PETER EBY & MICHAEL B. FENNINGER, OF KINZ-ER'S P.O., PENNSYLVANIA. Excerpts from Patent No. 138, 480, May 6, 1873.

The nature of my improvement relates to that class of insulators for telegraph-wires made of glass or its equivalent, in two parts, so constructed, as to lock firmly and to secure the wires against becoming rusted from water lodging, or to become disengaged from the insulator when broken at intermediate points, said portions being inserted through an orifice in the arm-bearing or support for the insulator made horizontally.

The accompanying drawing shows the construction of the separate pieces and their combination with the wire inserted and kinked on each side.


The portion A has a flanged head or collar, a, on one end, and a raised lug a', on the other end... The ends are rounded out from the wire groove to form a sloped drain, while the collar and partial collar b b' on the portion B form a projecting shelter over the beveled ends on the portion A when in proper position in the arm.

The wooden arm H has an auger-hole of the desired diameter near the upper edge to receive the insulator horizontally.

In order to prevent the wire from being withdrawn when broken between intermediate points, we make a short kink on each side of the insulator, allowing sufficient play for ordinary contraction or expansion.

LOUIS A. CAUVET, OF NEW YORK, NY Excerpts from Patent No. 48,906, July 25, 1865.

Be it known that I, Louis A. Cauvet, of No.75 1/2 New street, in the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Insulators for Telegraphic Wires.

This invention consists in constructing glass insulators for use on telegraph-poles in such a way as that they can be secured to the poles in any position without the use of metallic or other attachments.

B is a wooden rod, upon each end of which a screwthread c, is cut.

The insulator J is made of glass molded to any suitable shape as to its exterior, but having always one or more grooves, f, formed on its circumference, to enable a conducting-wire to be wound about it.

I propose also to form the base g of a convex shape, instead of partly flat or palne and partly sunken. When it is made convex it will shed rain with more facility, expecially when my insulators are fixed vertecally, as shown in Fig. 2, the lower ones having their bases turned upward.


My insulator is made of glass, molded according to the art of the glass-molder, with a hole partly through it in the line of its axis, a screw-thread being formed in said hole in the process of molding.

My improvement in insulators enables me to affix and secure them upon bars and pins with the use of their screw-threads alone, by means of which they are sustained upon telegraph-poles by simply screwing them upon such bars or pins.



This one came from Washington State, and the difference between it and the other all porcelain (pg. 83, my book) is obvious. I have seen also another all porcelain that is a duplicate of the glass LOCKE 25. (No trough)

Abbreviations: SCA-Sun colored amethyst, SCAM-Sun Colored Amber, SDP or RDP-sharp or round drips, NIS-no inner skirt, MLOD-mold line over dome, BM-bottom mold, SB-smooth base." Now to describe an insulator which will use everything talked about.




Here is a reprint of the Richmond, VA., train yard taken during the Civil War.

JUDGING RULES

Fifth National Show

Hershey, PA

In an effort to encourage more displays and to tell each collector exactly how their display will be judged, at the 5th National, I am publishing this set of rules. This will allow every collector to build a display which will have a good chance of winning.

There will be 6 judges, divided into 2 groups. One group will add points to a display, while the other group will detract points from a display.

All judges will act independent of each other. Judging will take place between 9:00AM and 5PM on Saturday. Points will be computed and the winners announced during the banquet (7:00PM Sat.) During this time several "Honorable Mention" ribbons will also be awarded.

1. Each entree must select ahead of time what catagory he want to enter his display under.

2. Each display must be "titled" but not with the owner name.

3. Damaged or repaired display pieces must be identified for the judges prior to judging (this will cause you to lose 10 points.) If not identified or concealed and a judge catches it you will lose 25 points.

4. A perfect or nearly perfect display will be awarded 10 points.

5. You will gain, or lose 10 points depending on whether you keep your display within your chosen catagory.

6. 10 positive points awarded if all pieces are within full view.

7. 10 positive points awarded for displays containing

items other than insulators but still related to insulators.

8. 10 positive points will be awarded if all insulators are clean.

9. 5 positive points will be awarded if a display is eye appealing.

10. All display pieces must be authentic. Any display containing a reproduction, limited edition or fake insulator is ineligible for judging and cannot display.

While you are setting up your display at the show, I will approach you with a form to fill out listing: (1) Title of display (2) Catagory that you wish to enter your display (3) State whether you have any damaged or repaired pieces.


DO NOT SIGN IT. Give it back to me so I can use it to make up the judging sheets.

The Fifth National Show is endorsed by the N. I. A. The rules I have set up for judging are not N. I. A. rules. They have been created by me, with the help of Bob Wilson, E. I. C. Vice-President, PA and N. I. A. member and Jim Garrity, E. I. C. member, N. I. A. member and editor of CROSS ARMS, with the idea in mind to make displaying at the National a pleasure.

By the time the 6th National comes along the N. I. A. will have had time to formally adopt a set of judging and display rules. For the Fifth National only, I will use the rules set forth in this article. This subject to minor changes.






Above are 2 maps showing the location of the Fifth National Show. No. 1 shows the Route Numbers, while No. 2 shows the location of some of the area attractions.

The Mayer & Englund Company-address 10 South 10th Street, Philadelphia, PA. President, Charles Mayer and Secy.-Treas., Englund.

M & E Co. was a supply house geared to furnishing material for electric railroad and trolley construction. Most of their electrical wire connectors and trolley frogs were manufactured by the G. E. Co.

They featured a line of porcelain insulators (manufacturer unknown) and also a line of cast iron and composition insulators (manufacturer unknown.)

Their glass insulator line was probably manufactured by Knowles (pieces have been found embossed (F) Knowles Cable Insulator (B) The M & E CO. Phila.)

The following pages show excerpts from the M & E Catalog # 2, 1901. We have eliminated some unnecessary information, such as cost per piece, code word to use when ordering and the M & E Catalog No. If anyone would want this specific information feel free to contact us at CROSS ARMS.

Mayer & Englund supplied material for several trolley lines in the Philadelphia area. The insulators ran the gauntlet from Hemi 60 & 62's, Brookfield signals, a few Manhattans, O. B. 's, WT #llps and Hemi 19's. Of course there were also M & E's. Even though their catalog shows all the pieces being embossed, so far the only pieces turning up as embossed are several of the glass cable styles and a composition style (see CROSS ARMS, April '72 pg. 6.)




















Jerry Wagner of Bergenfield, NJ has been elected the Vice-President of the New Jersey Chapter of the Eastern Insulator Club.





a complete set of Chambers lightning rod insulators from Larry Veneziano of Rivergrove, IL. T-H CO. BACKGROUND HISTORY

This information taken from a 1890 catalog on exhibit at the Eleutherian Mills Historical Library.

Prior to 1883, Professors Elihu Thomson and E.J. Houston got together and formed the T-H Co. Professors Thomson and Houston were inventors and designers of electrical motors, generators and any auxillery equipment concerning motors and generators.

Circa 1880, direct current was the major source of power used in America. It was used for the newly designed arc lights, motors, and anywhere it could be adapted. The T-H Co. was in on the ground floor of D. C. electricity development. They did everything for a town from building the generator station to hanging the arc lights. They had a factory in Lynn, Mass (established 1882), a factory in New Britain, Conn. (established 1886) and another factory in Fremont, Ohio. The Fremont plant only manufactured "carbon products" used by T-H Co. such as carbon motor brushes and carbon electrodes (used in arc lights.)

An exhibition in Chicago (1883) featured the "First Railcar Powered by Electricity", invented by Mr. Charles J. Van Depoele. A Toronto exhibition of 1884 also featured Depoele's invention.

In 1888, the T-H Co. hired Van Depoele with the combined ideas and talents of Thomson, Houston and Van Depoele the T-H Co. was in the electric trolley business.

As of 1890, T-H Co had 8 offices. Main office was at 620 Alantic Ave, Boston, Mass.; branch office in Chicago, Ill; New York, N. Y.; Alanta, Ga.; San Francisco, Cal., Kansas City, Mo., St. Paul, Cincinati, Ohio; Phila., Pa., and Washington, D. C. T-H Co was awarded several exhibition medals in San Francisco, 1884, and London, Aug. 11, 1885

In 1893, the T-H Co merged with the Edison General Electric Co. and formed the present day company, General Electric.

T-H dealt with D.C. power and distribution and associated machinery around 1890. The entire nation was converting from D.C. to A.C. and the T-H Co prospered. T-H Co was not connected with the telegraph. The insulators we know of as embossed and unembossed T-H Co. were used on street lights, trolley lines, service feeders, etc., but not on telegraph or telephone.

Pin hole is open all the the way thru. I would say it is M condition.




