new location in West Leechburg, PA; and the GVBCA bottle show in Rochester, NY. I greatly enjoyed the displays at the YPCIC show -- Ken Willick's display of Fred Locke suspensions, and the combined display of Lyndeboro glass were both fantastic to get to see. The West Leechburg show was a new location for what used to be the Natrona Heights show, and I think there was general agreement that this was a definite success. It certainly was for me -- not only did I get to enjoy the show, but I also got to see two different collections. Shows are great, but it's extra special to get to see someone's collection. I always come away with a new appreciation for something different, and this was no exception. Believe it or not, but my favorite things to see were a Continental Rubber Works and an H. K. Porter! The tracks that I grew up walking had most of the different rubber ponies by the score, but this one was a shape I had never seen before. And the H. K. Porter? Not only did it have the rare small-size pinhole, but it was also a light purple color! And no, before you ask, it wasn't stained. It really was the tint of the plastic itself. You learn something new every day!

Next up are the Twin Tier Insulator Club show in Corning, NY; Claude Wambold's swap meet in Perkiomenville, PA; and the ICA Expo in Washington, PA. What's the Twin Tier Insulator Club, you may ask? This is a new club that is in the process of forming, and the first show is being held May 13th at the Gang Mills, NY fire department. Support the hobby by supporting your local clubs -- get to a show and enjoy!

Next up -- some more fun with numbers. How do you pay for your membership? For 2017 so far, we have

A Quick History of Insulator Color in References

Many collectors feel that color is king in the insulator world yet there was not always color in our insulator references. This created many arguments about color. What follows is a quick history of attempts to add better color to references to end those debates.

The earliest attempt to provide a guide that collectors could use to identify the color of their insulators was published by Bob Alexender around 1976. The Standard Color Guide for Insulators was four pages of labeled plastic strips in various colors that could be used for comparison purposes. The guide cost \$5 for Bob's attempt to "list every known color that exists in insulators today." Unique colors included carnival glass, jade milk glass, and pink milk glass.

In 1991, Mark Lauckner followed up with a similar method called Spec-Tru. This came with a booklet titled Spec-Tru A Standard Reference for Transparent Glass Instructions. There are several versions of the reference. I have seen version 4.01 copyrighted by Mark and version 4.3 with 2000 and 2001 copyright dates by Ernie Carlson.

Early price guides did not have color pictures but this changed after a few editions of the McDougald Price Guide. The 2007 edition of the price guide, has 4 pages of labeled pictures in the back. The McDougalds also included 7 pages of color pictures in their 1990 book Insulators: A History and Guide to North American Glass Pintype Insulators.

Finally, a full-color book was printed in 2000 by Mike Bruner containing 224 pages of photographs and information. Titled The Definitive Guide to Colorful Insulators, many colors are featured but a collector has to search through the book to find an insulator in that color.

There are other books showing insulator colors, the Crown Jewels of the Wire magazine continues to publish in color, and color pictures can be found online. Despite all these resources, color debates still occur with disputants pointing out that how one sees colors depends on lighting, individual abilities to see certain colors, the psychology of color perception, whether a person is buying or selling, and the density of the glass, among other things.

The Investigated CD 450/e

The Irrational CD 152's

Being bored, and struggling to find more interesting stuff for my porcelain telephone and telegraph collection, and having hit a plateau on knob and tube wiring, I decided it was time to get some shiny pretty glass for the window and fence. Since I'd already been looking for a quality CD 152 to pair with my U-177 (with about two dozen known, I was being picky about finding a nice CD 152 to pair with it, and settled on a McLaughlin 152) I settled on working up a nice lineup of 152's. After all, they are nearly all fairly affordable, there is a decent color range, and enough real variety to amuse me until the mud started rolling in again.

And this, dear reader, is the story of how I picked up the current glass insulator value guide, pulled up the CD 152 listings and started snorting with derision- for there are some listings which defy all logic and simply are incomprehensible after even a small bit of reasoned examination. Others simply demonstrate a strange lack of awareness and all left me scratching my head. Let's take a look.

California Dreamin'

There is only one embossing variant for California 152's, and an awful

lot of color. I've always had a soft spot for California 152's, they were apparently quite the common sight in the Puget

Sound region in the 1960's and prior, with a great many purple ones coming out of this area.

Oh. Wait. That's impossible. I know purple California 152's exist. You probably know they exist. Certainly the person who sold me mine knows they exist.

Somehow they didn't make the cut for the Value Guide. Oversight? That's like missing aqua Hemingray 42's. Maybe spinning them as "lilac" helped sell them back before online photographs were a thing,

or maybe purple 152's just magically recently came into existence around the time the Value Guide author happened to have one for sale. Either way, it's an omission that boggles the mind.

Haphazard Hemingrays

Oh where to begin? Certainly the "H" word is a great way to sell glass. We all know Hemingray specialists, it's almost cliché. (Sorry Shaun!) However, this kind of highly profitable specialty tends to create highly focused listings that highlight certain ahh... profitable variants over others. And invented at least one, probably two out of thin air.

[040] "Aqua with amber swirls.

Sigh. Nothing like the inconsistency of deciding when amber inclusions makes for a special listing and when it doesn't. Maybe this belongs here. Maybe it doesn't. There are many valid arguments about inclusions. But there is a stunning lack of consistency. If we are going to have

this listing, then the NN No. 40's and No. 48's that are a gorgeous light blue aqua full of snow need listings as well. Or they don't. Pick one, but be consistent about how

you list inclusions and swirls. But then again, maybe amber swirl Hemingrays need special attention to justify their price tag. Who knows. Let's have consistency here.

[075] RDP. I laughed. I cried. My cat came over and tried to bury that listing in his litter box. The first thought that popped into my head when I saw this one was the old line by Hitler. "If you tell a lie often enough, it will be believed." Let's look at this one rationally if we can for a moment. Round drip points did not show up until the late 1920's. We



can see the transition in the Hemingray 42's which went from sharp (even absurdly long!) drips to round drips. Prior to that, all drips were sharp. That is simply the way it is. However, from time to time a bit of an underpour or dirty molds or what have you could create something vaguely resembling round drips. I have at this moment a CD 154 "fang drip" in the classic fizzy Hemingray blue that is half sharp, half round drips. Anyone looking at it knows it was an underpour situation. Same with a CD 257 I used to have the same way. And the list goes on and on and on. Any "round drip point" insulator with the May 2nd patent date is simply a sharp drip gone bad. They were never deliberately made as a round drip, and what we have here is simple mechanical error at the factory. Certainly not enough to turn a \$1 insulator into a \$30 insulator. We live in a world full of "fake news" and "alternative truth". We should leave that to politics and not to imaginary round drip points. This is a listing that needs to die.

[085] "Brookfield Style." Just what pray tell is Brookfield style? I'm looking at four different mold styles of Brookfields right now on my shelf. I'm looking at several different Hemingray styles too. Sometimes they overlap each other. The hoopskirts can only be told apart due to color and marking they are so close.

That this is a distinct mold variant cannot be guestioned. That it happens to resemble some insulators made by Brookfield is also true. However, CD 152 was a standardized design, of course insulators made by the two biggest manufacturers will at times resemble each other. We can no more call this mold a "Brookfield style" than we can call it a "Hemingray style." My personal bet is that it represents the first run of CD 152's made most closely to blueprints supplied to both factories. Either way, it is silly to ascribe one style made by two companies to one or the other unless it can be conclusively shown the Brookfield variant came first. Odds are some collector was familiar with that shape from Brookfields first, saw a Hemingray and promptly labeled it "Brookfield style" and in the typical inane and frustrating fashion of insulator hobby folklore, the imaginary truth stuck.

Is it worth the price tag? Maybe. Maybe not. With a romantic spin like that, you can expect the price to go up a bit. The fact that it is probably an early mold and certainly an uncommon variant will make a difference. But let's find a better name for it eh? Maybe it's time to do a survey of all the mold variants of Hemingray 152's and assign them some sort of value. "Mold type 1, 2, etc..." or some such like that. Not as sexy as "Brookfield style" but far more rational.

Writing a value guide is hard. I've done it for glass suspension discs and contributed to the porcelain one. I can only imagine the struggle to keep up one for glass pintypes. However, the same standards and methods that apply to small work apply to big work, and are even more important when a work grows bigger, because inconsistency grows with it. Ignoring a common color in California 152's, inventing round drips where none exist, made up folklore names for


mold styles, and we won't even get into the unlisted colors for Canadian 152's, simply because my box of them hasn't arrived yet. But then again, I'm told noted Canadian collectors can't get their voice heard anyway. Maybe they need a few big shiny catalog auctions with fancy marketing to be noticed eh?

If these flaws are obvious to somebody who most of the time sees glass insulators as a cute trivial thing to put in the garden or toys for the cat to knock down, what deeper flaws must exist? What sort of insidious folklore is pushing listings that don't need to exist, what is ignored because it isn't deemed important (profitable enough?)

to be listed? And more importantly, how much of this whole mess can we trust? I'm growing increasingly skeptical myself. What about you?









Hello fellow hobbyists and welcome collectors of all ages and interests. Here is the latest chapter in the Insulator Collecting Hobby phenomenon called The Rohde Ranch BBQ and Tailgater. History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 ¼ inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project was continued by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemoratives through 2009 at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(3)c.

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
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
