"Another Ohio Valley Glass Co. appeared in 1905 at Pleasant City, Ohio, near Cambridge. It was apparently a renaming of the Pleasant City Glass Works whose listing in the 1904 Directory stated that it had one continous tank with 5 rings, made insulators & battery jars and had as officers, B. L. Kilgour, pres., P. S. Keichly, secretary & treasurer and Wm. Cleis, manager. The 1905 Directory listed OVG CO as having 5 rings on one tank making insulators and battery jars and with officers, H. E. Cobb, president, H. E. Stephensen, vice president, W. B. Stein, secretary and J. B. Sullivan, treasurer and manager. Neither were listed again.

AMERICAN TELEGRAPHY

A reprint article from the book <u>AMERICAN TELE-</u> <u>GRAPHY</u> by William Mauer, Jr., published by J. H. Bunnell & Co., New York, 1892.

INSULATORS. --Some of the essentials of an insulator, for aerial purposes, are that it shall have high electrical resistance, shall possess strength, permit a good hold upon the wire, shed rain freely, have no dark recesses for the accommodation of insects, and be reasonably cheap.


As these requirements are found but rarely in any one substance it is evident that the available materials are limited. For instance, iron would possess strength, but it is not an insulator, and glass possesses non-conducting qualities but is more or less brittle. A combination of both might possess strength and high insulation but would be opaque.

In Europe, porcelain and earthenware insulators are very extensively employed and are highly esteemed. They have also been used in America, but at the present time and for many years past a glass insulator is and has been practically the only one employed in the telegraph, and, it may be added, the telephone service.

It is claimed for porcelain and earthenware insulators of higher grades that, besides possessing, normally, higher electrical resistance than glass insulators, in moist and damp weather, they do not accumulate, on their surfaces, moisture, to the same extent as glass and, therefore, that they are a much superior insulator than glass at such times. On the other hand it has been observed, in this country, that vermin

are more apt to build in the recessess of the porcelain insulators than in the glass, (presumably owing to the greater opacity of the former). and, also, that, apparently, soot adheres more firmly to the former than to the latter. both of which, it is well known, tend to reduce the insulation, especially in wet weather. Doubt-



GLASS INSULATOR.


less, however, the greater cost of porcelain and earthenware, especially the former, as compared with glass, has been an important factor in preventing a more general use of those materials as insulators, in this country.

Experience has, however, also shown, in this country, that given a wire free from foliage, kite tails, etc., the occasions are rare when a line well insulated with glass will not work fairly successfully in ordinary wet weather.

On repeated occasions the writer has found that certain long overhead circuits which, within city limits, were practically useless, owing to low insulation, when tested outside of those limits were found to be in good working order.

The styles of the "American" glass insulator vary in numerous ways, namely: as to its shape, the location and depth of the groove for the wire, the depth of the hole for the pin, the number and depth of the screw-threads within the insulator for the pin, etc., but its general appearance will be seen in Fig.'s 409, 410. The latter is known as the "B and O" insulator; its weight is about 22 ounces.

A smaller insulator of the same general form, termed a "pony" insulator, Fig. 411, is much used for No. 12 B. W. G. hard-drawn copper wire.




B. AND O. INSULATOR.

The location and depth of the wire groove requires consideration. If it is too shallow, the "tie" wire slips out easily. If too deep, the strain of the tie wire is apt to crunch the glass, thereby imparing the insulation; in fact, introducing a source of defective insulation, often very difficult to discover. The lower the groove on the insulator the less is the strain on the supporting pin, but at that point the glass is thinnest.

The bell-shaped form gives a good water shed and tends to throw the "drip" away from the pin.


In order, further to keep the pin dry, some insulators are made with a double "petticoat," as seen in Fig. 412, in which a section of the lower part of



W. U. INSULATOR.


the insulator is removed to show the double petticoat. This insulator is known as the W.U. "double petti-

coat" insulator. In Fig. 413 is shown a form of insulator designed to still further increase the insulation of the insulator by decreasing its surface where it would come in contact with the line wire and "tie" wire. It also facilitates the cutting of the tie wire; that is, the piece of wire which ties the line wire to the insulator. Economy is also aimed at by reducing the weight of the glass without materially decreasing its strength. The manner in which both of these results are designed to be effected will be obvious on examining the illustration. In Fig. 410 the tie wire is passed around the upper groove. The bulge above the upper groove is designed to throw off the water from the wire and pin. The object sought in running the pin so far up in the bell is that, in case of the breaking of the glass, the tie wire may still be held by the pin upon the cross arm.




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A rubber insulator in which an iron hook is inserted, as shown in Fig. 414, is used extensively on the underside of cross-arms, in cities, especially on house-top fixtures.



TREE INSULATOR. -- When from any cause whatever it is found impracticable to pass beneath or to surmount a grove of trees so as to avoid the foliage, it will be necessary to use insulated wire through that portion of the route. FIG. 415.



In isolated cases, where the owner will not permit the placing of insulators on trees to ward off the wires from the trunk or boughs, a tube of vulcanized rubber placed over the wire has been found of much utility.

An insulator designed for attachment to trees is shown in Fig. 415. It may be fixed at any desired angle. The manner of its application will be obvious by a glance at the drawing.

INSULATORS By Doc

Edward Counsellor who worked for many years in the Whitall-Tatum plant making insulators later worked for Amstrong, He winters in Florida, a real Snowbird from New Jersey.

Ed writes that the insulators made by Whitall-Tatum were made from standard bottle glass. One of the large tank or glass furnaces would have five machines making bottles and one machine making insulators. This would be our clear, so-called flint glass. This is a soda lime glass of a soft nature as compared to the harder Pyrex or bora-silica glass. Corning Glass Company had a machine very similar to this which I have seen running which made Pyrex insulators, sold mainly for electrical transmission. Whitall-Tstum produced commercially for the Western Electric Company who supplied the telephone companies. They were our biggest customers. We tried unsuccessfully to get the electric companies to use our insulators and that was one of the reasons the saddle top was made. The colors were made for transposition to avoid electric wire noise from getting into the telephone lines. The No Drip was a patent of Hemingray made by Owen-Illinois. We made amber glass using beer bottles and occasionally the green of soda bottles. We never rate a red tank or a color tank. I have never seen and don't know how a Whitall-Tatum red insulator could have been made unless it was sprayed with ceramic paint afterwards,

The rich ruby color; you are correct would have been colored by gold (very expensive) used only on high class, high cost table ware, definitely not Whitall-Tatum, Different color sprays on the outside of insulators were made in an attempt to improve its strength by setting a different co-efficient of expansion which would inprove surface stress. One of those was the ferrous Iron oxide and hydrochloric acid mixture sprayed on them while the insulator was hot.




Dear Jeff:









It has been brought to my attention that a certain amount of confusion exists concerning the display categories and ribbon awards for the 5th National Show at Hershey in June.

For everyone's benefit, I will list each category and some details about them. NOTICE two new categories have been added, "Best in Speciality" and "Most Eye Appealing."

- Lightning Rod Balls--this category is self explanatory. (2 ribbons)
- 2. Threadless--this category is self explanatory. (2 ribbons)
- 3. Best in Color--this category is self explanatory. (2 ribbons)
- 4. Best in Porcelain--this category is self explanatory. (2 ribbons)
- 5. Best in Shape--this category pertains to unique insulators, such as one of a kind and any odd shapes. (2 ribbons)
- Best in Speciality--this category will take in speciality collections such as: (1) a collection of a specific CD number (2) a collection of specific names or symbols, i.e., Hawley, Stars, Americans, Knowles, etc. (2 ribbons)
- 7. Most Eye Appealing Display--this category was developed to meet the requirements of the average insulator collector who desires to set up a display but cannot enter a specific category. This is the only category where the judging rules will not apply. The ribbon winners will be determined by a ballot count from

the general admission. (3 ribbons)


LAS VEGAS, NEVADA SHOW by Addie

SPARTA, NEW JERSEY SHOW



CROSS ARMS 1st place winner, Bob McElvaney for his display titled "Cable Crises."







Congratulations to the Membership Committee and to all of those who have manned membership booths for the N.I. A. at the various shows. We have now passed the 600 mark in memberships. We are well on our way to the 1,000 goal set for the first year. Keep up the good work!

Applications are due for the site of the Sixth National Insulator Show on April 1, 1974. 
