

Recently there have been numerous posts on various social media concerning altered and faked insulators. Additionally, several of the NIA leadership have received private communications concerning this subject. However, prior to this topic arising our Authentication Advisor shared with the Board of Directors that he has been compiling photos of suspected insulators. Additionally, he asked the Board if we could post these pictures on our website. The Board held a conference call several weeks ago and discussed a variety of topics including this issue. As a result, I took an action item to discuss Paul's concept with our NIA Attorney. Without going into all of the details of the call, the Attorney advised us to move forward with this plan. He gave us a few guidelines that we must follow; however, we should be able to accomplish our goal of creating a photo library of those insulators that we suspect have been altered.

There is virtually nothing that can be done to prevent the altering of glass and porcelain as that practice is not illegal. There are literally hundreds of locations across the US, Canada and Mexico that have the capability of radiating glass, and we do not have the ability to stop any of them. However, what we can do is attempt to educate our fellow hobbyist. Therefore, for educational purposes, I have asked our Authentication advisor, Paul Greaves, and our Webmaster, Bob Berry, to work together and create a photo library on our website. They have recently received this request and they are still working on the details; however, as soon as we can we will begin to make these photos available to you so you can better educate yourself of what a suspect insulator looks like.

At the end of the day the NIA can not stop a private practice of something that is not illegal, but we can attempt to better educate our membership. The key here is education. Our hope is that the photo library will help you when you are considering the purchase of an insulator. If you suspect that it is not correct, don't buy it. If people stop buying suspected glass and porcelain, then there is no market for these items. If there isn't a demand for the product, there is no need for the supply. Again, the key to the demise of this issue is EDUCATION.

Finally, you should receive your Drip Points magazine prior to Christmas. My hope is that each of you will reflect on the Blessings that you received this year. There are many things that take a higher priority than collecting. Always try to keep things in perspective and remember the source of every Good Gift.

The November 1st deadline for preliminary drafts of proposals has come and gone and we have some great, competitive, national proposals in the works. Thank you to the Events Advisor and his team for all of their hard work and attention to detail while helping to shape the proposals for all the nationals that they're reviewing.

The recent creation of an altered insulator information page on Facebook has captured my attention. There is an amazing amount of information pouring out of collectors onto that Facebook page. I recommend that everyone make a little time to familiarize themselves with the information that is to be found there. Additionally, the Authentication & Classification team is working with the Board of Directors to bring even more information on fake and altered insulators. This project targets a very exciting and important aspect of the NIA's education outreach and I think it's an important project that is full of potential for collectors across all ranges of hobby experience.

Special Projects is continuing to explore ways to bring you hobby news, education and information through the NIA.ORG website. I am continuing to bring Western Region interests to the big table and I need your help to stay in touch with your hopes and dreams for our great hobby.





Returning from the Springfield show, I found myself taking a "walk along the tracks" of my own insulator journey. For me, the journey started in 1968 – just before man walked on the moon for the first time. My family moved into a home in Sunol, California with a large brick barbeque in the back yard. There was a shelf above the grill, and there were several insulators on it – including a CD 162 Star in aqua. It was my favorite, and now, nearly 50 years later, I am back where I started, collecting Stars again, but first a California memory from the Eastern Region Vice President.

Back in the day, I would sneak out of the house at two o'clock in the morning, put my Dad's 30 foot extension ladder on my Schwinn Stingray seat and handlebars, and walk a mile down to the train tracks to climb poles. Not the brightest move, but very exciting.



Those moonlit treks never produced anything very exciting, just more insulators that I didn't have. They gave me playground stories to keep my friends enthralled, and built up my personal credibility. My parents never found out what I was doing, and would have kept it up were it not for a purple CD 152 California on the top of a four crossarm pole on Foothill Road. Here's a picture of the pole today, minus the

top three crossarms, insulators and wires:



I navigated to the pole under cover of darkness, hauled the extension ladder to position, and climbed to the first metal brace. I then climbed between the wires to the top crossarm, making sure I didn't look down. My nine year old arms weren't long enough to do much more than hug the pole with the left and barely touch the purple hoop skirt with my right. I couldn't get the tie wire off, so I nudged the insulator slowly

around the pin until it was almost off, then I tried to wiggle it out of the tie wire grip. About that time, the California came loose of the pin and launched out of my sweat drenched fingers - straight into the air! The twang and hum of the insulator bouncing in a four foot oscillation above the pole scared the heck out of me. I clung to the pole, in fear of my life. I had visions of the bouncing wires hitting another line and showering Dr. Frankenstein lighting strokes thus ending my young life. This didn't happen, and the wire and insulator came to rest 3 feet above the crossarm forever out of reach. That was my last clandestine mission with an aluminum extension ladder... I visited the pole on that same Stingray with my buddies and the suspended California became the North Star leading to my wild boy reputation with the other 4th Graders.

Throughout my early collecting days in California, Stars remained elusive. I found Hemingray, Brookfield, California, McLaughlin, and Maydewell, but only the random star. I found a CD133 Star and a CD133 No Name No 20, and convinced myself that there had to be a Star No 20 out there somewhere. It was years later when I found out that none had ever been found. Fast forward to today. Stars once again hold thrall with my collector's eyes. Living on

the East Coast, they are plentiful, and I am off to the races. I lack the luck of Fred Collier's East Coast Antique Store bonanzas (CD 127 Paisley):



Nor do I have the time, skill, and patience of Jeff Katchko hunting the old Erie, N.Y. line (CD 731):



So Stars it is! Star insulators are generally inexpensive (by modern standards), well documented and discussed, but they do demonstrate how a small collection can grow to a large one in a short period of time. One might set out to get one of each shape – easy enough: CD 102, CD104, CD106, CD112, CD 113, CD 133, CD 134, CD 145, CD161, CD162, CD 162.1, CD 164, CD 185, CD 200, and CD 260. Of

course there is one CD 126 that showed up at the Yankee Polecat Insulator Club Milford Swap Meet in 2010 – but it is made of unattainium, so write that one off.

You now have a collection of 15 insulators. Then you start noticing that there are variances within the CDs: CD 102 (5 or more styles), CD112 (2 Styles), CD 133 (2 styles), CD 145 (5 styles), CD162 (3 or more styles), CD 164 (2 or more styles), and CD 260 (2 styles). You

are now up to over 30 different insulators, and you notice that three styles have sharp drip points and two have wedge drip points (over 40). You can more than triple that number taking into account embossing: one star, two stars, large stars, small stars – not to mention 360 degrees of star orientations. If you crosswalk all of this with color variations and junk in glass you can easily amass a collection of almost 1000 Stars.

This is how an insulator collection takes shape. You find one at a reasonable price (free); look for the common varieties, notice the variations, seek every embossing, every color, and finally the unusual character pieces. Before you know it, your garage is full, you're driving to Ohio, and asking yourself not only, "How did I get here" but, I wonder what's under that show table?" Is this a great hobby, or what? Here's hoping all of you have Happy Holidays, and may you find an insulator or two under your tree (in your living room as opposed to a hillside).

Epilogue: That Schwinn Stingray sells for over \$2500 today on eBay today... hmmmm













I'm late, I'm late! This time of year marks the start of my busy time as Membership Director. This year, in spite of issues with a different show hall and concerns about the Friday auction, I think it was an exceptionally good show. I had a great time catching up with people and being able to have discussions in person, meeting new folks, and acquiring more than a few baby signals for my collection. My thanks to Curt and Lois (and all their helpers) for their hard work and dedication putting this show on year after year. Every time I get to a show, I realize all over again how much I appreciate all the effort it takes.

It is, unfortunately, the time of year when shows become few and far between. Time for me to start pulling insulators down, counting drip points, and comparing mold characteristics! Taking a closer look gives me a great excuse to dust them all, which my wife certainly appreciates.

- Consider Going Paperless A good percentage of NIA members are already taking advantage of this! Choosing to receive the electronic version of Drip Points rather than a paper copy saves on printing costs and postage, saves paper, and saves space at home! In the third quarter, we had 1,818 people clicking on our ads, and over 388,000 ad impressions. "Glass insulators" continues to be the most searched for term, and 55-64 is the most common age group. It's also interesting to note that mobile and tablet devices have officially taken over as the majority of the devices which are being used to search for these terms.
- FOHBC Ad Trade Lastly, I would like to thank the Federation of Historical Bottle Collectors for agreeing to swap ad space with us! You can see their advertisement on page 32. In turn, an ad for the National Insulator Association will appear in their publication, "Bottles and Extras". We welcome them as a sister hobby. I'm always looking for other sister hobbies and publications that might be interested in participating, so if you have any ideas please let me know!

Andrew Gibson made a surprising finding recently. He found a previously unknown and early insulator price guide book. The find is especially surprising because the guide was published in 1970, giving 47 years for collectors to learn about it, especially those who actively and persistently pursue building a collection of them. Kevin Lawless was the first person I knew that had an extensive collection of these and who produced a list that guided later collectors. This list has been incorporated and updated by Bob Berry on the NIA.org site. I picked up the challenge many years ago and thought I had a near complete collection as well as building the NIA collection to the same level. Now there is one more addition to search for that neither Bob Berry nor I had heard about.

An email from Andrew indicated, "It's just called "Insulators," and is a 10 page, 8.5 x11 price guide from 1970, written by G. F Bouza of Boise, Idaho. It says he intended to update it every 6-8 months, so there may be other versions out there. My copy has a green cover, and is just stapled down the side with 3 staples.

It contains some use of CD numbers, but certainly not on all entries and it has a page of what look to be hand drawn outlines of a bunch of shapes, with their nicknames. One oddity is that the CD number is listed AFTER the embossing and before the color and price. It just looks funny that way!

I looked Bouza up in the NIA records, and there is a Gordon Bouza in Meridian, ID. But he joined in 2003,

was a member for 10 straight years, and hasn't been a member since 2012. I sent him off an email on the off chance it's still a valid one. There is also a question in the Research Division of CJ in 1981, from Gordon F Bouza in Boise."

Besides Andrew's research, I checked <u>Amazon.com</u>, and the Advanced Book Exchange with no luck. An email was posted to ICON asking for a copy for the NIA (and me) and additional information. Let me know if you can help.

At the Mid-Ohio show in Springfield, Ohio held November 3-5, several collectors had new business cards that were added to the business card collection of the NIA. A couple show displays were also added dealing with Square-D insulators and Samuel Oakman's influence on insulators.

As part of my role as the historian, I thought I should step up my game for next year's Mid-Ohio show by offering to organize a combined display of solid pour insulators (excluding private issue and commemorative insulators). If you have one that you would be willing to include in the display or provide information about, please let me know. I would like to get a census of what solid pours exist and how many are out there.




#### U-170 Haystack with odd marking

The highest honor one can receive in the insulator hobby is that of "Lifetime Membership" in the National Insulator Association. According to the NIA Handbook, this award may be bestowed upon "... any member for cumulative meritorious service to the NIA or the insulator collecting hobby."

When the names of recipients are published in the report of the National Show each year, seldom does the record convey the full amount of work over a period of many years that the receiving members have contributed to the hobby. This article is intended to show the kind of effort that our collecting friends make, often times under the radar.

This year's recipients, Bob and Carolyn Berry of Round Rock, Texas, earned their recognition for a body of work in many areas of the hobby over a period of over 39 years!

Bob and Carolyn attended shows together before they were even married. After they started their family, the insulator hobby became a total family affair with their daughter attending her first show at the ripe old age of five months. They attended 24 year nationals as a family with their kids. Bob has attended a total of 28 nationals including the last 25 in a row. They have been NIA members for a combined total of 68 years and counting.

In their 29 years of marriage the Berrys served in a variety of NIA positions for 20 of those 29. Bob was the NIA Research and Education Advisor for 12 years and the NIA webmaster from the beginning in

1998 until now. 19 continuous years. Not only did he create the website, he also designed and built the massive Insulator Identification Galleries on the site. If you haven't visited the Galleries, you have missed out on something special. For those who have ever attempted photo editing, you know the amount of time it

takes to process a single photo to make it suitable for publication. Imagine doing it for most "CD" and "U" numbered insulators, both foreign and domestic! Between the website and Galleries, Bob estimates he has volunteered several thousand hours of his life to this self described "labor of love."

Carolyn has also been very busy during their insulator lives. As chair of the Product Marketing Committee of the NIA from 1998-2011 Carolyn spent over 2,000 hours of her time with the many components of design, production, and delivery of all of the NIA products you find in Drip Points and Crown Jewels. Her work generated over \$34,000 in gross sales for the NIA over those many years. She also was the coordinator for the NIA National Show commemoratives from 2009-17. Spending an additional 1,200 plus hours, she generated gross sales for the NIA of over \$50,000 from eight commemorative issues.

In addition to the "heavy lifting" described above, the Berrys managed to: amass a significant collection; serve in various capacities with the Lone Star Insulator Club; attend a total of 28 Nationals (co-hosting one) and countless local shows; host a show at their home for many years; display at seven national shows; participate in research expeditions; and the list goes on.

For those who don't have much exposure to the service awards given by the NIA, you can see from the example of the Berrys that they are not given lightly and are well deserved. The Berry family has created a lasting legacy in the insulator hobby which will be enjoyed by generations to come. On behalf of the

> entire collecting community, thank you Bob and Carolyn for all you have given so that every collector can enjoy the hobby to the fullest.

**Special Note:** Due to the first pouring missing the chemical Neodymium, we had to repour our chosen color. Thus, there are 2 color offerings this year. In order to get the 2nd color commemorative, "Rocky Rose" the 48th year color "Chameleon" must be purchased. The chemical Neodymium allows the color of the commemorative to change under various light sources.



#### History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the national meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "pilgrim hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 3 ¼ inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the national show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project was continued by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemoratives through 2009 at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(3)c.




